

Odds Weigh Heavily For Senate Ratification Of Test Ban Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Nuclear scientists were split today in their testimony on risks involved in the limited test ban treaty, but odds still weighed heavily for Senate ratification.

The three-committee group considering the pact called two former Atomic Energy Commission members and an ex-White House disarmament adviser to testify today.

The group was scheduled to

meet at 10 a.m. EDT. Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, former AEC chairman, and Willard F. Libby, also a retired AEC member, headed the witness list along with Harold E. Stassen, one-time disarmament adviser to President Eisenhower.

But the record of treaty endorsements was cracked a little wider by testimony from a second nuclear expert who joined Dr. Edward Teller in warning

that the pact might "hurt" the United States.

The "no" was voiced by Dr. John S. Foster Jr., director of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory at Livermore, Calif. He testified Wednesday that from "purely technical-military considerations the treaty appears to me to be disadvantageous."

Foster said one of his "starkest" worries was that the United States would not be able to "proof-test" its weapons systems for lack of atmospheric tests — particularly as they related to anti-missile defense and protection of U.S. missile sites.

The Teller-Foster arguments were attacked forcibly by two other top nuclear experts — Dr. Harold Brown, research-engineering chief for the Defense Department, and Dr. N. E. Bradbury, director of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., chairman of the disarmament subcommittee and a member of the foreign relations committee, said Brown and Bradbury delivered "powerful" evidence to contradict Teller.

Brown said the treaty banning all but underground tests would reap military benefits for the United States even if Russia should cheat. He also said most of the problems involved in developing a missile defense system would not be solved by further testing.

Bradbury said that down through the years he had disagreed with many of Teller's professional opinions. He said the treaty had only "mild risks," and added:

"If now is not the time to take this chance, to count on this hope — what combination of likely circumstances will ever produce a better time? I, myself, with considerable knowledge of nuclear things, with some things, with some knowledge of their military use, but with only a plain citizen's feelings about people and nations and hopes and fears, would prefer to try to follow the path of hope."

Accused Check Forger Requests Preliminary Hearing In Court

John Howard McCool, 34 of Prescott, Ariz., asked for a preliminary hearing Wednesday when arraigned in District Court on a charge of uttering a forged bank check.

The accused is charged with presenting a forged bank check in the amount of \$100 to Jean Smith. According to the complaint, the check was written on the Myrtle Creek branch of the U.S. National Bank, made payable to the defendant and signed "P. J. Barnett."

McCool was represented by attorney George Wetum. Bail set at \$3,000 was not posted and the defendant is being held in the Douglas County jail.

In another District Court action, Donald Lyle Crosier, 19, of Rt. 2, Roseburg, asked to see an attorney when brought before the court on a charge of "wilfully and maliciously setting fire to the forest."

A complaint by the Douglas County Sheriff's Department charges that the defendant on Aug. 16 maliciously set fire to grass land north of Roseburg along the Del Rio Road "in such manner that the fire could be communicated to the forest, woods, timber, brush and slashings." Bail was set at \$2,500.

A second complaint filed in District Court charges Crosier with larceny of personal property valued less than \$75. A complaint by Lloyd C. Leonard charges the defendant with the theft of gasoline on Aug. 20 from Riverside Motors.

Bail on this charge was set at \$200. No bail was posted and the defendant is being held in the county jail.

Also in District Court, John David Mathis, 73, Rt. 4, Box 635, was fined \$100 and costs after pleading guilty to a Roseburg state police complaint charging him with operating a vehicle on a suspended operator's license. Execution of the sentence, however, was suspended permanently.

King Says Bombings May Result In New Race Riots

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. said Wednesday there may be "a terrible race riot" in Birmingham, Ala., unless persons responsible for recent bombings are brought to justice.

"There have been 48 bombings since 1946 and nothing has happened to bring anyone before the bar of justice," King said at a news conference before a scheduled speech to the National Insurance Association, an organization of Negro insurance men.

The home of attorney Arthur Shores was bombed in Birmingham Tuesday night, bringing 2,000 angry, rock-hurling Negroes to the scene. Shore, a long-time court battler in Alabama integration cases, guided the admission of two Negroes to the University of Alabama.

