Entries Flowing To Fair

Entries started coming in from all over Southern Oregon Sunday and will continue right up to the time for opening the gate Wednesday at the Douglas County Fair.

The floral entries will be the last to arrive. They are due Wednesday between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Fruits, vegetables, baked goods and livestock are to be registered Tuesday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Sunday was the first entry day. Entries came in for food preservation, textiles, art, photography, ceramics, hobbies and crafts, gems and minerals. Judging started Monday and will continue throughout the week.

Food preservation, Mrs. Dorwin Powell of Myrtle Creek; textiles, Mrs. Connie Nelson, Winston; arts, Patti White of Roseburg; ceramics, Mrs. Jeanette Loerts of Roseburg; photography, Lyle Timm of Roseburg; hobbies and crafts, Jack Church of Roseburg; and gems and minerals, Frank Stancliff of Roseburg.

Fruits and vegetables, Inez Stancliff of Roseburg; baked goods, Mrs. Joe Brumbach; livestock, Robert Carrio; floral, Daisy Fox of Winston.

Exhibit director is Del Plant. All open class departments are

open to residents of Douglas, Lane, Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson and Klamath counties.

This year, the exhibit building will be limited to non-commercial exhibits. The building, with 26,000 square feet of floor space will house open class and 4-H exhibits and the Umpqua Mineral Club show.

A host of demonstrations will take place in the building also, such as cake decorating, ceramics, model building, textile painting and, of course, the artistic monkey-shines of "Mr. K" in the art department.

Physical Additions Made To Fair Plant

Although no new buildings were constructed for this year's Douglas County Fair, fairgoers will see several new additions to the physical plant.

An addition was made to the Livestock pavilion to enclose 4,000 more square feet of space. The addition includes more pen space for livestock and doubling the amount of restroom space at the Fairgrounds. During the rest of the year, the area will be used for storage.

New Wing Added

Also added was a new office wing at the south end of the Community Building. This 30-by-34 foot structure will provide for three offices, a board room, restrooms and a shower for fair staff.

The present office will be turned over to Douglas County Chapter Red Cross personnel. They will maintain a first aid station in the expanded quarters. The Red Cross has performed this service to handle emergencies in the past, but this will be the first time spacious quarters were available.

Also new this year are seating facilities in "restaurant row." Benches at the booths have been replaced by individual stools, seating 300. Picnic tables and benches will seat an additional 150-200.

New Stage Built

The evening magic show will be performed on a new mobile stage

built by Fairgrounds personnel. It is built in three sections, with each section mounted on wheels. Thus, the 30-by-24-foot stage can be moved on and off the infield in front of the grandstand quickly and easily. It is so constructed that it can even move over the highways to other places than the Fairgrounds.

Finally, Fairgoers will probably be most impressed by the extensive efforts to beautify the grounds. Two men who had had little experience in the job before offered their services in constructing rock planter boxes. The two, Claude Northcraft and Ralph Cooper of Roseburg, put together 300 feet of planters which have been filled with colorful petunias and other plants. In addition, a series of planters for trees and flowers have been spotted near the midway section of the grounds. Also softening the harsh lines of concrete and asphalt, more lawns have been put in around buildings.
