

Stuart Keeps Promise, Paces Yankee Killing

Smoldering Dick Stuart is so burned up that he's just liable to foul up the whole World Series.

He's carrying on a whacky one man crusade to annihilate the Yankees all because their manager, Ralph Houk, passed him up for the American League All-Star team last month.

"I'm gonna try to beat their brains out every time I play against them," Stuart proclaimed.

"Let him try," Houk sniffed.

Stuart not only tried Wednesday but succeeded handsomely as he pounded out six hits and drove in as many runs to help the Red Sox sweep a day-night doubleheader from the Yankees, 14-7 and 5-4.

The big outpoken Boston first baseman hit Houk where it hurt the most.

With the Yanks leading 5-2 in the opener, Stuart singled off the left field wall with the bases full to drive in the lead runs during a seven-run fifth inning explosion.

He then blasted a two-run homer in the eighth inning of the nightcap and that blow turned out to be Boston's winning margin. The home run was Stuart's 29th, tops in the AL, and his 84 runs batted in also lead the league.

Pitcher Homers

Bill Monbouquette picked up his 15th victory in the opener with help from Jack Lamabe, who slugged a three-run homer in the seventh. Rookie Dave Morehead won his seventh in the nightcap although chased in the ninth when the Yanks scored all their runs. Ralph Terry (13-12) and Jim Bouton (15-6) were the losers.

Butts' Reputation Considered 'Bad'

ATLANTA (UPI) — Two university presidents, one of whom already has said that he considers the reputation of Wallace Butts "bad," are scheduled to testify today in Butts' \$10 million libel suit against the Saturday Evening Post.

The college presidents are Dr. O. C. Aderhold, president of the University of Georgia where Butts carved out a career of nearly 25 years as coach or athletic director, and Dr. Frank Rose, president of the University of Alabama.

Aderhold and three members of Georgia's athletic board testified Wednesday as rebuttal witnesses for the Post in the trial which is now well into its second week. The Post claimed that Butts conspired to rig the 1962 Georgia-Alabama football game.

All four, under questioning by Post attorney Welborn Cody, testified that Butts' character was "bad." One of them, Harold Heckman, said he wouldn't believe Butts under oath.

Gambler's Story Awaited

Cody said he will continue with rebuttal witnesses today in the federal court suit and that he will introduce the long-awaited deposition by Frank Scobey, a Chicago beer distributor who once told a Senate racket committee that he placed bets on horse racing and football games.

Cody told the 12 businessmen making up the jury at the trial's onset last week that he will prove that Butts associated with "known gamblers."

William Schroder, chief counsel for Butts in his fight to restore the luster to a nationally known coaching reputation that elevated him to the presidency of the Football Coaches Association, said that he will call Dr. Rose as a rebuttal witness.

Both sides in the courtroom drama have rested and are putting the final touches to their cases with the rebuttal witnesses. Actual testimony could end today, with summations and court charges coming up Friday.

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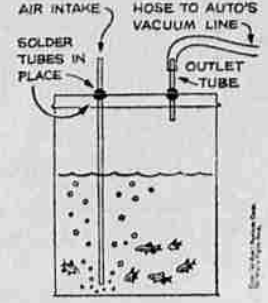

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Packers Seek 3rd Straight NFL Crown

GREEN BAY, Wis. (UPI)—The Green Bay Packers, minus two regulars and plus a new "man-on-the-move" offense, set out this fall to win an unprecedented third successive National Football League playoff championship.

Only the Packers in 1929, 1930 and 1931 have ever won that many consecutive titles in the NFL and that was before the playoff system was inaugurated in 1933.

Coach Vince Lombardi, who has yet to experience a losing year despite taking over a team that had won just one of 12 games this year before he arrived in 1959, had two immediate problems to solve when practice sessions started a month ago.

—He had to replace Paul Hornung, the league's "Mr. Everything" who was banished by Commissioner Pete Rozelle for at least a year because of gambling.

—He had to replace veteran defensive end Bill Quinlan, who was traded to Philadelphia by way of New York after a run-in with Lombardi on the West Coast last fall.

Lombardi admits Hornung can't be replaced as such, so he's revamped his offense slightly to both deal with that problem and give fullback Jimmy Taylor a lighter share of the offensive load.

