WASHINGTON (UPI) — The chairman of a House subcommittee has attacked the Defense Department for requiring pregnant wives of servicemen at some bases to seek medical care at private hospitals.

Rep. Harry R. Sheppard, D-Calif., said in closed-door testimony made public recently the policy was "a nice approach from the medical association point of view." But, the chairman of the House appropriations subcommittee which handles the military construction budget, said that persons entitled to medical service should receive it and not have to go outside the military for it.

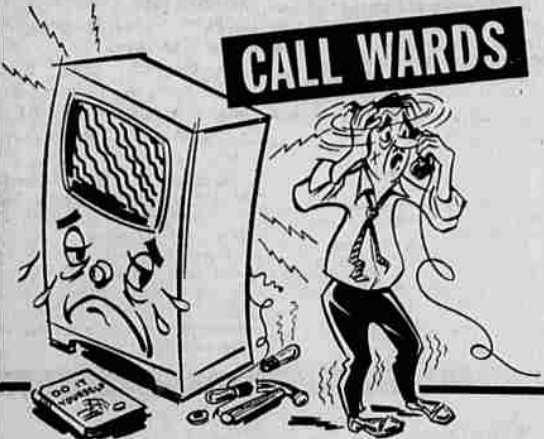
