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Reedsport Plywood Workers Set Vote

Employees of United States Plywood at Reedsport will vote Saturday between 10 a.m. and noon on whether to accept the strike settlement as negotiated by union headquarters.

The ballots are to be counted in Portland Sunday, and, if favorable, resumption of work at the plant is scheduled to start Tuesday, according to a report from Dawn Pesneau, News-Review correspondent at Reedsport. Meanwhile, the plant is still picketed.

The company operates a veneer plant only in that town, and about 55 employees have been affected. Plans are to start bringing logs into the pond on Tuesday. The employees are represented by the International Woodworkers of America, Local 140.

Roseburg Firm Is Low Bidder On School Unit

James & Stritzke Construction Co. of Roseburg was apparent low bidder on the Winchester Elementary School project when bids were opened by the Roseburg School Board Wednesday night.

James & Stritzke turned in a base bid of \$173,212. Jack Mathis Construction Co. turned in a base bid of \$173,700. The school board voted tentatively to accept James & Stritzke's bid with four alternates, bringing the total of \$178,463.

The project calls for construction of eight classrooms and an eventual storage room, which will be used for a principal's office at the present time. Architect's estimate on the project was \$179,000. Construction is to be completed within 130 calendar days of the signing of the contract.

Other bidders were Marsh Construction Co., \$176,798; Murphy Construction Co., \$185,541; Industrial Building, \$187,721; Todd Building Co., \$189,048; C.P.S. Construction Co., \$193,019; and Cummings Construction Co., \$196,692.

Architect John Briscoe reported plans for the construction of a three-story addition to the high school complex will be held back about four and a half months. He cited a delay in determining the type of building desired as cause for the holdup. It is now contemplated the building will be completed in December 1964.

Briscoe was commissioned to design a \$75,000 addition to Fremont Junior High and a \$50,000 addition to Fullerton Elementary School. Roseburg architect Van Svarverud was commissioned to design a \$35,000 addition to Joseph Lane Junior High.

The school board also approved \$225 for transportation of girls to and from Benson and Eastwood schools for physical education activities and for band students' transportation to those two schools.

Group Scans Sister City Possibilities

A list of 65 Mexican cities with populations of from 20,000 to 50,000 have been compiled by the Roseburg Sister City Committee to be considered as Roseburg's sister city.

The list was unveiled at a meeting of the committee in the Umpqua Hotel Wednesday noon. Meanwhile, the American Municipal Association and the U.S. Information Agency in Mexico are investigating to determine which cities are interested in a sister city program. Members of the Roseburg committee were assigned to gather research material on the 65 cities so when the information arrives from the AMA, the selection can be made shortly after.

Named to the research committee were Helen Casey, M. C. Delier, Bob Feldcamp, Don Sanders, Mrs. A. G. McLain and Mrs. Sid Domenico.

The committee also discussed enlarging the Roseburg committee to include people with some authority on Mexico.

Finally, George Castillo was elected vice chairman of the committee. Chairman is Peter B. Serafin.

BRAZZAVILLE, Congo (UPI)—President Fulbert Youlou resigned today in the face of a howling mob which besieged his palace and screamed for his ouster.

A Congolese army announcement said the army seized power in this former French colony following Youlou's resignation.

Chief Of AFL-CIO Wants Re-Elected

UNITY HOUSE, Pa. (UPI)—AFL-CIO president George Meany, who will be 69 Friday, plans to run for a new two-year term in November.

The 100-member AFL-CIO Executive Council with a firm hand and has no plans for retirement, his associates said.

Meany showed his rock-like firmness at this week's meeting of the council when the question of AFL-CIO backing of the Aug. 28 Negro-led march on Washington came before it.

He advocated a hands-off policy and carried all but two of 20 council members with him on the decision to avoid a commitment either for or against the mass demonstration.

It was a clear-cut victory for Meany's position and a jolt to the hopes of Walter P. Reuther, auto workers' president and frequent critic of the AFL-CIO's chief spokesman. Only AFL-CIO vice president A. Philip Randolph, head of the Sleeping Car Porters Union and a principal march sponsor, joined Reuther in blasting the neutrality doctrine. They advocated all-out support of the demonstration.

