

Boardman Site 'Swap' Arranged

SALEM (UPI) — The State Land Board agreed Tuesday to sell 1,645 acres of land in the Boardman Space Age Industrial Park area to Army engineers for \$20,250.

The move paves the way for the engineers to sell back to the state an 8.2 mile river frontage section in the Boardman park for the same amount of money.

The exchange is one of the final moves necessary to give the state title to the land, which it has leased to the Boeing Co. of Seattle.

The Boeing lease goes into effect as soon as the state gets clear title to the land from the engineers.

Sources said Monday that subscriptions to the paper have been taken by Press Secretary Pierre Salinger and special counsel Theodore C. Sorenson.

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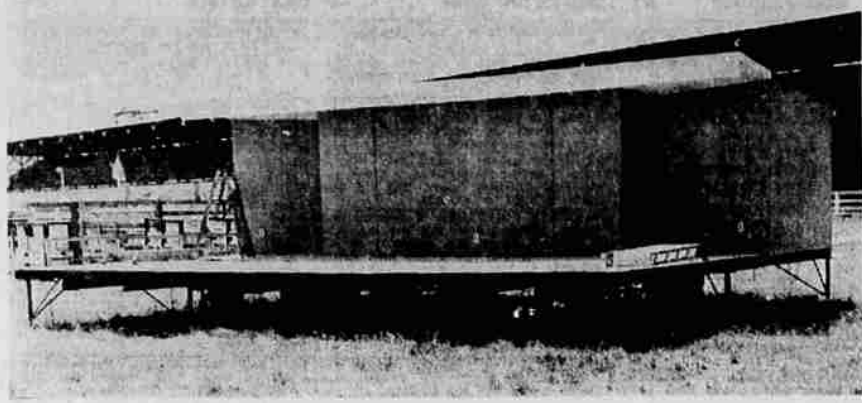

Indonesia, Malaya On Course To War

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — Indonesia and the Federation of Malaya are moving heading toward war, ac-cording to Dr. John Gange, for-mer State Department official.

Dr. Gange, now director of the University of Oregon's Institute of International Studies, said this week that "even if the cold war na-tions withdrew, Indonesia and Ma-laya would continue on their col-lision course."

In an address at the 21st annual Institute of World Affairs, Gange charged that Secretary of State Dean Rusk has "overlooked the threat to internal peace in South-east Asia."

He also criticized the news media for concentrating too much on the Cold War and not enough on the "deeply rooted tensions in Southeast Asia."

Applying Upset At Procedure For Building

SALEM (UPI) — In what Sec-retary of State Howell Appling Jr. termed "a lousy bureaucratic procedure," the Board of Control today gave its formal approval for construction of a new agriculture building on the Capitol Mall.

Appling said he favored the new building, but felt the board was being called upon to rubber stamp the action already taken by the legislature.

"Fortunately I was interested in this matter, and attended the legis-lative hearings," Appling ex-plain-ed. "otherwise we would have no choice but to hold public hear-ings and go over the same ground again."

Gov. Mark Hatfield offered to call such a hearing, but Appling declined.

"It's a lousy bureaucratic pro-cedure to require the Board of Control to rubber stamp things of this sort," Appling commented.

The board also authorized an offer of \$126,700 for seven pieces of privately owned property in the mall area. The property must be purchased by the state before construction of the agriculture building can begin.

Plans Are Next

The action today by the board legally paves the way for drafting of plans for the new structure.

In other action, the board re-fused a request from the Blue Mountain Community College board of trustees to change the wording of the deed transferring 175 acres of land near Pendleton to the college.

Acting College President Wal-lace W. McCrae said trustees feared the deed was too restric-tive. The board recently sold 175 acres of Eastern Oregon State Hospital land to the college for a campus site.

The Board of Control disagreed that the deed was restrictive, and referred the group to the Justice Department which drafted the deed.

The Board of Control postponed action on a request for release of \$355,150 as the state's share of county administered community mental health clinics operating costs for the 1963-64 fiscal year.

The board said it wanted some indication from the Emergency Board that funds would be avail-able for the program during the 1964-65 fiscal year. The approval from the Emergency Board will be sought at the scheduled Sept. 6 meeting.

Governor Appoints Two To Circuit Court Bench

SALEM (UPI) — Appointment of judges to the two new circuit court positions created by the 1963 legislature was announced Tuesday by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Albert R. Musiek was named a Washington county circuit judge, and Edwin R. Allen as judge of the new Lane County circuit court. Musiek is married and the father of one child. Allen, also mar-ried, is the father of two children.

his ace and at first glance it ap-peared that success depended on the location of the king of clubs. Then he saw an extra chance and he took it. At trick two he led the jack of diamonds toward dummy. West should have clattered up with the ace and trusted that his king of clubs would provide the setting trick but West wasn't looking at all 52 cards and ducked.

South proceeded to draw trumps with three leads. He discarded his last two diamonds on the king and queen of spades and led the nine of clubs. He intended to let it ride, but East covered with the jack and South's queen lost to West's king. West led the ace of diamonds. South ruffed, entered dummy with the last trump, discarded the five of clubs on the last diamond and made his slam by finessing suc-cessfully against West's ten of clubs.

Why did this play give South that extra chance? Because no matter how the defense went, South al-ways would make his contract if the king of clubs was in the East hand.
