Myrtle Creek Fall Festival Well Received

The city of Myrtle Creek is swinging back into its normal routine today after the big Fall Festival held Friday and Saturday.

Holding the coveted \$75 first place prize for the parade event of Saturday morning is the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, which made its entry in the non-commercial division. Other winners in this category were Feline Fanciers of Oregon, second, with a prize of \$35; Myrtle Creek Stockmen and Connie Richardson with a pony cart pulling an antique car tied for the third prize, receiving \$7.50 each. Ribbon awards were won by Myrtle Creek PTA and the Hawaiian float, done in part by Myrtle Creek Camp Fire Girls.

In the commercial division, for which trophies only were awarded, Tom Ireland's log truck float placed first and California-Pacific Utilities, second.

Job's Daughters of Riddle captured a \$45 first prize in the marching unit division. The Myrtle Creek High Band was second with \$20, and the Troy-Ettes of Winston, girl's marching unit, took the third place prize of \$10. Ribbons went to the Broomfield Operators and the Myrtle Creek Saddle Pals, riding groups from Myrtle Creek.

In a special children's division, four entrants received prizes of \$1 each. Winners of the grand prizes awarded Saturday night in one of the closing festival events are also listed. The 40-piece patio set was won by Cecil Davidson of Roseburg. Second prize of a movie camera was won by Merle O'Brien, also of Roseburg. The transistor radio was won by Irene Dalziel of Myrtle Creek. Presentation of all awards was made by Festival Queen Carol Johnson.

Prizes Awarded
In separate events conducted by various local groups, a baby beef offered by the Myrtle Creek Grange was won by J. W. Tibbet of Medford who is currently working in the Myrtle Creek area. A quilt and crocheted scarf offered by the Help One Another Club were won by Jack Cox and Ed Freese respectively, both of Myrtle Creek. Two rifles offered by VFW Post 7752 of Myrtle Creek were won by Guy Conley of Myrtle Creek and John Likken of Riddle.

According to Lorraine Brenbaum, correspondent, the 1963 Festival drew the largest crowd in its history, with the post office site for midway events proving to be an improvement over the street location again this year after its initial trial at last year's affair.

Garden Homes Sewers Eyed

The Roseburg City Council is expected to approve plans and specifications tonight on three assessment district projects.

Plans for installation of sanitary sewers in the Garden Homes area (recently annexed) will be considered when the council holds its regular meeting. On approval of the plans and specifications, assessment district proceedings would be adopted by resolution.

Plans will also be introduced for installation of sanitary sewers in the lower Hamilton Street area (Sundale Village) and for paving NE Fremont between NE Nash and NE Jackson.

Assessment district proceedings on these projects would also be initiated by resolution. In other business, the council will award contract for resurfacing eight streets with asphaltic concrete, providing a ramp improvement at Roseburg Municipal Airport and sealcoating the airport runway.

The council will also hear a city Airport Commission report in connection with new local flight scheduling by West Coast Airlines and a Park and Playground Commission recommendation involving a master site development plan for Stewart Park.

Mayor Tom Garrison is expected to report on progress for proposed widening and improving W. Harvard Boulevard from W. Bellows to Lookingglass intersection.

Reserve Colonel Attends Session

Robert Kidder of Roseburg, a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army Reserves, is attending a two-week medical career officers course conducted by the Tacoma U.S. Army Reserve School.

The two weeks of summer camp schooling is part of a four-year course. This will be the second year of attendance for Kidder. Following completion of the course this weekend, Kidder and his family will embark on a week's vacation trip along the Olympic Peninsula. Kidder's wife and family have been staying with Mrs. Kidder's mother, Mrs. Stella Wahiaki, while he is attending the summer course.

Unions, Big Six Negotiate Again

PORTLAND (UPI) — Representatives of two striking lumber unions and the Big Six employers' bargaining association were scheduled to meet in a contract negotiating session here today.

An agreement between the two sides could pave the way for the end of the 69-day-old Pacific Northwest lumber strike.

