

# Roseburg Legion Climbs Into Regional Title Battle

## Lewiston Loads Bases In Ninth, But Williams Strikes Out Two

Going down to the wire, Roseburg's American Legion Juniors reached the finals of the Western Regional tournament at Legion Field by eliminating a stubborn Idaho representative from Lewiston.

After a five-run explosion in the second frame, the Roseburg crew found the going rough as Lewiston battled back to within two runs of the winners going into the final stanza.

**Bases Loaded**  
The Idaho champs loaded the bases with one out in the bottom of the ninth, and Roseburg fans all but quit breathing. However, Dick Williams who had come on in relief of Ran Cool in the seventh came through in grand style as he sent Dennis Leffler and Garry Jones down swinging to end the game, with Roseburg leading, 6-4.

When the roar of the crowd subsided the Oregon tilts were making plans for tonight's championship game against Billings, Mont., with Williams back in his usual role as a starter.

Roseburg and Billings take identical 3-1 records into the decider.

The local crew handed Billings its lone loss in tournament play in the opening round, 8-4, while the Montana powerhouse nipped Lockwood's Sunday, 5-4, in a 10-inning thriller.

Game time tonight for the decider is 8.

**Blomberg Scores**  
Mike Blomberg collected the first home run of the Western Regional tournament to climax a five-run rally staged by the winners in the second inning Monday.

With one away in the second, Lance Casebeer drilled a single on the ground over second base, and when the ball was bobbled in the outfield, he continued on to second. After the second out, Dave Sevall came through with a clutch single to score Casebeer from second. Jerry Boucock was safe on an error and Cool singled to make the score read 2-0 in favor of Roseburg.

At this point Blomberg stepped to the plate, watched one strike sail across, then picked on the next offering by Idaho's Bob Kidwell. He drilled the ball over the second baseman—a line shot that traveled to the wall some 410 feet from home plate. While the outfielders were chasing the ball, Blomberg was rounding the bases to cross the plate standing.

**Errors Hurt**  
Despite some shaky control, Cool managed to get by until the sixth inning—then errors spoiled his shutout. In that frame, Lewiston started a two-out rally after Jim Naslund worked his way for a walk. Steve Arnold was safe on an error and Ron Tierney singled to load the bases. An easy grounder to second baseman Mike Markham off the bat of Dennis Leffler should have ended the inning, but Markham couldn't find the handle and all hands were safe.

Roseburg got the run back in the top of the seventh when Cool led off with a single, and Blomberg and McDonald beat out perfect bunts down the first and third base lines, respectively, to load the sacks with no outs. Kidwell came through for Idaho as Oregon managed to push across only one run—that coming on Jim Beamer's sacrifice fly.

**Roof Caves In**  
In the bottom of the seventh the roof caved in on Cool, and after three runs had crossed the plate Williams was called on to put out the fire.

Wayne Adams beat out an infield single to start the rally. Cool's control vanished, and Jim Smith and Jim Minnette drew free passes to load the bases. Cool got

Jim Naslund to pop up to the first baseman, but fed the wrong pitch to the next batter. Arnold came around dead-center and sent the ball sailing deep into center field for a three-run triple. When the next batter walked Williams came on and got Leffler to hit into a fielder's choice to end the inning.

Williams was in complete control in the eighth, but ran into hot water of his own in the heart-stopping ninth inning finish. Minnette led off with a walk and Naslund singled through the box. The latter was forced at second by Arnold, and Tierney watched ball four sail by to load the bases. At this point Williams returned to form to end the game with two strikeouts.

Cool had his share of trouble in which time he tossed 141 pitches. Through the ace lefty struck out 12, he issued seven walks and was tagged for three hits. Williams struck out five and walked three.

**Control Good**  
Kidwell had perfect control during his seven-inning mound performance, but was hit hard as Lockwood's connected for 10 blows. The loss is Kidwell's third, and his second to Roseburg. Cool now sports a spectacular 16-1 record.

At the plate Blomberg's homer stole the show and was one of two hits for the Drain leftfielder. Bob Manning, Dave Sevall and Cool also had two hits each. Lewiston's four hits were scattered among four players.

