Khrushchev Predicts Capitalism's Demise

SPLIT, Yugoslavia (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev predicted today Communist mass production would team up with the workers of the world "to bury capitalism."

"Victory will be ours and the greater our production the greater will be our victory," the visiting Kremlin leader told 1,000 cheering shipyard workers under a broiling sun at this Adriatic port.

"If you do not have assembly line production you will never beat capitalism," he said.

"Facing the representatives of the capitalist press, I say we will beat you and beat you with better organized production. We will not bury you with a shovel but the working class will bury you."

Shipyard workers responded by chanting, "Khrushchev... Khrushchev is here."

The Soviet leader, enroute to the Adriatic coast before joining President Josip Broz Tito for three days of talks on the island of Brioni Sunday, called on Yugoslavia to join other Communist nations in an economic battle to "overwhelm" capitalism.

He said, "I am very pleased that the Yugoslav government has shown readiness to take part in the socialist division of labor."

By this, Khrushchev meant that Belgrade will cooperate with other Eastern European nations to coordinate production and eliminate waste and duplication.

"Perhaps we should agree more extensively so that each country could produce a specialized type of model of a ship, according to its ability," he said.

"If you do not have assembly line production, you will never beat capitalism. Facing the representatives of the capitalist press, I say, we will beat you and beat you with better organized production. We will not bury you with a shovel, but the working class will bury you."

Khrushchev spoke from an improvised platform under a broiling sun. Vice President Aleksander Rankovic stood behind him on the dais.

In an evident reference to Red China, he said it takes more than name-calling to defeat capitalism. "Capitalism will be impressed

HOPE TO FOOL STORM

New 'Seeding' Try Slated For Beulah

MIAMI (UPI)—Scientists in instrument-packed planes planned to breach the 100 mile an hour winds of Hurricane Beulah again today for another "seeding" experiment.

Beulah, second tropical storm of the season, howled in the open sea on a north-northwesterly course that kept it clear of the Caribbean Islands. Forecasters said the storm's path also leaves the U. S. mainland out of danger.

In a 5 a.m. EDT (6 a.m. EDT) advisory the Miami Weather Bureau located Beulah near latitude 23.5 north, longitude 59.5 west, or about 700 miles south-southeast of Bermuda.

"The hurricane should continue drifting northward today and probably begin a turn to the northeast Sunday. This will carry the hurricane far to sea and it will not affect the U. S. mainland," the Weather Bureau said.

A twin-engineered Navy A3D jet carried out the first experimental seeding of Beulah at mid-afternoon Friday, dumping about 200 pounds of silver iodide crystals into the twister from 35,000 feet.

"Nothing spectacular happened. We didn't expect it. This was a small-scale experiment," reported Dr. Robert H. Simpson from Puerto Rico. Simpson directed the seeding experiment on the scene for the National Hurricane Research Project, based in Miami.

Simpson and Cecil Gentry, head of the project in Miami, emphasized the seeding experiments are small-scale and not intended to make any appreciable change in Beulah or other storms picked for similar experiments.

Silver iodide is used for the seeding, Gentry explained, because its molecular structure is similar to that of ice crystals. The silver iodide crystals thus can "fool" the storm into forming ice from some of its colder moisture.

This, said Gentry, when done properly at the right spot in a hurricane may rob a storm of its crucial heat energy and lead to its breakup.

Kennedy Pins Aid Bill Hope On Senators

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy today pinned his hopes on the Senate to reverse one of his worst legislative beatings of the year by restoring the aid bill to the House-approved foreign aid bill.

In a stinging defeat Friday, the House passed a Republican-sponsored cut of \$385 million in the aid program.

Tied to committee slashes of about \$400 million in the authorization bill, the cuts amounted to almost \$1 billion and cut the bill's final total to \$3.5 billion for the current fiscal year.

Kennedy's reaction was quick. He termed the House cuts "short sighted, irresponsible and dangerously partisan." In some of his bluntest language ever on a congressional issue, Kennedy said the cuts played into the hands of the Communists.

Sixty-six Democrats joined forces with 156 Republicans in approving the cut in a maneuver that was directed by GOP foreign aid foes. The vote was 222-182.

Police Return Murder Suspect

PORTLAND (UPI)—Robert J. Evans, 26, Honolulu, was returned here early today to face a first degree murder charge in the death of Irene Davis, 41, Payette, Idaho.

Evans was returned from Fremont, Neb., by Portland police after he waived extradition. He arrived with Detective William Taylor on a flight from Omaha.

Mrs. Davis was strangled to death in a room at the Portland Hilton Hotel. She was found Aug. 6 by a hotel maid. A nylon stocking had been twisted around her neck and her partially clad body was in a bathtub in about six inches of water.

Evans was questioned by police shortly after he arrived, but officers said he was close-mouthed and said he would not talk until he had consulted an attorney.