"Unless this bombing is solved, it will encourage mobsters and others to continue the same kind of acts," King said. "I would say that in the very near future there could be a terrible race riot in Birmingham."

"The thing that concerns me a great deal is that Birmingham has become the center of the greatest history of unsolved bombings in the United States."

Solons Get Rail Dispute Today After New Break In Peace Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The crisis-laden railroad rules dispute was turned over to Congress today following another breakdown in peace talks conducted by Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz.

The Senate Commerce Committee was expected to start serious work today on legislation designed to avert a nationwide rail strike at midnight Wednesday.

The committee was scheduled to meet at 10 a.m. EDT.

Chairman Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., called the group to consider the failure to reach an accord despite tentative agreement on an arbitration plan proposed by Wirtz.

The Cabinet officer told Magnuson Wednesday night the breakdown of negotiations left no immediate prospect of a voluntary settlement before the Aug. 29 strike deadline.

Congress was reluctant to get involved in the four-year-old controversy but appeared to have little choice in view of the collapse of Wirtz' latest mediation effort.

The Senate committee was reported split, 8-8, in favor of President Kennedy's recommendation to give the Interstate Commerce Commission power to approve new work rules that would remain in effect for two years. No strike would be allowed during this time.

Kennedy's plan has been endorsed by the railroads but condemned as a form of compulsory arbitration by the five unions involved in the dispute.

Organized labor is backing an alternative proposal by AFL-CIO president George Meany which would temporarily block a number of rule changes while a congressional committee supervises renewed negotiations.

The railroad spokesmen said they intended to place sweeping

new rules into effect at 12:01 a.m. (local time) next Thursday despite union warning this would trigger a rail strike.

Discussing the breakdown in negotiations, management spokesman J. E. Wolfe said union restrictions on the Wirtz arbitration plan would have destroyed its effectiveness.

Charles Luna, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, said the collapse of peace talks indicated to him the railroads never wanted a settlement but preferred to put the dispute in the lap of Congress.

Magnuson said there was a possibility that legislation could be approved Friday if enough senators were in the city, but he added that the vote was more likely to come Monday. This would give the House three days to act before the strike deadline.

Red China Hits Soviet Military Aid To Indians

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China today denounced Soviet military aid to India as a "sell-out" by the Kremlin.

Russia has sent modern MIG jet fighters to India, which is embroiled in a border dispute with Red China. An Indian military mission recently spent several days in Moscow negotiating for more help.

Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said last week the Chinese are massing troops near the border for a possible new thrust into Indian territory similar to that of last autumn.

Communist China's leading official newspaper, the Peking People's Daily, said today Russia's relations with India have become "extraordinarily intimate."

"The Soviet leaders have been more absorbed than ever in their anti-China alliance with U.S. imperialism and the Indian reactionaries since they made that dirty political deal—the tripartite (partial nuclear test ban) treaty —with the United States," the paper asserted in an editorial.

"This is not just a 'new chapter' in Indian-Soviet relations," the editorial added. "It is also a new chapter of collaboration between the Soviet leaders and U.S. imperialism to ally with India against China."

The editorial was quoted by the New China News Agency in a broadcast monitored in Tokyo.

Sutherland Board Awards Bids

Bid openings for fuel oil, gasoline, milk and roofing were among the chief items of business at the regular school board meeting this week for the Sutherland District.

Standard Oil Co. submitted the winning bids for two kinds of unrefined oil at .1319 and .1178, and Ethyl gasoline at .2318 per gallon. Union Oil Co. won the fuel oil bid at 3.08 per barrel, FOB Coos Bay.

Medo-Land Creamery Co. was low bidder for milk at .064.

Roofing bids for replacement and repair were submitted by four firms. Acme Roofing Co. of Roseburg submitted the low bids and after some discussion was awarded the bids as follows: High School, \$3300; high school shop, \$797; Nonpareil, \$480, and East School \$412. Flat roofs on the high school and shop buildings will be of glass felt and the sloping roofs at Nonpareil and East Elementary are to be of composition shingles.
