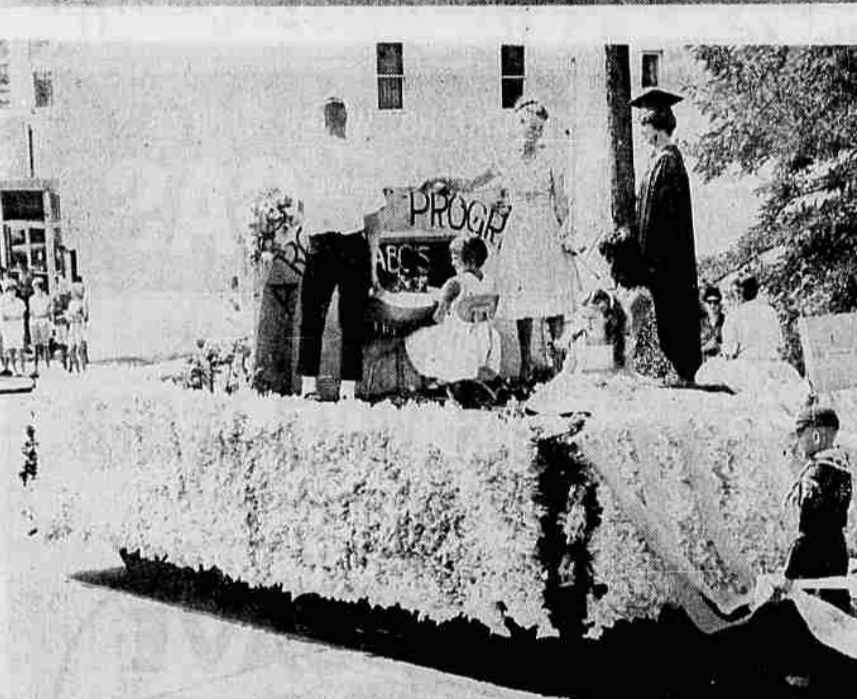
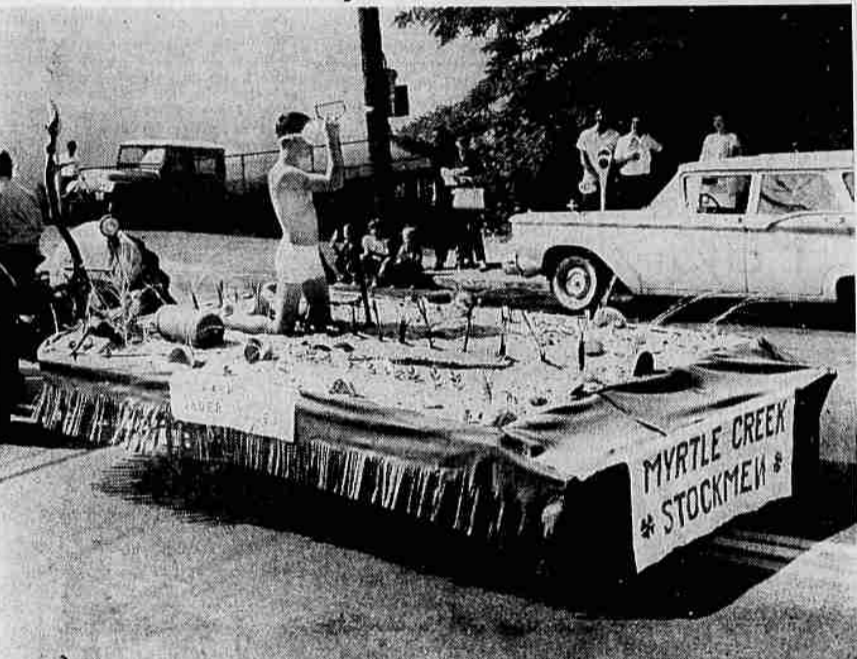

### Major Train Robbery Haul Thought To Be Near Scene

LONDON (UPI) — The detective in charge of Scotland Yard's hunt for a gang of spectacular mail train robbers said today he believes the record \$7.1 million haul still is within a 30-mile radius of the hijack point and possibly intact.

"We are following up literally hundreds of so-called leads and are still combing the ambush area," detective superintendent Gerald McAArthur said. "We are always keeping our fingers crossed that something will come up."

London newspapers reported today that Scotland Yard was on the trail of four or five known criminals who may have taken part in the daring robbery early Thursday morning at Cheddington, 40 miles north of London.

Scotland Yard refused to confirm the reports.

"We have not said anything of the kind," a spokesman for the famed police force said.

McArthur made no reference to the newspaper stories in a news conference at the on-the-spot police headquarters at Aylesbury.