The lack of hitting punch for Lewiston accounted for its downfall. The Idaho champs had plenty of runners on base—leaving 13 stranded—but could not come through with the timely hits. As a result, Idaho finished third in the six-team tourney and will leave for home today.

## Terry Baker Returns Home To Direct LA Rams' Attack

PORTLAND (Special)—And now comes Terry Baker!

The most honored athlete in Oregon's history and the most honored collegiate football player in the history of the game returns to Multnomah Stadium Saturday night.

He will be with the Los Angeles Rams when they collide with the Dallas Cowboys in Portland's second National Football League preseason contest. Game time is 8:30 p.m.

Because of Baker's magnetic box office appeal, Oregon Sports Attractions confidently expects to break all attendance records for a pro game in Oregon.

Capacity at Multnomah Stadium during baseball season is slightly more than 28,000. The all-time record is 29,122 for the game between the Rams and Chicago Cardinals

in 1952, but with standing room this figure could be eclipsed.

Although they are looking for a capacity house, OSA officials have emphasized that there are still about 5000 reserved seats available and that general admission tickets will not go on sale until 9 a.m. Saturday.

Baker won so many honors and established so many records in his career at Oregon State that it would take an IBM machine to keep count. Probably the two most important were his selection as winner of the Heisman Trophy as the best football player in the country and being named Sportsman of the Year by Sports Illustrated magazine.

Baker made his pro debut with the Rams last Saturday against the Minnesota Vikings and he is earmarked for action against the Cowboys Saturday night.

## Klamath Falls Due To Play Tilt Today

## Butts Wins Big Libel Suit

ATLANTA (UPI)—A federal court jury today awarded former Georgia Athletic Director Wallace Butts \$3,000,000 in damages for a national magazine story that said he gave away football secrets.

The rosy pony former Georgia football coach broke down when the decision was announced.

The Saturday Evening Post, in its March 23 edition, said Butts divulged vital Georgia team secrets to Alabama Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant prior to the 1962 Alabama-Georgia game.

Alabama, a 17-point favorite, won 35-0.

A 12-man jury of businessmen—which had listened to nine days of testimony in the case—filed into the court room at 11:28 a.m. EDT, after almost 7½ hours deliberations.

**Judge Warns Spectators**  
The jury said it found in favor of Butts in his suit against the Post for its article entitled "The Story of a College Football Fix."

The jury awarded Butts \$60,000 in general damages and said he was entitled to punitive damages of \$3 million.

Before the jury was admitted to the courtroom, U. S. District Judge Lewis R. Morgan warned spectators who filled three-fourths of the room that he would tolerate no demonstrations. He said of the trial jury would be dealt with severely.

The jury, which was locked up Monday night after failing to reach a verdict, resumed its deliberation today.

The verdict came after seven

hours and 18 minutes deliberation.

**Post Plans Appeal**  
Clay Blair Jr., editor-in-chief of the Saturday Evening Post who testified that his magazine had embarked on an editorial policy of "sophisticated muckraking" said he was "disappointed with the verdict and we will certainly appeal."

Butts had sued the magazine for \$5 million in general damages and \$5 million in punitive damages, awarded in cases where malicious intent is proved.

Butts denied—once in tears—that he gave away secrets, and demands \$10 million in damages from the Curtis Publishing Co.

The 12 jurors, none of whom played college football, received the case at 4:02 p.m., EDT, Monday. Morgan told them the story was libelous on its face, and in order to win its case the Post had to prove it was true.

Morgan, in his 38-minute charge to the jury, said the jurors had to bring in a verdict in favor of either Butts or the publishing firm. In the event of a verdict

It was 5-0 when the roof fell in and Tacoma scored four times. Bill Hain homered with two aboard in the eighth, but Hawaii tied it up when Spanky Kirkpatrick hit a two-run belt in the bottom of the eighth.

Charley Dees finally ended the contest when he doubled home Ron Samford in the 11th to hand the win to Al Thomas and the loss to Ron Herbel.

But Belinsky emerged with his 2-0 record intact and the Hawaii management can be happy that it has a real gate attraction in Belinsky.

Elsewhere around the league Monday night, San Diego's Ray Rippelmeyer put on a hitting and pitching show as San Diego blanked Spokane 4-0.