Members of the International Woodworkers of America and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' unions went on strike June 5 against the St. Regis Paper Co. and U.S. Plywood Co., members of the Big Six.

Representatives of the Edward Hines Lumber Co. and a subsidiary of the Shaver Transportation Co. reached agreement on a three-year contract with the unions Saturday.

Identity Pends On 'Silent Lady'

A woman identified by police only as Jane Doe, who was picked up in Roseburg and taken to a mental hospital for observation, has been tentatively identified by a man who said he was her husband as Elsie Louise Meyer of 1811 SE Giles St., Roseburg, the sheriff's office reports.

The woman was arrested Monday of last week by city police after she allegedly picked a fight with a man on a downtown street, and began to beat him up and tear off his clothes.

In the county jail she steadfastly refused to identify herself, eat, comb her hair or talk to anyone. She spent four days in jail before being committed to the state hospital by county authorities.

Meyer (first name not obtained) came into the sheriff's office after an item appeared in Friday's News-Review. He stated that he was sure the woman was his wife from the description given him, but he has not seen her for positive identification. Nor has confirmation been received from the hospital, the sheriff's office reports.

She was described as about 35, weighing about 140 pounds, with dark hair and brown eyes.

Union Votes 'Yes'

PILOT ROCK (UPI) — Members of Local 2970 of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers voted 116 yes to 4 no in favor of accepting a proposal offered by Georgia-Pacific Corp. to end a strike against the firm. Agreement on the proposal, calling for a 30% cent hourly wage hike, was reached last week. The strike idled some 250 men employed at Pilot Rock and in the woods.

Rusk Urges Senate Approve Nuclear Test Ban Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk urged Senate approval of the nuclear test ban treaty today and promised President Kennedy would abrogate the pact "overnight" to resume atmospheric testing if Russia violated it.

Rusk told three Senate committees that he believes the Soviet Union, which "looked into the pit of the inferno" in the Cuban crisis, would violate the test treaty if it felt this would serve its interest.

But he said he felt events of the past year gave Soviet leaders and others a look at nuclear war as an "operational matter" for the first time.

"In this day you don't play the game called 'chicken' with the lives of millions of people around the world," he said.

Historic Overtones
In a morning session, dramatic with historic overtones, Rusk told the Senate foreign relations and armed service committees and members of the House-Senate Atomic Energy Committee that:

"The Big Three treaty prohibiting all but underground nuclear tests is not based on 'trust' of Russia. 'You do not stake the life of a great nation on trust.'"

"The United States 'must maintain a very large overall nuclear superiority' with regard to Russia — not just a balanced force. But, Rusk said, he believes that if unlimited testing were to continue a 'kind of technical standoff' would result. The U. S. is now superior, he said.

"This government would not

have to wait 90 days to withdraw from the nuclear pact if Russia cheated and conducted prohibited tests, which he said the U.S. could detect. "When the gut of a treaty collapses we are not limited to the (90-day) withdrawal clause," he assured the senators.

"President Kennedy could 'terminate the treaty immediately... overnight,' if the Soviets violated it. He said the treaty did not deal with 'internal' details, such as whether Congress or the President could abrogate it. Kennedy could act immediately, he said.

Sen. Leverett Stalton, R-Mass., one of those who attended the treaty-signing in Moscow last week, asked why Russia agreed to the pact.

Rusk said he believed the Soviets concluded it was "in their interest."

In the past year, for the first time the nuclear powers had a look at nuclear exchange as an operational matter," he said, in a reference to the Cuban missile crisis. "Man had a chance to look into the pit of the inferno."

Rusk said U. S. preparations for nuclear weapons tests could proceed, under the treaty, "up to the point of explosion itself." He said the United States should, for example, maintain and improve its atmospheric test facilities on Johnston Island in the Pacific to insure against getting caught short by sudden treaty violations.

Rusk, testifying before an overflow crowd in the Senate caucus room, said the United States has not forgotten the lessons of its dealings with Russia since the end of World War II.

Rail Unions Meet Slated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz pushed further meetings between the railroads and rail unions today in an effort to produce some agreement on the work rules dispute by mid-week.

