Housing Plat Gets Go-Ahead

The Reedsport City Council this week gave tentative approval to the preliminary plat for the initial group of the 200-home-site Forest Hills development of International Paper Co. The plat had been approved earlier by the City Planning Commission, with 36-foot street width standards stipulated.

Salient features approved include the rescinding of the city ordinance which had provided for a preferential tax rate for the Forest Hills subdivision when the owner and developer was John Hubbard, before IP purchased the tract. The council approved an alternate plan for the financing of the water system installation which provides for reimbursement of the water installation cost borne by the developer at the rate of \$100 per developed lot.

The action disposed of the test case in which the city had filed suit for a declaratory judgment after the county assessor had refused, on constitutional grounds, to levy such a tax. City attorney William Jayne reported that the Circuit Court had declined jurisdiction in the case, and that it would have been heard in the State Tax Court had the suit been pushed.

The water system is to be installed by the Reedsport City crew, under a contract being entered into by IP and the city. The system will include the water mains for the lower Umpqua Hospital.

Work on the water installation is expected to start in about 30 days, and the houses, to be built under contract, to be completed about Jan. 1. Stone said that the company expects to have their employees on the job early in January. The initial project will include about 66 homes.

In other action, the council instructed City Recorder Irving Johnson to write a letter to the Douglas County court inviting the county to survey the possibility of a landfill garbage disposal area in a low gap in the Schofield district east of Reedsport. More than 1,000 signatures are expected to be secured soon on a petition for the disposal area, it was reported.
