

State, Metro Units Ready For Grid Classic

"Football's finest hour" will be unveiled Saturday at Portland's Multnomah Stadium when 54 Oregon prep all-stars display their talents in the 16th annual Shrine game.

The game, played on a State vs. Metro basis is a benefit for the Shrine Hospital for crippled children. Preceding the game at 7:30 p.m. will be the pageant featuring hundreds of uniformed marching groups. Kick-off time is set for 8:30.

Working through daily double practice sessions for the majority of the past two weeks, both teams are reportedly ready for bone-crushing action.

Sore muscles, bruises and minor injuries received early in the practice schedule seem to be healing and enthusiasm in both camps is running high.

State will be seeking to even the series and will be after its first clear-cut victory since 1956. The closest the State team has come since the '56 victory was a 19-19 tie in 1961.

Reports from the State camp indicate that this could be the year. Head coach Fred Spiegelberg of Medford, with assistants Roy Thompson of Roseburg and Spike Hillstrom of North Salem, have whipped the State All-Stars into a smooth-working offensive unit and have developed a tough defense spotlighting mobility and skill.

Paul Brothers, Roseburg two-time all-state and All-America quarterback, has been busy displaying the poise that earned him recognition as the Indians marched to the 1961 state championship and reached the quarterfinals in 1962.

Brothers has been tabbed as the best prep quarterback seen since the days of Terry Baker, and in many quarters you can find those who rate him even higher than the Oregon State star that won the Heisman Trophy for '62. The talented Roseburg field general has an uncanny sense of balance, looks like Van Brocklin on the hand-offs and threads the needle with his aerials.

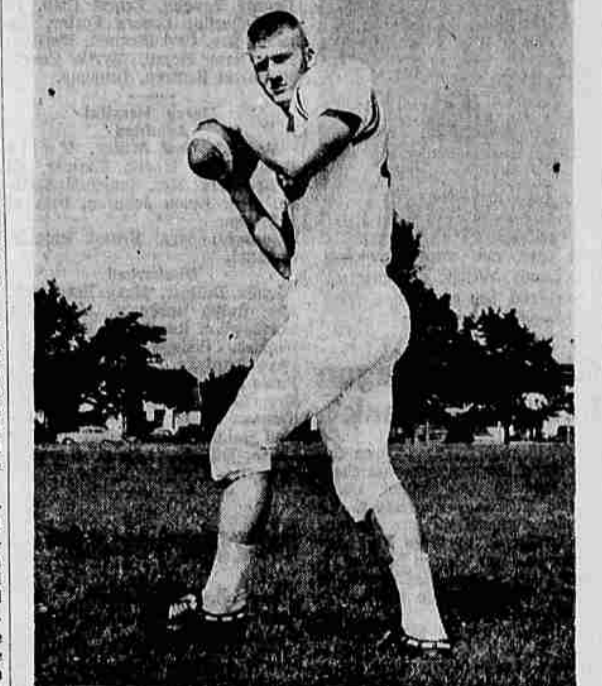

Favorite target in drills for Brothers' passing has been Steve Bunker, Pendleton. Lloyd Hammons, Medford, has been working at the other end spot, with Roseburg's Spike Moore and Bob Shepard, Grants Pass, set to relieve the starters.

Along with Brothers, the State 11 has another talented signal caller in the form of Dan Miles, spark-plug of the Medford team which he directed to a state championship.

Sharing the spotlight with Brothers during the drills has been another Roseburg star, Doug John, a bruising 225 pound tackle, has been called the "best lineman in the state," and there is plenty of evidence to back up this statement.

During prep play last fall few teams tried to run John's side of the line, and those that did found they were running against a stone wall. In addition to having the

Terry Baker Gets First Go At Pro Football Saturday

ORANGE, Calif. (UPI)—Calm, self-assured Terry Baker, the most honored college football player in the nation last season, says he has a great feeling of curiosity on how he will react in his first pro football game.

And the 22-year-old Heisman Trophy winner and All America quarterback from Oregon State probably will get his chance to take his first dip into the pro football caldron Saturday night when the Los Angeles Rams meet the Minnesota Vikings.

