

Idaho Raps Washington To Remain In Title Race

Lewiston, Idaho, wrote a one-way ticket home for the Selah-Naches, Wash., American Legion Juniors from the Western Regional tournament Saturday.

Classy fielding and effective pitching by John Hamilton and Jerry Chavez accounted for Idaho's 9-4 triumph which eliminated a powerful Washington entrant from tournament play.

Hamilton worked the first six and two-thirds innings before the 12-inning rule in any 72-hour period caught up with him. Chavez then came on to protect the win for the Selah-Naches. While in the game Hamilton scattered six hits, struck out six and walked four.

The winners got the jump in the second inning when a walk, a sacrifice and a bad-hop single accounted for a run. In the third another runner touched the plate as Jim Smith led off with a base rap, stole second, moved to third on a ground

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GB Packers Win; Viks Bomb Rams

Last winter's pro football betting scandals apparently haven't curbed the fans' appetite for the sport.

Despite the absence of suspended Paul Hornung and Alex Karras from the 1963 National Football League scene, a total of 179,305 turned up for last Saturday night's exhibition action.

A doubleheader at Cleveland drew 83,218 spectators who watched Y. A. Tittle set up three touchdowns on passes as the New York Giants defeated the Detroit Lions, 24-21, and Johnny Unitas tossed two scoring strikes in the Baltimore Colts' 21-7 victory over the Cleveland Browns.

The champion Green Bay Packers routed the Dallas Cowboys, 31-10, before 53,121 in the Texas City, and 42,966 saw the Minnesota Vikings romp over the Rams, 27-3, at Los Angeles.

In American Football League pre-season games, the Kansas City Chiefs trounced the Oakland Raiders, 35-21, before 13,500 at Seattle, Wash., and 11,135 fans at Denver viewed the Broncos' 31-35 win over the San Diego Chargers.

Equally large crowds are expected for seven NFL exhibition games this weekend. On Saturday, Dallas meets Los Angeles at Portland, Ore.; Detroit plays St. Louis at Omaha; Green Bay faces Chicago at Milwaukee; Philadelphia tussles with Washington at Charlotte, N. C., and Baltimore tackles Pittsburgh at Atlanta. On Sunday, San Francisco entertains Cleveland, and Minnesota hosts New York at Minneapolis.

In the American Football League, San Diego is at Houston for a Thursday night game.

Billings Ousts Polar Bears In 10-4 Victory Saturday

Billings, Mont., came through with flying colors to eliminate the Fort Richardson Polar Bears of Anchorage, Alaska, then handed Roseburg its first loss in the Western Regional American Legion baseball tournament being played at Legion Field.

Saturday the powerful Montana champs banged out 5 hits to topple the Alaskan entry by a 10-4 count. Sunday saw Billings grab a 10-inning win over Lockwood Motors of Roseburg, 5-4, to keep its tournament hopes alive—if not take the driver's seat in the race for the crown.

White Billings was shining on the field, the display of pure "guts" by Alaska starter Tom Parker stole the show. The little lefty started on the mound with what was thought to be a badly sprained ankle. However, after five innings the ankle was so bad that Parker could barely stand and he was removed. The ankle was x-rayed and found to have a broken bone. The injury had occurred in an earlier game when Parker was playing right field.

Against the spunky Alaska nine, Billings picked up single runs in the first, third and fourth innings, then iced the game with a three run rally in the fifth.

In the fifth inning the big Billings bats came to life to pound out one third of the total base raps. Dale Sciley led off with a single and was advanced to third when Roger Brautigan doubled. Dan Sciley then lashed his third consecutive single of the game to bring his RBI total for the night to four.

Following a pattern set early in the tournament, the Polar Bears did not break the ice until late in the game—picking up runs in the seventh, eighth and ninth frames. In the eighth a walk issued to Dick O'Neil, a triple by Terry Gose and a wild pitch gave the Alaskan champs two runs.

Dave Konzen went the distance for Montana to pick up his ninth win of the year. Konzen had the Alaskan batters hitting at his fielders, striking out eight, walking two and hitting two batters.

At the plate Dan Sciley set the pace with a 3-5 record and four RBIs. Mike Wheeler also had three hits for the winners.

Montana Hands Roseburg First Tourney Loss, 5-4

Roseburg's bid for the Western Regional American Legion baseball crown suffered a setback Sunday when an inspired Billings, Mont., crew handed the Oregon champs their first loss.

Tonight Lockwood Motors will be out to make sure the setback was just temporary, meeting Lewiston, Idaho, for the right to play Billings again Tuesday night for the title.

Billings pushed across a single run in the top of the 10th inning of the tension-packed thriller to bump Roseburg from the driver's seat in the Regional playoffs with a 5-4 win.

The victory was sweet revenge for the Montana team, as its only loss was in the opening round to Roseburg, 8-4.

Deadlocked at 4-4 all at the end of the regulation nine innings, Billings made short work of the tough task in the extra frames. Tom Kennedy led off the 10th with a sharp single to right field. After one out, Kennedy was sacrificed to second by a strategy move by Roseburg.

A strategy move by Roseburg came as Bill Glennon, sporting a perfect 3-3 record at the plate for

the game, was intentionally passed, bringing John Hiltz to the plate. Hiltz came through in the clutch with a base rap by the outstretched glove of the shortstop and Kennedy came around with the deciding run.

It appeared that Roseburg might come-from-behind once again in the bottom of the 10th when Artie McDonald led off with a walk. Bob Manning then drilled a grounder through the box that had base hit written all over it, but a spectacular fielding play by Montana shortstop Dale Sciley cut McDonald down and dashed the hopes of the more than 2,600 fans. Dale Sciley dove for the ball behind second, coming up with the sphere and shovelling it to second baseman Roger Brautigan for the force. The next two batters fanned and the game was over.

Les Rohr, the ace southpaw of the Montana staff, came on in the fifth inning with two away and received credit for the win. In five and a third innings, Rohr struck out 13 and was tagged for only one hit. However, five walks, three in the eighth, gave the fire-baller some trouble.

Walks were also the downfall of starter Hiltz who gave up three hits, one a double by McDonald after the bases were loaded on walks in the fifth frame.

Ran Cool was saved when Roseburg tied the game in the eighth inning and Rojelio Gutierrez was charged with his first loss of the season. Cool pitched only four innings, and was trailing 4-0 when Gutierrez took over. The Glendale right-hander was a little slow in getting started before he settled down and tossed five innings of scoreless ball.

Montana took the advantage in the second when Mike Wheeler walked, moved to second on a ground out and scored on Glennon's first base hit of the game. In the third a triple by Dale Sciley and a single by Brautigan gave the Billings team another run.

Two counters crossed the plate for the winners in the fourth. Kennedy led off with a walk and was sacrificed to second. Glennon beat out an infield hit as Kennedy moved to third. Hiltz then sent a deep shot to right-center which Manning chased back near the wall, pulled up a little short and saw the ball pop out of his mitt as the two runners raced home.

In the bottom of the fifth Roseburg took advantage of Hiltz' lapse of control to stage a three-run rally. Mike Markham led off with a walk, and with one away Jerry Boucek and Gutierrez loaded the bases as they waited out the Montana hurler for free passes. A strikeout accounted for the second out, and it looked like the threat might be halted.
