Mahoney Urges Special Session

SALEM (UPI) — Sen. Thomas Mahoney, D - Portland last week urged a special legislative session be called so the 1963 Legislature's \$69 million tax increase package could be referred to the people for an election.

Mahoney, who said he voted for the tax measure, said he had signed a referendum petition in Portland.

He said he feels the people should have the right to vote on the measure, and that delaying tactics have hampered efforts to circulate referendum petitions.

Mahoney said he was writing Gov. Mark Hatfield, urging that the governor call a special session.

Mahoney said he would urge the legislature to repeal the recently enacted law, then to enact the same law again with a November referendum clause, so the people would have to vote on it before it could become law.

Mahoney indicated he doubted if petition circulators would be successful in getting the measure referred because of the delays before petition circulation could begin.

BPA, Idaho Town Sign Power Pact

PORTLAND (UPI) — Bonneville Power Administration officials announced recently they have signed the first contract for electricity with a southern Idaho municipal utility.

The contract, the tenth to be negotiated by BPA since it was declared the marketing agent for federal power in southern Idaho, is with the village of Heyburn.

BPA Administrator Charles F. Luce said the pact will save the Heyburn utility \$54,969 a year.

Harold Hurst, president of the utility's board of directors, said a rate reduction will be considered "after the village has had an opportunity to review the impact of the wholesale power costs on the electrical operations and expenses."

Registration Set For Junior Highs, Elementary Schools

Douglas High School will hold registration for students Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 26-27, announces Principal Norm Bergstrom.

The schedule calls for juniors and seniors to register March 26 and freshmen and sophomores on March 27. The fee will be \$15 for students, except that boys taking physical education will have an additional \$2 fee for uniforms.

Bergstrom urges all students who possibly can to pre-register during the days designated, to get this out of the way prior to the opening of school Sept. 2.

Students will check their schedules, pay their fees and be assigned books on the registration days.

Bergstrom said that the cafeteria will charge 30 cents for school lunches on a cash basis this year.

Oakland Lamb Claims Top Price

A 92-pound market lamb which won a grand championship in 4-H stock competition Saturday brought probably the highest price ever paid for an animal at the Douglas County Fair.

The lamb, owned by Tom Ocum-paugh of Oakland, was sold for an eye-popping price of \$3.95 per pound as the highlight of the Rotary Club's 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Auction Saturday.

The Four Winds Restaurant paid a total price of \$363.40 for the well-groomed lamb, which had been dropped in January.

High Price Paid

Four Winds also paid a high price for Karen Dancer's 854-pound grand champion steer. The Myrtle Creek girl's fat Aberdeen Angus, which had also been proclaimed a grand champion in the 4-H division, brought 89 cents per pound—a total price of \$760.96. This price per pound was more than twice that paid for any of the other beef.

The champion market hog was claimed by Bashford Feed and Seed of Roseburg at a price of 63 cents a pound for a total of \$115.29. The 183-pound hog was owned by Tom Woodruff.

Almost \$7,500 was paid for the 58 animals put on the block. This total included \$1,233.05 for 15 hogs; \$1,421.38 for 30 market lambs; and \$4,324.08 for 13 beef animals.