"I have no idea how tough it is going to be until I try it," the articulate rookie quarterback said at the Rams training camp. "But I am very anxious to find out what it's like working with top men and against top men in the pro ranks."

Baker, however, was quick to deny that he was worn out and underweight even before making his pro debut.

"I was a little tired and underweight after the basketball season ended," Baker agreed. "After all, I got a late start on the basketball team because of the Liberty Bowl game, and then we were lucky enough to get into NCAA playoffs which extended the basketball season."

"But I've gotten some rest, even though I've been working hard since I came to camp, and I'm close to the weight I carried playing football last season, around 190 pounds or so."

Coach Harland Svare withheld Baker from the Rams' first exhibition game a week ago against the Dallas Cowboys because he felt that Roman Gabriel was handling the team well and Baker had been back with the club less than a week after the All-Star game at Chicago.

"Terry has shown us a lot of poise in the short time he has been with us," Svare commented. "He learns quickly and his passing is sharp. We are very pleased with the progress and the ability he has shown."

Svare cautiously said he would be governed by the situation in the Minnesota game in determining when and how long he will use Baker. Next week Baker is expected to start when the Rams meet the Dallas Cowboys in Portland.

John and Brothers will serve as captains of the State team in Saturday's game. Other starters named by Spiegelberg to date are Russell Packer, Ontario, tackle; Larry Zeller, South Salem, and Howard Phillips, South Salem, guards; and Dan Clark, North Salem, center.

Brothers, John and Moore are among the nine stars from the Midwestern League that are set for action in the grid classic. Others include Al Ellstrom, North Bend; Jim Lockard, Bob Officer and Tim Warlick, all of South Eugene; and John Mahaffy and Ernie Manders, both of Marshfield.

While Metro does not boast a quarterback like Brothers, it has a couple of capable stars in the form of Barry Nordoff of David Douglas and Tim Jones of Oregon City. Both Nordoff and Jones throw well enough to keep the opposition honest.

On the ground the Metro 11, coached by Bob Hull, has top threats in Tom McAllister, Jefferson, Ron Delplanch, Hillsboro, Pat Casey, Jesuit, and Ron Koenig, Milwaukie, just to mention a few.

Up front the Metro club has plenty of weight and will present a formidable forward wall. David Douglas' Larry Pierson tips the

scales at 245 pounds and will be the biggest player in the game. Pierson works as a tackle slot.

Tickets for the game are on sale at J. K. Gills in downtown Portland and at Stevens and Son Jewelers in the Lloyd Center and Salem. General admission tickets will be sold at the Stadium starting at 9:30 a.m. the day of the game.

Walt Alton undoubtedly will be delighted to know that two of his old buddies, Ed Roebuck and Don Zimmer, are performing exactly like pennant winners with Washington.

And the Dodger skipper also may break out in cheers to learn that another of his ex-employees, big Stan Williams, suddenly has become one of the hottest pitchers on the Yankees' staff.

Combined Efforts
Roebuck and Zimmer, each of whom send Alton best regards, combined their efforts Thursday to produce a 5-4 victory for the Senators against the Angels.

Zimmer had two hits and drove in two runs while Roebuck registered his first American League victory during a four-inning relief stint.

Williams, coming off a one-hitter in his previous start, fired a six-hitter against the Red Sox and struck out seven as he hurled the Yankees to a 10-2 triumph. The former Dodger right-hander got most of his help from Johnny Blanchard.

Blanchard, subbing for the injured Roger Maris in right field, drove in six runs with a grand slam homer and a two-run homer.

Linz Had Three
In addition to Blanchard's two blasts, Phil Linz, filling in for Tony Kubek, collected three of the Yankees' 13 hits, and part-timer Hector Lopez contributed a double and two singles. Boston's only extra base blow was Dick Stuart's 30th homer in the ninth inning.

Minnesota bombed Baltimore 13-3, and Detroit crushed Kansas City 11-1 in the only other American League games scheduled.