Evans was arrested in Fremont last Monday after police spotted his car as one described in a police bulletin. Evans had lived in Fremont several years ago.

Evans was arrested at the home of a friend, T. A. Roach, who said he had become acquainted with the wanted man when Evans attended school in Fremont in the early 1950s.

Officers said they found a ring in the car driven by Evans which matched the description of one known to belong to the slain woman.

Locals Will Meet Omaha In Opener

Roseburg will play its first game in the American Legion Junior Little World Series at Keene, N.H. Sunday when they face Omaha, the region's six champions.

Game time is 4:30 p.m. (Roseburg time) and the radio broadcast is scheduled to start about 4:20 or 4:25 p.m.

Coach Bill Harper is expected to start lefty Ran Cool or right-hander Dick Williams against the Bishop Ryan High School squad from Omaha. Roseburg's Lockwood Motors have a 51-10 record going into the game, while Omaha is 34-5.

Oregon Delegates Split Vote On Foreign Aid Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Oregon's four representatives were split along party lines Friday as the House, on a 222 to 188 roll call, voted to cut the foreign aid bill by \$385 million before passing the measure on another vote.

Voting for the cut was Republican Walter Norblad and casting their ballots against it were Democrats Edith Green, Al Ullman and Robert Duncan.

Drills Bore Slowly Toward Three Trapped Coal Miners

HAZLETON, Pa. (UPI)—Drillers completed the first phase in widening a 308-foot escape shaft to David Fellin and Henry Throne today in renewed efforts to rescue the trapped miners this weekend.

They halted the 26-inch drill at the 308-foot mark at 11:47 a.m. EDT and rescue experts conferred about the next step—whether to widen the remaining portion of the shaft to 24 inches or 17½ inches.

They ordered the first 38 feet lined with steel tubing to prevent a cave-in.

Rescuers, however, continued to drill a three-inch shaft to Louis Bova, 42, a third miner trapped about 18 feet from the other two. It took drillers four hours and 17 minutes to widen the first 38 feet of the escape shaft to 26 inches.

Officials estimated that widening of the shaft to Fellin and Throne would be completed between 7:30 p.m. and 11:30 p.m. EDT Sunday night.

The 26-inch bit, which weighs 2,000 pounds, normally turns at 1,750 revolutions per minute. But for this operation, it was slowed drastically to prevent a cave-in, and rescuers with shovels worked continuously to clear the face of the shaft of dirt and rock thrown up by the bit.

Today's drilling began at 7:30 a.m. EDT after a rubber, metal and wooden "plug" had been lowered 297 feet—almost to the bottom of the hole.

The plug, designed to prevent dust or debris from falling on Fellin and Throne, had been meticulously trimmed to fit the hole. Atop it was poured 900 pounds of quick-drying cement.

Officials planned to bore about 45 feet toward Fellin and Throne with the 26-inch bit, then to stop and confer on their next step. The 12-inch hole needs to be widened only to 17½ inches, the outer diameter of a custom designed escape capsule in which the two men are to be rescued. A 17½ inch bit is available.

Rescuers Design Capsule
The bullet-shaped capsule, 6½ feet long and 15½ inches wide on inside, is to bring the men out, one by one, as it is raised and lowered on cables. It was designed by three of the men at the rescue scene and made of rolled steel.

If the reaming operation proceeds without delays, it could be completed within 24 to 30 hours. Then the capsule could be brought into play.

The probe which hit the two miners' prison was hailed as "miraculous" by one official (it was the third try), and brought jubilation satisfaction to a crowd the surface.

Danger Still Present
But H. Beecher Charnbury, state secretary of mines, cautioned that the situation now is "just as dangerous as it has ever been." Gordon Smith, another rescuer, added, "We're not over the hill yet. There still is some risk."

Workers trimming the rubber edges of the plug worked meticulously, though the reaming operation awaited only the plug. "We haven't run into trouble," one of them said, "but we want to make sure this plug is 100 per cent foolproof."

Fellin, 58, and Throne, 28, exhausted by Friday's work, told those above at about 2 a.m. EDT today that they were going to sleep. On the surface, two groups of workers silently labored—one over the plug and the other about five yards away at the attempted probe to Bova.

Other work stopped for what

some called a wasted hour and a half Friday night while a closed circuit television camera was lowered down the 12-inch hole to take pictures of the two men for medical examination—and to survey the walls and sturdiness of their niche.

Only Fuzzy Image
The camera produced only a fuzzy image of Fellin, plus what some thought was Throne's mustached visage. Officials reported

dolefully that "The test didn't give us any information."

The 12-inch hole reached the chamber containing Fellin and Throne at about 3:30 p.m. Friday. Its success was signalled by Throne's words, heard clearly on loudspeakers at the surface: "It's through, the hole is drilled out."