Wirtz continued meetings with both sides during the weekend in an effort to break the deadlock on the issues surrounding the size of train crews and presence of firemen in diesel locomotives.

The firemen's union, at the behest of Wirtz, has called its decision-making committee to gather in Washington Tuesday and be on hand to decide whether to accept any agreement arising from the talks. Management spokesmen have declined to meet with firemen's union negotiators on the grounds they lack the power of decision.

Wirtz has proposed a two-or-three-year contract to solve the firemen and crew size issues, and has said both sides accepted this as a basis for renewed discussions.

He said the talks on these two issues "and perhaps with respect to all of them ought to come to a climax" the first part of the week.

The railroads plan to post new work rules eliminating thousands of jobs Aug. 29 unless agreement is reached before then. The rules would precipitate a nationwide strike.

Fair Entries Show Increase; Governor To Visit Saturday

With entries in several departments yet to come in, the Douglas County Fair already has an increase of 38 per cent over last year's number, according to a tabulation made Sunday after the closing hour for the initial entries, fair officials report. Entries to date have been submitted by 855 individuals.

Still to come in are entries in several departments, including fruits and vegetables, livestock and baked goods. All these are due Tuesday with special arrangement made for Wednesday entries, opening day of the fair, for flowers and flower arrangements. These will be received from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on that day.

Mark Visit Confirmed

Adding the final fillip to the arrangements is an announcement from the office of Gov. Mark Hatfield that the governor will visit the fair Saturday morning at approximately 10:30, inspect the exhibits and stay for lunch. He will be appearing strictly as a visitor, capitol spokesman state.

Announcement was made today by Mary Nelson of the Roseburg Business and Professional Women's Club that the club will have a "lost children's" booth again this year located near the fair office. An added feature will be a service for checking packages. Mrs. Laura Iles will be in charge. Hours will be from 1 to 10 p.m.

Job's Daughters of Bethel 72, Roseburg, will have the baby sitting concession from noon to 9 p.m. charging 25 cents per hour for taking care of small fry.

Gem and mineral fanciers will again have an opportunity to enjoy a "rock show" as the Umpqua Mineral Club's annual mineral show is combined with the gem and mineral department of the fair and exposition.

Demonstrations Set

Club president and show chairman, George McDowell, has announced that cutting demonstrations, exhibit-awards of useful articles made of agate and the selection of "Miss Southern Oregon Gem" will all be a part of the event.