He said detectives were very interested in a stolen truck found abandoned at Retford, 70 miles from the ambush scene. Unconfirmed reports said bank note wrappers had been found in the truck.

The 30-mile radius named by McAArthur takes in a sizable area of outer London.

The Daily Express said the detectives were working with the names of four known criminals who have been missing from their usual haunts since shortly before the well-drilled gang hijacked the Glasgow-London "traveling post office" in pre-dawn darkness last week. The Daily Mail put the number of suspects at five.

## Home Community Help Mental Health's Goal

"A stitch in time saves nine." It is well known that little troubles which are neglected can, and often do, grow into big problems. The whole new idea in mental health is to find ways of helping mentally troubled people in their home communities.

And that's the goal of the new Mental Health Association of Douglas County, a United Fund participant.

"In this atomic-jet-space age, there are many new factors which cause tension," a spokesman for the group said. "There are few persons who escape these problems. Often they are supplemented by other hardships, such as death in the family, failures or accidents.

**Load Too Heavy**  
"Sometimes the load is too heavy and they are like persons caught in quicksand—they need help to get out!"

Last year the Central Douglas County United Fund set aside money to support local mental health

activities. The Mental Health Association of Douglas County is now established and has joined the Mental Health Association of Oregon. Again this year the United Fund will assist in mental health programs for the Roseburg area.

The purpose of the association is to promote mental health in Douglas County. Early treatment in the home community can be effective in reducing suffering and is helpful in preventing major illness. A breakdown in the family can occur when a member who needs treatment is sent to a distant city and it is an aim of the association to see that local mental health clinics and psychiatric wards in general hospitals are available to all who need them.

**A National Goal**  
President Kennedy in a message to Congress in February of this year proposed a national program for mental health. He said: "The new approach relies primarily upon the new knowledge and new drugs acquired and developed in recent years which make it possible for most of the mentally ill to be successfully and quickly treated in their own communities and returned to a useful place in society." A bill is now before Congress which would appropriate money to be used for this purpose.

The development of community mental health centers should provide more effective treatment at less expense in the long run, association officers believe. Oregon State recently established a small intensive-treatment hospital 20 miles from Portland. The hospital treated 1,400 patients last year with a per-patient cost of about \$800 in comparison with \$2,000 to \$3,000 at the old state hospitals.

### Douglas Residents Answer Blood Plea

The Forest Glen Hospital has stated that in addition to the Canyonville Volunteer Fire Department answering the call for blood in the case of Norman Hansen, people from surrounding areas also offered their blood.

The hospital and the Hansen family have expressed their appreciation to all who responded, according to Beth Chappell, correspondent.

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Canyonville in September and all townspeople are urged to donate their blood, said Miss Chappell. Those who responded to the need in the case of Norman Hansen are reminded that it is just as important to give their blood to the bloodmobile as to do so in case of an emergency.

The Oregon State Police rushed five pints of blood from two Roseburg hospitals and one pint from Myrtle Creek in a very short time. This was made possible through the Red Cross Bloodmobile of which the Forest Glen Hospital is a member, stated Miss Chappell.

### Sen. Kefauver Rites Slated Tuesday In Madison, Tenn.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Estes Kefauver will be buried Tuesday in a cemetery only a few yards from his family farm house.

The body of the 60-year-old Democrat who died Saturday of a heart attack will be flown to his native Madisonville, Tenn., on a military transport. The body will lie in state in Madisonville's First Baptist Church from 11 a.m. EDT to 2:30 p.m. Tuesday.

From the small church, Kefauver's body will be taken to the family farm. After brief services on the front porch, he will be interred in the cemetery near the old red brick farm house.

Kefauver's widow and four children, a delegation from the Senate and the nine members of the House from Tennessee will fly from Washington to Knoxville aboard a presidential jet plane Tuesday and go by automobile to Madisonville for the funeral.

**Sought Presidency**  
Hundreds of persons including members of the House and Senate paid their respects Sunday at a Washington funeral home where the body was on view.

Kefauver, a loner whose great political sophistication contrasted with his earnest, plodding campaign style, twice aspired to his party's presidential nomination. But the goal eluded him, though he was the successful candidate for vice president in 1956.

Following tradition, the Senate will meet today to be officially notified of Kefauver's death. It will then adjourn for the day without transaction of any business except for the naming of the delegation.

It was as the crusading champion of a Senate crime investigating committee that Kefauver first gained national prominence. The widely televised hearings were marked by Kefauver prodigiously drawing and receiving defiant re-

sponses from witnesses.