David Dubinsky, head of the Ladies' Garment Workers' Union and host at this union-run resort in the Pocono Mountains, honored Meany at a reception Wednesday night attended by other council members and AFL-CIO staff members.

He and Reuther clash frequently over policy and tactics but Meany seems to hold the high cards in a council showdown. And the political realities indicate that Meany will have no opposition when he is nominated for a fifth two-year term in his \$45,000-a-year job.

Local Man Crushed When Truck Backs

Kenneth Graham Ewens, 31, of 1044 SE Terrace Ave., Roseburg, was killed in a road construction accident on Camas Creek Road, approximately 31 miles west of Roseburg in Coos County Wednesday, state police report.

The accident occurred about 9:30 a.m., when a dump truck, operated by David Allen Bishop, 22, of 1286 NW Highland St., Roseburg, ran over him.

Police investigation revealed that Ewens apparently walked behind the truck as the operator started to back up to get in position to load gravel from a pile alongside the roadway. The operator was unaware Ewens was behind the truck until advised by the shovel operator.

Ewens was born March 22, 1932, in Roseburg. He had lived here all his life, and was married to Beverly Nicholls in Roseburg in 1956.

Funeral services will be held at Wilson Chapel of the Roses Friday at 10 a.m. with the Rev. Robert Hempel of the Nazarene Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow at the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

The unfrocked former Roman Catholic priest who still calls himself "abbe," quit after three days of demonstrations and violence in which at least five persons were reported killed.

The army said the 46-year-old Youlou signed his resignation at 1 p.m. and said it would remain in power until a new cabinet is formed.

(Authoritative sources in Washington said the Congolese army totals 700 men and the gendarmerie 500.)

The resignation came as an estimated 10,000 persons chanted demands outside the heavily guarded palace that Youlou quit. A spokesman for the French forces here said Youlou's resignation has terminated the military support given him by members of the 2,000-man French army garrison at the start of the anti-government riots Tuesday.

The rioting was started when an estimated 3,000 trade union members marched on the city jail in an attempt to free two of their leaders.

They burned and looted the jail, freed all the prisoners, burned down the television station and looted private homes of several government ministers.

Navy Man Gets Life Sentence

NEW YORK (UPI)—Navy Yeoman I.C. Nelson C. Drummond, 34-year-old Baltimore Negro, was sentenced to life in prison today for conspiracy to commit espionage for Russia.

Drummond, who was found guilty July 19 in a second trial on the same charges, could have received the death penalty. But Federal Judge Thomas M. Murphy said he decided to give Drummond the lesser sentence out of compassion for the veteran sailor's wife, Lucille, and the devotion of his parents.

A jury of 10 men and 2 women found Drummond guilty of stealing classified defense documents from a file room at the Newport Navy Base, where he was on duty, but failed to find him guilty on the indictment count of passing the documents to the two Russian U.N. aides in whose company he was arrested. The lone Negro juror, a woman, held out on this count.

Murphy described Drummond's act as "a most awful crime."

"Congress has set the death penalty for treason such as yours. You are a man who has betrayed his trust to his country. You have sold the security and safety of your country for \$24,000 while a uniformed member of the U.S. Navy."

Resources Groups Asks Meeting On Initiative

SALEM (UPI)—Members of the State Fish and Game Commissions have been asked to discuss a proposed initiative to outlaw commercial salmon fishing on the Columbia River at a natural resources committee meeting Sept. 4.

Dan Allen, executive secretary of the resources group, said Gov. Mark Hatfield had invited representatives of both commissions to attend the meeting.

He said the initiative would be placed on the ballot next year.

Winston-Dillard Entry Is Winner Of Booth Prize

For the second year in a row, Winston-Dillard walked off with top prize in the community booth competition at the Douglas County Fair.

The booth apparently won because of the simplicity with which it expressed the message emphasizing the community in light of the theme of the fair, "Moods of Magic."

The theme of the Winston-Dillard booth was "Magic of Growth through Forest Products." Having an economy based almost entirely on lumber production, the community had a small Douglas fir as the focal point, with the products resulting from it fanning out from it. It was backgrounded by still more lumber products, different kinds of paneling.