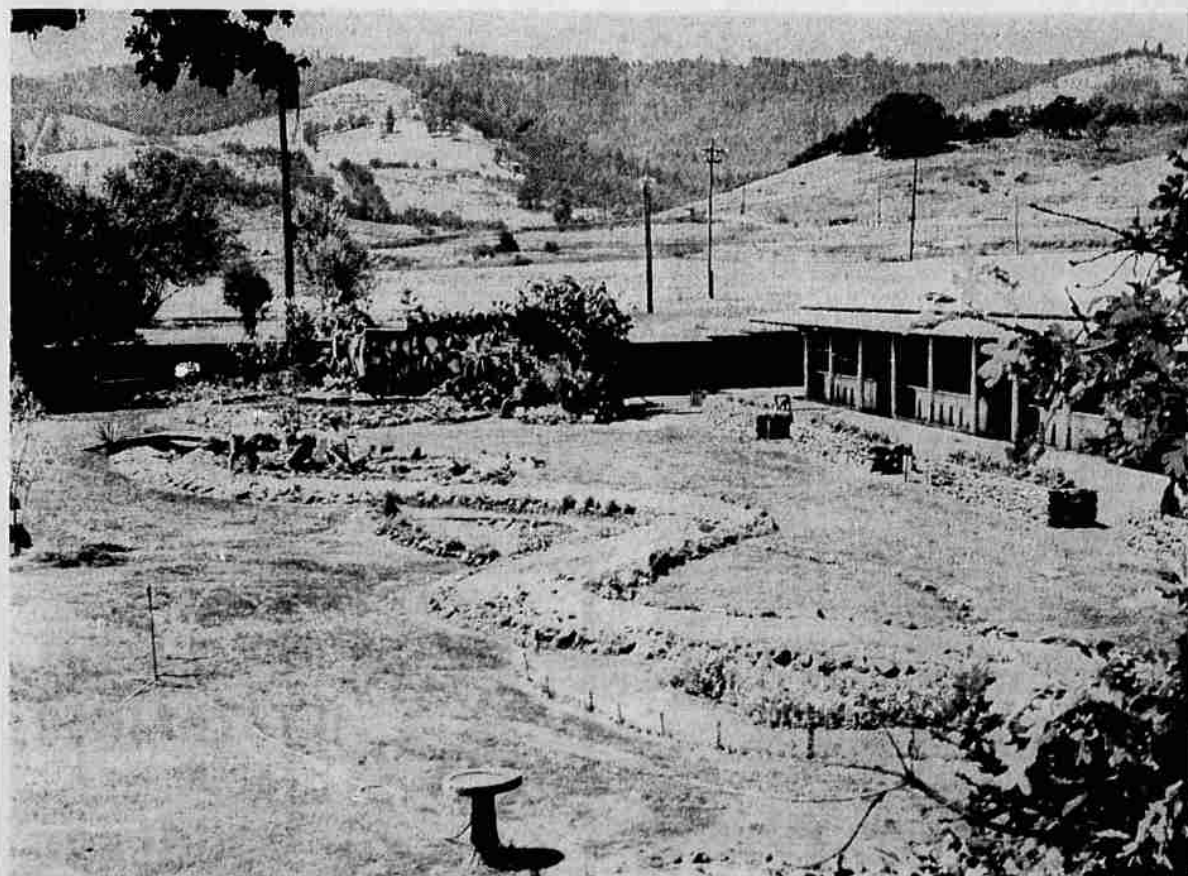

Lightning Strike Fire Disappears

Forest Service crews searched the area near the head of Fish Creek in the Diamond Lake District of the Umpqua National Forest thoroughly for a fire reported at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, but were unable to locate the blaze.

The fire, a possible lightning strike from Friday's storm, was reported to be located 45 miles southeast of the Toketee Ranger Station, reports Glide correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby. Officials of the Forest Service report that the fire either went out on its own or is a sleeper and could reappear at a later time. The area is being watched closely.

More lightning is expected in the high Cascades today.

They withdrew their bargaining authorization from the 196-member Timber Operators Council employees' bargaining association and did their own negotiating.

Hines settled for a 30 1/2-cent an hour raise in wages and benefits during the next three years.

It was the same settlement reached Friday with three other members of the TOC—Willamette Valley Lumber Co., Santiam Lumber Co. and Pope and Talbot, Inc.—and earlier last week with the Georgia-Pacific Corp.

Hines has operations at Hood River, Westfir, Hines and Burns in Oregon.

The Shaver subsidiary, a boom operation on the Columbia and Lewis rivers in Oregon and Washington, settled for a 22 1/2-cent increase retroactive to June 1 and an additional 20 cents spread over the next two years.

About 2,500 Hines employees have been on strike. Only a handful of men were involved in the Shaver settlement.

Weekend Vote

Union members voted during the weekend on ratification of last week's agreements. Results were expected to be known early this week.

If the proposed contracts are approved—and they were expected to be—it would leave only an estimated 4,500 out of work in Oregon, Washington, Montana and Northern California.

The other men would begin returning to work Wednesday. At one point in the strike, 29,000 workers were idled. The unions claim a membership of 70,000 in the region.

Some 14,000 men returned to work last week at four Big Six companies following the end of a lockout. The lockout came June 7 after the unions had struck the other Big Six firms.

Barn Destroyed; Children Blamed

The South Douglas crew of the Douglas Forest Protective Association was called to battle a barn and grass fire Saturday evening near the Herbert Lumber Co. mill in Riddle.