Using the Davy Crockett coonskin cap as his symbol and the handshake as his principal weapon, Kefauver campaigned unsuccessfully for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1952. Four years later he was the running mate of Adlai Stevenson, the man who defeated him for the nomination in 1952 and 1956.

After the 1956 campaign he devoted himself mainly to the chairmanship of the Senate Antitrust subcommittee, championing the cause of the nation's consumers.

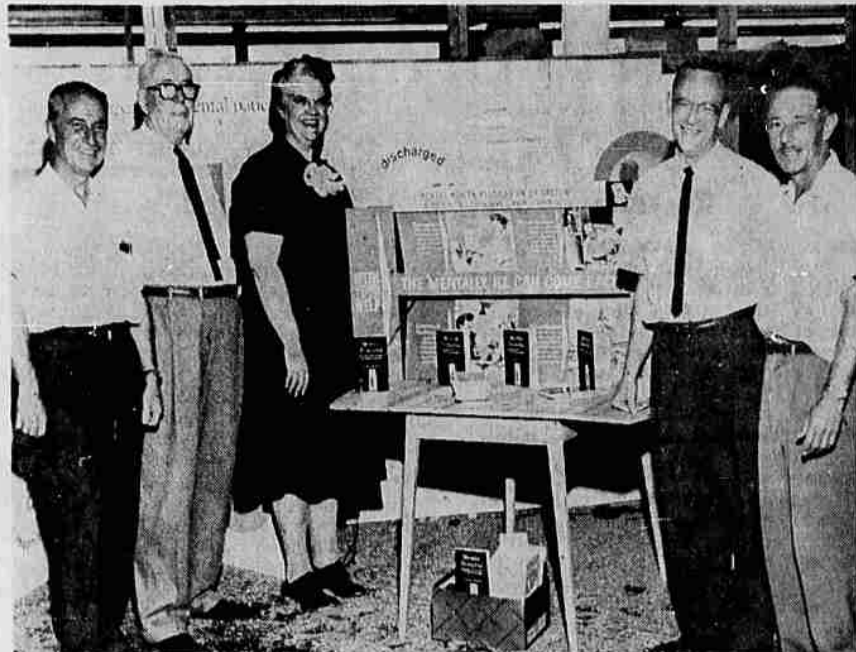
He demonstrated the same crusading vigor in denouncing prices of drugs as he had in castigating the criminals who once appeared before him, or in bucking the machine of Memphis, Tenn., political boss Edward H. Crump to run for senator for the first time in 1948.

**Pacific Wool Growers Name Fisher To Board**  
Eugene Fisher of Elkton has been named to the new board of directors for Pacific Wool Growers.

He will serve with 14 others from Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Pacific Wool Growers is a grower-owned and grower-controlled wool marketing cooperative, whose directors are all prominent sheep men from their respective areas. Directors are elected by the membership each year at the annual membership meeting.

Ronald V. Hogg of Salem was elected president of the organization. A well-known Hampshire breeder, he is now Pacific Wool Growers' representative to the American Sheep Producers Council which served the entire United States in promoting the widespread use of lamb and wool.

### Milk's Strontium 90 Content Expected To Continue Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Public Health Service (PHS) expects radioactive strontium-90 in milk, already at a record amount to increase in the next several months.

During the 12 month period ending in May, the highest in the history of nuclear testing and was nearly twice that recorded in May, 1962 the PHS said Saturday. The Federal Radiation Council said the count still was far below the amount which, if consumed annually, would injure man.

At the same time, the PHS said that another radioactive substance sampled in milk, iodine 131, was at a record low. A spokesman said this was because iodine-131 has a much shorter life than strontium-90 following a nuclear explosion.

The PHS blamed the unusually high strontium-90 on atmospheric tests conducted last year by the United States and the Soviet Union.

The United States resumed testing after the Soviet Union ended the nuclear test moratorium in September, 1961. Officials estimated that more radioactive material was released at that time than in all the nuclear explosions before the 1958 moratorium.

The council has estimated that

a human being can absorb 73,000 picocuries of radioactive strontium-90 in a year before protective action must be considered. A picocurie is one million-millionth of the amount of radiation given off by one gram of radium.

In a statement the radiation council said:

"Health risks from present fallout levels due to testing through 1962 are too small to require measures to limit intake by modification of diet or alternating the normal distribution of use of foods."

### Contempt Charge Faced By Sheriff

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI) — Klamath County Sheriff Murray Britton will have to answer contempt of court charges.

Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders ruled Friday against a defense motion challenging the charge.

The charge is in connection with the April trial of Bobby Huitt of Klamath Falls on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Britton is accused of speaking to a juror about the case, which then was declared a mistrial. Huitt was tried again last week and found innocent.