For its efforts, the city won \$500. Second place went to Roseburg, which hinged its story on Miss Oregon. It emphasized that without community support, Roseburg would never have had a Miss Oregon.

Roseburg and the other four entries claimed \$200 prizes. They are Glendale-Azalea, third; Canyonville, fourth; Myrtle Creek, fifth; and Reedsport, sixth.

Rocky, Barry Due At Eugene

EUGENE (UPI)—Two men mentioned prominently for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination, Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York and Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, will be here Oct. 12 for the Republican Western States Conference.

Both men are scheduled to speak, but at different locations, and no debate between them is likely, a spokesman said.

Both Rockefeller and Goldwater are expected to be on the Oregon presidential primary ballot next May 15.

Lowell C. Paget, Oregon GOP national committee chairman, said Rockefeller would be honored by a reception and luncheon at noon.

Goldwater will be guest of honor at a reception and dinner in the evening.

Goldwater's speech is scheduled for the Lane County fairgrounds and Rockefeller's tentatively for the University of Oregon Student Union building.

Gov. Mark Hatfield of Oregon will keynote the conference Oct. 11. Delegates from 12 western states are expected.

Underground Test Conducted By U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States today conducted an underground nuclear test in Nevada, the second announced since four days.

Such tests are permitted under the limited nuclear test ban treaty which forbids other types of experiments.

Today's shot was the second to be held since the agreement was reached in Moscow and the 76th underground test to be conducted by the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC).

Announcement of the test was made by the AEC which said it was of low yield. This means that the power of the test was under the equivalent of 20,000 tons of TNT.

The brief AEC announcement said: "A nuclear test of low yield was conducted underground today by the Atomic Energy Commission at its Nevada test site."

16,157 Visit Fairgrounds On First Day

An all-time attendance record for opening day was made at the Douglas County Fair Wednesday with 16,157 admissions being recorded, fair officials stated this morning. Opening day figure for last year was 8,754.

Records are being broken also in the number of individuals making entries and in the total number of entries. This year's figure of 1,055 individuals participating almost doubles last year's total of 618. The total number of entries, not counting commercial exhibits, will run into the thousands. Final compilation has not yet been made but the figure is expected to be staggering, fair officials report.

According to Fair Manager Bert Allenby, all the special attractions are drawing large and enthusiastic crowds. The evening grandstand show featuring Mandrake the Magician is a particular crowd pleaser, Allenby said.

Dance Floor Jammed

At the special dance for teenagers held opening night the dance floor was jammed, with youngsters packed in like sardines, it was reported. Dick Booth is MC for this event.

Wednesday, officially designated "Kids Day," saw the grandstand mostly filled in the afternoon for the special Shetland Pony show which included a variety of classes along with qualifying races for \$1,000 in prizes which will be awarded in final competition Friday. Popular was the chariot race in which youngsters were costumed in true Roman style and the two-wheel trotting race in which racing colors were worn. The Shetland Pony show and races were repeated today beginning at 1:30 p.m. Jack Mayer of Eugene is in charge of this special children's attraction which in addition to the children's competition, features adult and young adult riders in various categories of racing and showmanship classes.

Prizes High

Close to \$700 in prizes went to the area's garden clubs following judging of the garden plots Wednesday.

First prize of \$100 went to the Huerfano Garden Club. Camas Valley Club was second with \$80 and Lookingglass third with \$60. The nine other clubs participating along with two 4-H garden clubs all received prizes of \$50 each, all qualifying with the required number of points.

Three young people from Roseburg and a young man from Sutherlin were the winners in the Ricketts' Review and Talent Show on opening night Wednesday. All are now eligible to compete in the semifinals on Saturday night.

Taylor Says Military Staff Supports Test Ban Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor assured the Senate today the Joint Chiefs of Staff endorsed the nuclear test ban treaty without any administration "arm-twisting" and were kept "constantly abreast" of its development.

In public testimony before going into an afternoon closed session with senators considering the pact, the chairman of the joint chiefs said:

—The area of "high-yield" super nuclear weapons in which Russia leads "has very little if any military significance." The joint chiefs feel use of more small bombs on any enemy target is better than dropping one 50 to 100 megaton weapon.