The breakthrough has followed an excruciating last hour, in which the drill inched delicately

into the roof of the chamber at a speed by which one worker said "you could shave." At the surface, the drill had hacked out as much as 30 feet an hour.

Fellin's wife Anna, 47, who had been keeping a quiet vigil by the rescue scene for eleven days, wept quietly when she was told the probe had succeeded. "Thank you, Lord," she whispered. "No one in the world is happier. I am the happiest."

MARTIAL LAW GRIPS SAIGON

Mass Student Demonstrations Bring Order Closing Schools

SAIGON (UPI)—The military governor general closed Saigon University and all private and government-operated schools in this strife-torn capital today after defiant students staged a mass demonstration against the government's anti-Buddhist crackdown.

Gov. Gen. Ton That Dinh, named under a martial law decree, issued a communique broadcast over the military radio ordering the schools closed as of noon today until further notice.

The communique was issued after about 1,000 pro-Buddhist students of Saigon University demonstrated on campus in a move indicating that students were becoming the spearhead of opposition to the government following the arrest of Buddhist leaders.

The military radio also broadcast appeals to the students to be calm.

Anti-Government Declaration
A leader of the student rally read an anti-government declaration charging "the government under the leadership of Ngo Dinh Diem has trampled on our religious freedom and hampered the anti-Communist war efforts."

"Communism and dictatorship are enemies of the people," the resolution added. It called on the government to:

- Respect and protect the people's religious freedom.
- Stop arresting the terrorizing Buddhists.
- Grant all freedoms to the people.

Police roughed up some of the demonstrating students but avoided a direct clash with them.

A speaker at the student gathering on the law school campus was former Foreign Minister Vu Van Mau, who shaved his head like a Buddhist priest and submitted his resignation Thursday in protest against the government's anti-Buddhist policy.

"My position as foreign minister ended with my shaved head," Mau told the students who cheered thunderously.

The official Viet Nam news agency, however, reported that Diem refused to accept Mau's resignation and, instead, offered the foreign minister a three months' "official leave" to make a pilgrimage to India.

The official agency added that Truong Cong Chu, secretary of state for social and cultural affairs, who is a Roman Catholic like the president, had been appointed acting foreign minister. Mau announced his approval of the students' anti-government declaration after it had been read to a student rally in the main conference hall.

One of the students in the crowd had his head shaved like a Buddhist priest. Others vowed to do so later.

The students then smashed up some of the tables in the conference hall, but they dispersed when Mau told them to do so.

Berliners Bluff Way Over Wall

BERLIN (UPI)—Three East Berliners bluffed their way to the Berlin wall, then scrambled over it safely under Communist gunfire, West Berlin police said today.

Two of the men were given hospital treatment for wounds caused by barbed wire but none of the three was hit by border guard bullets. The three men, aged 20, 28, and 31, escaped shortly after 8 p.m. Friday.

One of the men was a bulldozer driver working in a construction site on the East Berlin side of the wall, near a walled-off bridge leading to the American sector district of Neukölln.

After quitting time Friday night he returned with two friends. All three were wearing boiler suits and they carried a case of tools.

They told the East German patrol they were repairing the bulldozer.

Two of the Communist guards stopped for a long conversation with them. Finally one of the guards moved away.

The escapees overwhelmed the second guard, dashed on to the bridge, and scrambled over the wall. As they fought their way through the barbed wire on top, the guards discovered the attempt and fired three or four salvos from their machine.

However, none of the estimated 20 shots found their mark and the escapees tumbled into West Berlin.

The Communists did not fire into West Berlin territory after them, police said.

The U.S. Army today sent five convoys along the autobahn between West Germany and West Berlin in a periodic demonstration of access rights.

Berlin-based troops were returning to the city after live firing training in West Germany.

The 670 officers and men drove over the 110-mile East German highway in 119 trucks and jeeps. They had "no trouble" with Soviet control officers on the autobahn checkpoints and "the movement was quite routine," an Army spokesman said.

Roseburg Teachers To Rally Monday For In-Service Meet

Discussion of curriculum development and the growing Oregon Program in the Roseburg School District will be a high point of the upcoming Roseburg Public Schools In-service meeting scheduled Monday.

Speaking on the subjects will be Harry Jacoby, assistant superintendent of the district, and coordinator of the Oregon Program. More detailed discussion of the curriculum development will follow for teachers of each grade later in the morning.

The training meeting will start at 9 a.m. at Fremont Junior High School.

After the morning session, each principal will meet with his faculty in his own school building.

Tuesday at 2 p.m., an orientation session is scheduled for all

teachers new to the district, at Fir Grove Elementary School.

In a progress report on the Oregon Program, Jacoby says the program is gaining speed this year. The district has had a number of teachers and administrators attending workshops during the past year. Eighteen attended workshops at the University of Oregon, eight went to Salem for an elementary team teaching workshop and eight to Portland for a secondary workshop.