Taylor, the NFL's top scorer and ground gainer last year, seems to have recovered from a winter bout with hepatitis, but has been hampered during the exhibition season by a sore knee.

Uses Multiple Flankers

The new offense, which is basically just a throwback to the old double wing, involves multiple flankers and a man in motion. The fullback lines up behind the quarterback and both halfbacks flank wide. One of the halfbacks can go in motion and come back to the quarterback where he would be the play develops.

"We used it once last year," Lombardi said. "We'll see how far it goes this year."

That doesn't mean Lombardi is junking his famous "big back" offense. Tom Moore and Earl Gros both can fill the halfback spot as runners, but their passing is in doubt. Elijah Pitts and Lew Carpenter could be sleepers.

Pitts doesn't fulfill Lombardi's requirement for a "big back" at just slightly more than 200 pounds, but the speedster from tiny Philadel Smith College would be the ideal halfback in the man-on-the-move offense.

Carpenter also isn't big, but he can throw the option pass, and despite the offensive revamping, the run-pass option still looms big in the Packers plans. Hornung was a master at executing that play.

Replacing Quinlan could be tougher. Henry Jordan, a perennial all-pro tackle candidate, has worked out at end. But Lombardi would be happier if Urban Henry, a transplant from the Los Angeles Rams, or rookies Lionel Aldridge of Utah State or Tony Liscio of Tulsa could take over.

Henry and Ron Kostelnik, a reserve defensive tackle, have occupied Jordan's tackle spot.

Linebacker, usually a strong point, may need bolstering and Lombardi looks to either Dave Robinson, the No. 1 draft choice from Penn State, or Ken Iman, a reserve center, to help there.

There's a battle-royal underway for top pitching honors in the Pacific Coast League.

The latest statistics showed that Howie Reed, Spokane right-hander, still tops the circuit but he's being challenged by Ray Rippel, moyer, of San Diego.

Both men pitched for their respective teams Wednesday night. Neither lasted with Seattle deciding Ripplmeyer and the San Diego Padres 7-2. Reed got off the hook after being touched for five runs as Denver and Spokane went into extra innings with the Indians finally winning 7-6 in 10 after the Indians took the first game of the twin bill 8-1.

In the Southern Division the Alfonso-Cason act continues with Dallas-Ft. Worth moving into the lead by one-half game by virtue of its double victory over Oklahoma City, 2-1 and 5-1. Tacoma downed Salt Lake City 6-4 and Hawaii came from behind to clip Portland 7-3.

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Opens Today

Six State Champions Battle For Trip To World Series

All-out warfare is scheduled to explode today at Legion Field as the first round of the Western Regional American Legion baseball tournament gets underway.

Six state champions are shooting for the crown and a trip to Keene, N.H., to compete in the American Legion Little World Series.

The opening battle began at 1:30 p.m. with Cheyenne, Wyo., taking on Selah-Naches, Wash. At 6 the Fort Richardson Polar Bears of Anchorage, Alaska, will clash with the powerful Lewiston, Idaho, club, while the final game of the opening round will feature the two tournament favorites, Billings, Mont., and Lockwood Motors of Roseburg. The final game tonight will start at about 8:30.

While the host Roseburg nine and Billings enter the tourney as the favorites, none of the six teams can be counted out. Lewiston is making its third consecutive bid for a regional title and the Alaskan team is back in the playoffs after winning its second straight state crown. Washington and Wyoming are known for sending rugged teams to the playoffs, and both bear close watching again this year.

Roseburg's impressive 47-9 season record sends it into the tournament as one of the top choices for the title. The Lockwood Motors crew has a topflight pitching staff led by lefty Ran Cool with a 14-1 record and right-handed Dick Williams with a 12-2 mark. Rogelio Gutierrez sports a 5-0 mound record and Ron Westbrook has won nine outings against only two setbacks.

In the hitting department the local powerhouse has only two regulars hitting above the .300 mark. Catcher Jim Beamer is clouting the ball at an impressive .355 and has driven in 48 runs. Centerfielder Bob Manning packs a .306 average and leads the team in the power department with nine homers. Williams is the only other player over the .300 mark, hitting at a .303 clip.

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
