

St. Lawrence Seaway Use High, But Below Prediction

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An agriculture Department study shows that traffic on the St. Lawrence Seaway has increased spectacularly since 1958, but is still short of expectations.

If current trends continue the volume on the new waterway may not reach its expected goal of 50 million tons cargo by 1968, the department said.

The study, prepared by the department's Economic Research Service (ERS), shows the quantities of agricultural and other commodities shipped on the seaway from 1958 — a year before it was opened to large seagoing vessels — to 1962.

Traffic of all commodities on the seaway in 1958 totaled 11.8 million tons. During 1959 the enlarged and improved seaway carried 20.4 million tons, although the expected amount was 25 tons. The tonnage in 1962 reached 25.6 million. If this rate of increase does not increase, the goal of 50 million tons annually will not be achieved by 1968. A volume range from 35 to 40 million tons by 1968 appears more likely.

ERA said that although a lasting traffic pattern probably has not been established, completion of the seaway already has altered the movement of agricultural commodities, particularly U. S. grain for export.

Grain shipments from Great Lakes ports directly to overseas destinations via the St. Lawrence River in 1958 totaled only about 100,000 tons. This was 4 per cent of all U. S. grain exported in that year. In 1962, U. S. overseas shipments from the Great Lakes ports were 5.8 million tons, 18 per cent of the expanded total of U. S. grain exports.

Overseas grain shipments from Atlantic coast ports remained almost stable from 1958 to 1962, although total grain exports rose 70 per cent. The proportion of grain shipped from Atlantic ports declined from 25 per cent in 1958 to 13 per cent in 1962. ERS said that export grain traffic at Gulf and Pacific ports so far has not been materially affected by the seaway. In fact, export grain traffic at Gulf ports increased, due partially to reduced rail rates to the Gulf ports.

Four groups of bulk commodities — agricultural products, bituminous coal, iron ore, and petroleum — have accounted for 75 per cent of the total tonnage shipped on the seaway since 1959. Agricultural tonnage has risen every year.

ERS said maintenance of the present growth in volume of seaway traffic will depend on many factors. These include the capacity of the waterway, general business conditions, the relation of seaway shipping costs to costs on alternate routes, the routing preferences of shippers and receivers, and the membership, policies, and practices of the European common market.

Migrant Labor Health Project Is Under Way

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon's migrant labor health project is under way.

Dr. Ralph Sullivan, director of the occupational health section of the State Board of Health, said a public health nurse and sanitarian will work in migrant camps in Yamhill, Washington, Polk, Marion and Multnomah counties.

The project is operated under a federal grant of about \$70,000.

Ranch Ramblings

Many of us here in Douglas County have heard about Gaines wheat. This is a new semi-dwarf, stiff strawed wheat which responds tremendously well to irrigation and fertilizer and might make a big difference in the amount of grain produced in areas like western Oregon.

Trials With Fertilizer

A little bit of first-hand information came my way this week, when I worked with Glenn Baughman of Tenmile in harvesting his Gaines wheat. Glenn put out some trials with fertilizer when he planted his Gaines wheat using different rates and the results are very interesting. On some of the plots, Glenn spent \$27 per acre for fertilizer, which included 250 pounds of 16-20 applied in the fall and an additional 600 pounds of ammonium sulphate per acre applied this spring. This makes a total of 166 pounds of actual nitrogen applied per acre. The highest yielding plots made 72.2 bushels per acre. This amounts to 4,332 pounds of actual wheat per acre.

In comparing this with the lower rates of fertilization, the higher he went on fertilizer the more grain he got. All this was done on a soil that certainly isn't what we would consider one of our better soils. This is a first bench soil which hasn't been too productive in the past. In fact, it has been quite unproductive. Just for a little comparison, Glenn put it into red oats a year ago in the spring and no fertilizer was added. When he harvested the crop there was approximately 13 bushels of grain which probably would amount to just a little over 1,000 pounds yield off the three-acre field. This year, on the same three acres, Glenn spent \$32.16 for fertilizer and he turns up with a yield about five tons of wheat product. It would appear to me that the fertilizer and wheat variety paid.

We don't doubt that that much fertilizer wouldn't have paid on the red oats. However, with a crop like Gaines, which is a winter wheat, can be seeded in the fall, fertilized and then fertilized again in the spring to take advantage of the winter moisture, we do stand a chance of growing a lot more grain. If you do have supplemental irrigation to help the situation it would appear that we could do quite a bit better with

the grain crops than what we have been doing.

This particular field is one of our medium-to-poor soils and yet has done an excellent job of producing grain. Many of the neighbor's fields which have been grazed for many years, do very well if they produce a ton of grain to the acre, using gray oats, barley or spring oats.

Difference Startling

Quite startling though is the difference in the amount of grain produced from the higher fertilizer rates. The lowest rate of fertilizer, that Glenn put on, ended up at 103 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre. This was an application of 250 pounds of 16-20 in the fall and 300 pounds of ammonium sulphate in the spring. This produced about a ton and a half of grain, 3,073 pounds to be exact. When the fertilizer was increased to 600 pounds per acre there was an increase of about 1,260 pounds of grain produced. What this means is that it costs \$8 extra in fertilizer to produce a little more than a half ton of extra grain and I think any of you would agree that this is a real bargain. Particularly when many of our feed grains are selling at \$50 a ton or better.

In visiting with Glenn afterwards, he indicated that they had irrigated the field once. The irrigation probably should have been started earlier. Next year, he vows he is going to beat 80 bushels to the acre on the whole field and I for one believe that he can do it.

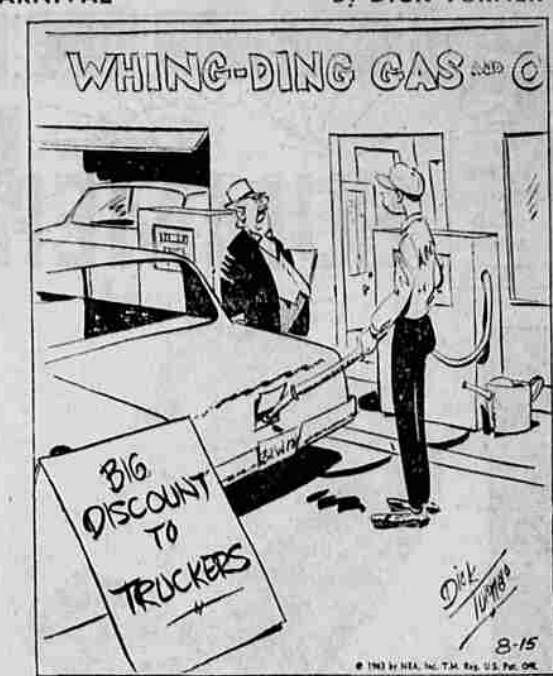