Firemen reported the fire destroyed the barn and burned a half acre of grass. Cause of the fire was listed as children playing with matches. Damage was limited to the barn.

Small children playing with matches allegedly also caused two other grass fires Saturday which were quickly doused by the Roseburg Rural Fire Department.

The first was reported at 11:26 a.m. and was located at 3255 NE Stephens. No damage was reported.

At 4:07 p.m. the firemen were called to 4195 Stella St. where three small boys had reportedly set a grass fire in a vacant lot. No damage resulted.

A minor fire at Billy Mohr's Wrecking Yard on NE Gaden Valley Blvd. occurred when an acetylene torch was being used to remove a motor from an old car. The blaze was started at 3:17 p.m. No damage was reported.

The Roseburg city Fire Department was called Sunday afternoon to extinguish a minor grass fire at 1624 SE Douglas. No damage was reported. The cause of the fire, which burned in grass and brush, is unknown.

Flegel, Kelsay To Attend Council Meet In Honolulu

State Sen. Al Flegel and State Rep. W. O. Kelsay, Roseburg, will be among the delegation of 16 Oregon legislators traveling to Honolulu, Hawaii, to attend the Council of State's Government Aug. 19-22.

The Council of State's Government will include the National Legislative Conference and the Interstate Cooperation Commission meeting.

These two conferences will discuss common problems of the states and their legislatures, including sessions on public lands, highways and power.

Flegel will attend the Interstate Cooperation meeting along with Sen. Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario; and Reps. George Filcraft, R-Klamath Falls; Ed Whelan, D-Portland; and Berkeley Lent, D-Portland.

Kelsay will be part of the group attending the National Legislative Conference. Others in this group will be Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles; House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille; Sens. Dwight Hopkins, D-Imbler; Glen Huston, D-Lebanon;

and Martha Halter Imfeld, 66, of Pacheco, Calif. Their bodies were taken to Ganz Mortuary, and have been shipped to California for services. State police records show 17 have died on the highway in 1963 in Douglas County.

Woman, Girl Hurt

The injured were Rose Marie Pierce, 34, of Oakland, who suffered a broken neck, and her daughter, Laura Pierce, 9, who had a severe head injury. Mrs. Pierce was driver of the car.

Dr. James K. Gray, county medical examiner, reported the condition of the two injured was still critical this morning but they seemed to be coming along very well considering the seriousness of their injuries. Both are in the Myrtle Creek Hospital.

Operator of the other car involved was Roy Walter Osborne, 61, of 1015 Laura St., Myrtle Creek, who was taken to Douglas Community Hospital. His condition today was listed as satisfactory.

Occurs South Of City

The accident occurred about 3:15 p.m. Saturday about 12 miles south of Roseburg just south of the Umpqua River crossing on Interstate Highway 5.

State police stated the Pierce car was northbound. The southbound Osborne car reportedly went across the road into the northbound lane. The Pierce car swerved to the left into the southbound lane to avoid being struck. The Osborne car then smashed into the bridge railing in the northbound lane, then went back across the road and struck the Pierce car in the side.

The vehicles had to be towed from the scene.

Headon Collision Kills Two More

Two Warm Springs residents were killed in a headon collision near Madras early today, following a weekend which saw nine other persons die accidentally in Oregon.

Stanley Frank, 38, and Imogene Frank, 29, were killed about 2:05 a.m. today in a two-car collision on Highway 26, some 13 miles north of Madras. Four persons in the other car, Ted and Wilma Anderson and Richard and Gail Kreige, all of Redmond, were listed in good condition at a Redmond hospital.

Five persons died in traffic crashes, three drowned and one man died in a house fire in weekend accidents.

Man May Reach The Moon By '68

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — The United States may try to put a man on the moon in 1968, two years before the 1970 date set by President Kennedy, the Houston Chronicle said Sunday.

The Chronicle said in a copy-righted story that requests for study of equipment needed to keep men on the moon indicated plans to step up the manned moon shot.

Chronicle science writer Warren Burkett said the study requests involved three items that indicated a shot in 1968.

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
