

Mark, Editor Clash On Referral Issue

SALEM (UPI) — J. Francis Howard claimed today that Gov. Mark Hatfield had changed his mind and now favored referral of the 1963 legislature's \$60 million tax increase package.

Hatfield termed the claim "Totally ridiculous and utterly misleading."

Howard, editor of weekly newspapers in Corvallis and Albany, is spearheading the drive to gain 23,185 signatures to refer the tax package to a special election Oct. 15.

The lead editorial of today's Benton County Herald in Corvallis, one of Howard's publications, is titled "Governor Hatfield NOW for referral."

Opposition Noted

Howard noted that earlier Hatfield had urged voters not to sign referral petitions.

"The governor stated that the

\$60 million income tax law was a mess and that he washed his hands of this income tax gouge," the editorial said.

"Our readers will remember that our governor refused to sign this unneeded, unwanted and outrageous law. By doing this he delayed the efforts to get referral petitions printed for ten days," the editorial said.

The editorial then declares, "the greatest single success in (the campaign to get the tax bill referred) and the most influential convert is Governor Hatfield. Our governor is a wise man and wise to change their minds."

Letter Cited

We have in our newspaper office a signed letter from our governor... to a local Southern Pacific Railroad man, in which he says, quote:

"Oregon's constitution clearly affords the people the opportunity to vote on any program of expenditures that would require an increase in taxes. It has been my recommendation that, should additional taxes be required, the increases should be tied to tax reform and the issues referred for decision by the people."

Howard's editorial concluded: "Thank you Governor Hatfield."

The governor told United Press International "I recommended that an election be held on any tax increase while the legislature was in session. The Democrats wouldn't let it happen."

"There is no question the people have a right to vote. Earlier this year, and in my budget message I said the legislature could avoid problems by reaching an early decision on taxes and having an election while the legislature was in session."

Hatfield said Howard's editorial was "utterly misleading," and termed the suggestion that he had changed his mind as "totally ridiculous."

M-C Board Studies Plan For Merger

The Myrtle Creek School Board meeting in regular session Wednesday night gave consideration to a plan submitted by the Canyonville School Board for the reorganization and consolidation of the two districts.

Canyonville's proposition had been outlined at a meeting of that board earlier this week.

According to correspondent Lorraine Birenbaum, the Myrtle Creek Board accepted the plan for consolidation with the exception of one paragraph dealing with the joint acceptance of assets and liabilities of the districts. It was the feeling of the board that Myrtle Creek voters would not be willing to accept the debts of the Canyonville district which at present is not in as favorable a financial position as Myrtle Creek.

The plan was sent back to the Canyonville board for revision, Mrs. Birenbaum said.

A new student insurance policy was reported for this year with coverage for both boys and girls. Blanket coverage in the amount of \$3,000 will be provided for grades 7 through 12. For students in grades one through six, parents may buy insurance for \$2 per child. The insurance setup will be through Oregon Physicians Service.

In other action the school clerk was authorized to call for bids for an additional school bus of 65-passenger conventional type. Money is on hand for this expenditure.

Liability and automotive insurance coverage for the district was awarded to Vera White of Myrtle Creek at a figure of \$1811.40.

Altercation At Fair Being Investigated

The sheriff's department and juvenile officers are continuing to investigate an altercation that took place at the Fairgrounds Wednesday night. It sent two 16-year-old boys to a local hospital with injuries.

The boys have been identified as Michael Colton of Dillard, who suffered a blow to the stomach but was released after treatment, and Robert Barter of Roseburg, who suffered facial cuts and was held for observation, according to information learned by The News-Review.

Involved also was a third person and possibly a fourth, who reportedly inflicted the injuries on the two boys.

The fight took place at the dance for teenagers at the Fairgrounds about 10 p.m. The cause and circumstances are still being investigated.

Douglas County Fair Manager Bert Allenby today commented that the altercation was regrettable and that every effort would be made to prevent such occurrences.

He said, however, the fact three or four individuals became involved in an unpleasant circumstance would not in any way change plans for the fair or scheduled events. He said most of the young people conducted themselves in fine manner and had a good time, and he hopes they continue to enjoy the fair activities. The dance proved a popular spot the opening night of the big event.

Local Man Gets 90 Days For Immoral Practices

John Aaron Caudill, 24, of Roseburg, was convicted on a charge of immoral practices in a Roseburg Municipal Court trial Wednesday.

Judge Warren Woodruff sentenced him to 90 days in the city jail and fined him \$500, but Caudill filed immediate oral notice of appeal to Circuit Court, and he was continued free in \$500 bail bond.

Caudill was accused of entering a residence on NE Nash St. in the early hours of July 14 while uninvited and making immoral advances toward a young housewife.

The trial was before the judge without a jury. It opened about 10:30, and the verdict was rendered just before noon.

Frank E. Williams

Frank E. Williams, 90, of Green, died Wednesday at the Riverside Sanitarium at Roseburg after a short illness.

He was born Feb. 6, 1873, at Canton, S.D., and came to Oregon in 1890, living in the Grants Pass vicinity until 1908, then coming to Glendale. He lived there until two years ago when he moved to Green. He had been a lumber grader, and was a member of the Glendale Presbyterian Church.

Survivors are a son, Vernon A. Williams of Myrtle Creek; two grandchildren; and a great-grandchild.

Graveside funeral services will be held Saturday at 1 p.m. at the Hillcrest Memorial Cemetery at Grants Pass. The Rev. Richard Rohrbach of the Tri-City Presbyterian Church will officiate. Ganz Mortuary of Myrtle Creek is in charge of arrangements.

Condition Of Driver 'Fair' After Accident

Earnest Eugene Goin, 39, of Rt. 1, Box 98E, Sutherlin, is reported in fair condition, today at Douglas Community Hospital, after the car he was operating went over a steep embankment on the North Bank (Wilbur-Glide) Road Wednesday.

State police report the accident occurred about 11 p.m. 2.6 miles east of Wilbur. He was operating a 1949 model car and traveling west. The car rounded a right hand curve, skidded for 57 feet and went over a steep rock bank, coming to rest on its left side. The car was "totaled," police said.

Bond Vote Sought For Reedsport Jail

The Reedsport City Council this week voted to seek a \$47,500 bond issue for the construction of a jail and police station attached to, and using part of, the present Community Building.

Plans prepared and presented by Fred Kruse of Kruse and Fitch, architects, for a 30 by 60-foot addition to the community building for six jail cells, a drunk tank, bull pen and other facilities, were approved by the council after considerable discussion. Considered was an alternate plan for a separate structure near the present Fire Hall at a cost of \$8,000 more than the plan adopted. The costs include \$35,000 for the jail addition and \$12,000 for remodeling the Community Building for police station offices, correspondent Dawn Pescau reports.
