

# Pulp And Paper Industry Likes Looks Of Future

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI)—Members of the Pacific Northwest pulp and paper industry are taking a look at the future and they like what they see.

An economic survey prepared for the Northwest Pulp and Paper Association envisions a 65 per cent increase in western market demands in 12 years. Paper production is expected to reach nine million tons in the same period—double what it is now. Pulp production is expected to show a similar increase.

Under the direction of H. DeWayne Kreeger, former state director of commerce and economic development, the survey was prepared by John A. Guthrie, professor of economics at Washington State University, and the university's economist, William Iulo.

But while forecasting burgeoning growth in the next decade for the industry in Washington and Oregon where it makes up 10 per cent of all manufacturing, the report points out there are other factors that have to be watched.

Total pulp and paper production in the U.S. is expected to increase 85 per cent—paced by the fast growing industry in the southern states and in British Columbia, as compared to 65 per cent in the west.

Growth in the other areas was listed as the principal factor that could limit expansion in Washington and Oregon. Other possible brakes were competitions from substituted products, water supply

requirements and undue increases in production costs.

One factor that could influence the export production of Oregon and Washington is the pulp mill constructed recently at Sitka, Alaska, for supplying Japanese demands. Others are competitive domestic demands and competition from British Columbia mills. But regardless of the competi-

tion, Guthrie and Iulo roughly estimated sales in 1975 would reach 1.5 million tons annually.

They said the bulk of the pulp production in 1975, 7.5 million tons would be used for paper manufacturing in the west.

## Georgia Likes Barry, Claims Sen. Russell

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., says Georgia would go for Barry Goldwater over President Kennedy if a presidential election between the two were held today.

Civil rights would make the difference, Russell said Sunday.

"It would be very difficult for me" to actively support Kennedy, Russell said. "I am a Democrat and of course I like to go along as far as I can, but I have no intention of going out and knocking myself out supporting the Kennedy administration next year."

He said the stock of Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., conservative leader mentioned as a possible presidential candidate, is very high in Georgia.

Russell said President Kennedy's civil rights package resulted when the President "was just overpowered by the political pressures brought to bear on him and against his better judgment he sent this bill in."

Russell appeared on NBC-TV's Meet The Press.