—He is confident President Kennedy will carry out "safeguards" to the test pact by maintaining full lab and test facilities and pushing underground testing permitted in the treaty.

—Past nuclear testing has "tended to close the gap" and let Russia gain on the United States in nuclear weapons. He said that if Russia had not been able to test she "never would have caught up" with this country. He said the joint chiefs had opposed a comprehensive test ban because of fear the Soviets could cheat and test underground while the United States would not.

—He is confident President Kennedy will carry out "safeguards" to the test pact by maintaining full lab and test facilities and pushing underground testing permitted in the treaty.

—It is "conceivable" that Communist China wants to expand into Soviet Asia and that Russia in signing the limited treaty wanted to take "some small step" to deal with the China problem.

Taylor assured the Foreign Relations, Armed Services, Joint Atomic Committee member considering the treaty that the joint chiefs suffered no "unusual pressures" from the administration in endorsing the pact.

And he said he was kept fully informed about negotiations on the treaty and instructions given Averell Harriman, chief negotiator in Moscow, and passed this along to the other military leaders.

Questioned at Length

Senators questioned Taylor at length on the likelihood of the United States maintaining all the facilities for test readiness under the treaty. He was asked if it were likely to "inhibit" or "downgrade" such preparation and he replied, "No sir, quite the contrary."

He conceded there is some "disability" in not being able to conduct full antimissile system tests in the atmosphere under the treaty but said it is "not a critical one."

Taylor joined Dr. Glen Seaborg, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, and the secretaries of defense and state in endorsing the treaty and calling for Senate approval. Seaborg testified Wednesday before the three-committee panel that the strenuous objections of nuclear scientist Dr. Edward A. Teller were "not important enough to forego" the treaty.

Taylor said the criticisms Teller advanced had been considered by government advisers "over and over again."

The testimony of Taylor on Wednesday, and Teller the day before, closed hearings of the Senate preparedness subcommittee was made public late Wednesday.

\$2 Haircut Voted By Barber Union

The price of men's haircuts will increase from \$1.75 to \$2 effective Tuesday, Aug. 20, according to announcement made today for Local 902, Barbers' Union, by C. J. Brady, secretary treasurer.

The 25-cent increase was voted at the regular monthly meeting of the union held Wednesday night at the Labor Temple. According to Brady, this is the first increase in the price of haircuts since May of 1958. The price for children's haircut will remain at \$1.50, Brady said.

In other action, union members elected Roger Whitehead as official delegate to the International Barbers' Union Convention to be held in Indianapolis, Ind., beginning Sept. 5. The convention is scheduled to last for one week.

Scotland Yard Cracks Big Mail Train Robbery One Week From Its Occurrence

LONDON (UPI)—Scotland Yard today cracked the \$7.1 million mail train robbery case—one week to the day after it occurred.

The police arrested three men and two women and it was unofficially reported that about \$250,000 of the loot was recovered. Unconfirmed reports said eight other persons were taken into custody. None was identified.

An official police announcement said two of the men were seized "for complicity in the mail robbery."

They were arrested at Bourne-mouth, a seaside resort, less

than 100 miles from the place in Buckinghamshire where a gang of bandits hi-jacked a royal mail train last Thursday and made off with 120 bags containing 2½ tons of worn, but valid, pound notes.

Both men, according to the police, put up a struggle and had to be subdued by arresting officers. About 100,000 pounds (\$200,000) was reportedly found in two cars they had.

The other suspects—a man and two women—were arrested in raids on London homes by Scotland Yard's "flying squad" of detectives, but the police made no formal announcement about them. It was reported that about 500

pounds (\$1,400) was recovered in those raids.

A London newspaper (Evening Standard) reported that another man was arrested in Surrey and that he was carrying 200,000 pounds (\$500,000) of the record loot. It said that the suspect was taken into custody at a house not far from the East Molesey police station.

The money found in the possession of the two men arrested at Bourne-mouth was said to be in old notes, similar to the bills which British banks had placed on the train so that they could be taken to London, destroyed, and replaced by new currency.
