Recovery Period Will Keep Jackie Out Of Limelight

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI)—First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy was in the starting stage today of a long convalescence that will keep her out of the official White House limelight until early next year.

The President's 34-year-old wife left the Otis Air Force Base Hospital Wednesday in "very satisfactory" condition. She had spent a week there during which her third child, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, was born and died less than two days later.

Mrs. Kennedy had undergone her fourth Caesarean, and although weak and wan looking she walked out of the hospital hand in hand with the President. She smiled and seemed happy to be going home to Squaw Island and her children, Caroline, nearly 6, and John Jr., almost 3.

Mrs. Kennedy is on the road to recovery, but her obstetrician, Dr. John W. Walsh of Washington, ordered her to cut out all official activities for five months "in order to insure her complete rehabilitation and continuing good health."

Starting in mid-September the First Family is expected to spend several weeks at Hammersmith Farm, the Newport, R. I. home of Mrs. Kennedy's stepfather and mother, Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss.

Legislative Group Will Leave Next Week For Hawaii

SALEM (UPI)—Next week is "Aloha Week" for 16 Oregon legislators, two state officials, and several wives.

The occasion is the meeting in Honolulu of the National Legislative Conference, Aug. 19-23. At the same time—and place—the Interstate Cooperation Commission will hold its annual meeting.

Many of the Oregonians attending the meetings may travel, eat and be housed at state expense during the week of the conferences.

The state will not pay the wives' expenses. Nor will the state pay expenses incurred by delegates who arrive early, or delay their departure for vacations.

Attending the national legislative conference will be Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles; Sen. Glenn Muston, D-Lebanon; Sen. Dwight Hopkins, D-Imbler; House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille; Rep. William Homstrom, D-Gearhart; Rep. W. O. Kelsay, D-Roseburg; and Rep. W. S. Ouderkirk, R-Newport.

Attending the Interstate Cooperation Commission sessions will be Senate Minority Leader Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario; Sen. Al Flegel, D-Roseburg; Rep. Ed Whelan, D-Portland; Rep. Berkeley Lent, D-Portland; Rep. George Flitcraft,

R-Klamath Falls, and Vern Hill, director of the Department of motor vehicles.

Representing the Legislative Counsel Committee will be Sen. Donald Husband, R-Eugene, and Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, D-Portland.

Rep. Robert Smith, R-Burns, will represent the Legislative Interim Committee on Highways.

The Legislative Fiscal Committee is sending fiscal officer Kenneth Bragg.

One reason for the large Oregon delegation is that Portland is courting the conference for 1965. Next year the conference will be rotated to somewhere in the eastern part of the country.

Also, the total delegation—18 official representatives—seems extra large because both the Legislative Conference and the Interstate Cooperation Commission are meeting at the same place at the same time. The two groups do not always meet together.

Nevertheless, Mahoney's participation came as a surprise to many. During the recent legislative session Mahoney was extremely critical of interim committees. He said they did little, if any good.

Mahoney also screened the trav-

el allowance of every state agency and department, as the various budgets came before the Senate for approval. He refused to approve budgets which had what he considered an unnecessarily large travel allotment.

Mahoney told UPI "I'm going at my own expense. I told Musa some time ago I wouldn't bill the state for my trip, and in fact I have booked passage back on a Matson liner."

"I don't think this is a junket because the Portland chamber is pushing so hard to get the convention in 1955, and they need conventions."
