day, the president of the American Society of Animal Science emphasized this week at Oregon State University.

Dr. L. E. Hanson of the University of Minnesota noted that only about half as many students are graduated each year as are needed to fill positions in agriculture and industries related to agriculture.

For many of these employment opportunities, a rural background is a distinct asset, he observed. However, the percentage of students going on to college from rural farm areas is about half that from metropolitan areas.

A 1961 Minnesota survey of high school youths showed that only 28 per cent of rural farm youths were intending to enroll in college, compared to 43 per cent for non-farm, non-metropolitan youths, and 56 per cent for metropolitan youths, Hanson reported.

The net result is a terrible loss to the individual and society, Hanson insisted. He urged members of the Society to help stimulate interest in higher education among farm youths.

Hanson's address came at the end of the Society's 55th annual meeting in Corvallis. It was the first time that the Society had met outside Chicago since 1920.

Dr. Clair Terrill, U. S. Department of Agriculture research work-

er at Beltsville, Md., was elected to succeed Hanson as president.

Research in America has grown tremendously in the past 10 years but "germs of problems" exist which could become serious "if we are not alert to them," Hanson cautioned.

Scientists are most concerned about the possible loss of, or failure to recognize and develop, the individual genius in our large, highly-organized research projects that have sharply defined goals, he said.

The system commonly used by agencies in granting funds to individual scientists instead of to the institutions in which they are staff members has had the effect in some cases of "eroding university responsibility and shifting faculty loyalty away from the institution and toward the agency," he also noted.

Steps are being taken now which can restore balance and strengthen university responsibility and control over its activities, he indicated.

More than 700 scientists from throughout the United States and Canada attended the national meeting. The Oregon State University Department of Animal Science was host. Dr. James Oldfield of OSU is secretary-treasurer of the 2600-member Society.

### 4-H Horse Show Planned For Fair

There will be a 4-H Club Horse Show at the 1963 Oregon State Fair.

That's the word from Glenn Klein, Oregon State University state 4-H agent, after receiving clearance from the state veterinarian.

The show had been in doubt until a few days ago because of the recent outbreak of equine influenza in the state.

However, the number of cases is declining and state officials feel that the show can now be held, Klein said.

It is hoped that all counties will be represented, even though several county 4-H horse shows were cancelled. Counties are being encouraged to re-schedule their horse shows or to make some other arrangements by which their young men and women can be represented in the event, the state agent said.

For the first time this year, the state 4-H Horse Show will be a regular part of the Oregon State Fair program. Horse shows are planned for both Friday and Saturday nights, Sept. 6 and 7. Last year, 4-H horsemen held their statewide event the day before the fair opened.

The two evening shows will be in addition to the regular horse demonstrations, showmanship contests and the "Dad Potter" horsemanship tryouts, Klein noted. A special

trail horse class exhibition to increase the public's knowledge of these horses is planned, he added. Other special events may be added later.

Boys and girls participating in the 4-H horse events can bring their animals on the Salem fairgrounds Sept. 6 between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. No horses will be accepted before 10 a.m. that day, Klein stressed.

### Parochial Schools Set For Sept. 3 Opening

Both of the parochial schools in Roseburg, the Seventh-day Adventist School on Umpqua St. and St. Joseph's Catholic School, will open on Sept. 3 along with those of the public school system.

According to Inez Hitchman, spokesman for the Seventh-day Adventists, classes will be moved from the old Umpqua site in a couple of months upon completion of the denomination's new school on Garden Valley Blvd.
