



South Guards Against Break

The last few columns have covered favorable assumptions from Marshall Miles' new book "All Fifty-two Cards." Declarer must find certain cards where he wants

nicely. Another type assumption is the pessimistic outlook. The contract looks easy, so you start to guard against bad breaks.

Now let's see what can happen to you at five hearts. The contract looks pretty good. You have lost the opening spade but can ruff your other spade and if trumps break favorably you will make an overtrick.

You also have no worries about a 3-1 trump break. You will only make five odd if you don't pick up the queen, but five is all you have bid.

How about four trumps in one hand. East almost surely won't hold them, but maybe West will. Can you do anything about this? Yes, you can.

You win East's club lead with your queen and lead a heart. Then you finesse dummy's jack. If the finesse loses you will still make your contract. Actually it wins, but East shows out. Now you cash the king of hearts, get back to your hand with a diamond, ruff your last spade, and lose a trump trick in the cool of the evening.

Suppose that East had led a spade at trick two? You should ruff in dummy, return to your hand with club or diamond, and take the heart finesse just the same in order to guard against that bad trump break.

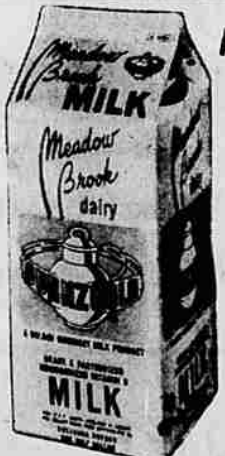

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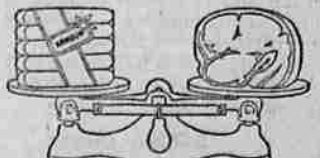
