D'Ann Due For Some Exciting Activity Prior To N.J. Event

Roseburg will be getting a full measure of representation in the national spotlight during the next two weeks.

Next week, the city will be represented by its Legion Junior baseball team at the national playoffs in New Hampshire. And before the dust clears on the diamond, Roseburg's fairest beauty will be moving into the limelight at Atlantic City, N. J., for the Miss America contest.

Roseburg's own D'Ann Fullerton, who was crowned Miss Oregon at Seaside a few weeks ago, will vie with more than 50 other girls for the most coveted beauty crown of them all.

Five days of parading before the judges in Atlantic City, N.J., starting Sept. 2, will determine who is the fairest in the land. Each girl competing in the contest has been picked as the most beautiful, talented and poised young lady from her area. And of course, the hopes of Oregon, and especially Roseburg, will go with D'Ann as the best of them all.

The preliminaries for D'Ann's departure for the East started last week when she went to Portland for fittings of the special wardrobe she is to wear in the contest. The Portland company sponsoring the wardrobe for Miss Oregon, also had D'Ann model.

The store's bridal consultant and wardrobe coordinator for the past several years for the Miss Oregon entries, Edie Wright, will accompany Miss Fullerton to Atlantic City, together with her mother, Mrs. Clyde Fullerton, and a family friend, Mrs. Joe Barnes.

The following Saturday night she will make a final appearance before the judges with all of the other contestants. It is then the judges will select ten finalists. Miss America will be named from the finalists.

D'Ann says that whether she wins or not, she's thrilled just to go. "It won't hurt my feelings a bit if I don't win. Just representing Oregon is honor enough." She says she's looking forward to meeting the other girls.

Two of the contestants she has already met. D'Ann made an official appearance as Miss Oregon at the Washington contest last month. There, she met the newly elected Miss Washington and Miss Alaska.

She has also made several other appearances as the official reigning beauty of Oregon, including cutting the ribbon on the new Portland First National Bank building, lighting the candles on the huge Lloyd's Center birthday cake, and attending a Christian Women's luncheon with last year's Miss Oregon, Marty Wyatt. She also met Gov. Hatfield and presented him with tickets to the Regional Legion Junior baseball tournament, which Roseburg won.

With the Miss America crown will go many awards, but if she doesn't win that title, she still won't go away empty handed, or without something to remember about the most important time of her life. A mink stole can make a girl remember a lot, and that was one of the prizes she won as the Miss Oregon winner at Seaside. In addition to the stole, she was awarded a \$1,000 scholarship, a \$1,500 wardrobe, and a \$500 fashion award to pay for the Miss America contest evening gown.

Her whirlwind trip will get under way when she leaves for Portland Monday to board a plane for New York City. She'll spend approximately four days there before going on to New Jersey.

While in New York, D'Ann will have a chance to do some sight-seeing and appear on the coast-to-coast television show "To Tell The Truth."

As D'Ann explains it, she will appear with several other girls before a panel on the TV show, and they will try to determine which girl is Miss Oregon.

When the contest gets underway in the famous boardwalk city, D'Ann will make appearances to display evening gown, bathing suit and talent. The performance she will give in the talent section of the contest will be the same she did in the local and state contests. It is a baton hula dance routine. The evening gown she will wear has been especially designed for



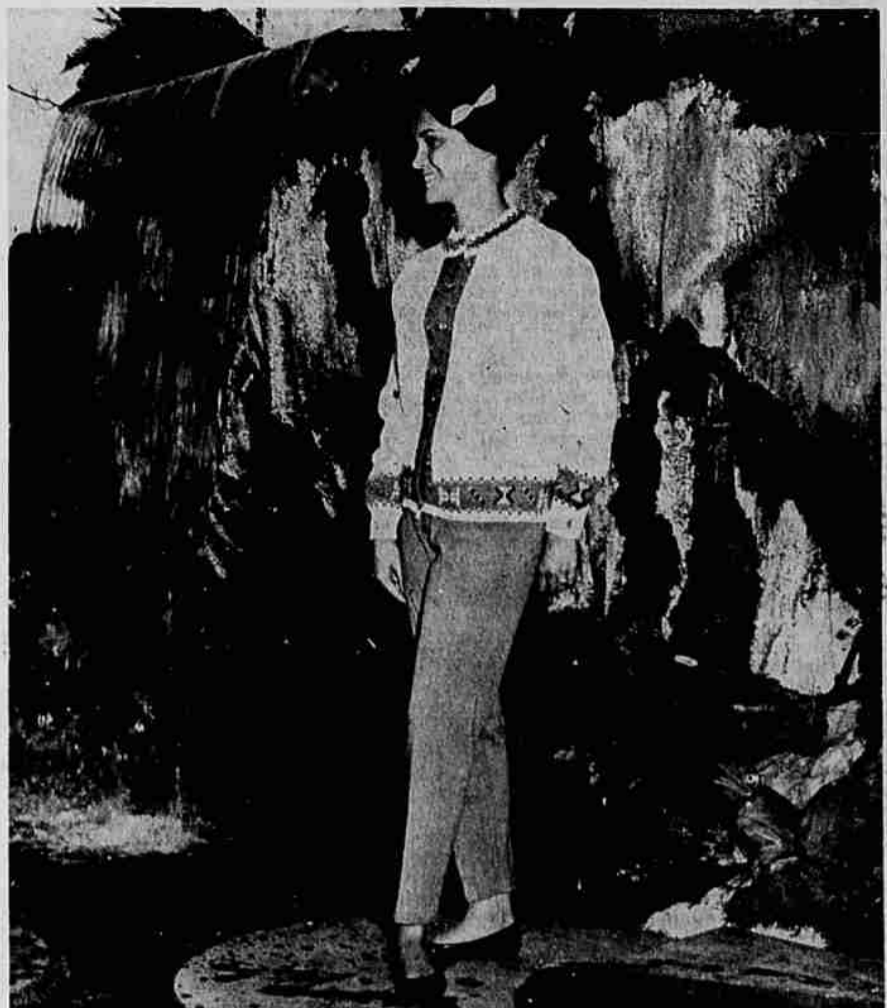

Drive-In Bank Hit By 'Taxi' Bandit

PORTLAND (UPI)—FBI agents and Portland police today looked for a bold bandit who used a taxi-cab to hold up the head office branch of the U.S. National Bank in downtown Portland Friday afternoon.

The man escaped with \$838.

The bandit took the taxi-cab to a drive-in window of the bank, gave a woman teller a note ordering her to give him money and then had the driver take him to Rhodes Department Store.

He then paid his fare and went into the store.

Edward Calkins, 49, the driver, was not aware of the holdup until later when traced by his vehicle's number.

The man was described by Calkins as about 35 to 40 years of age.

A bandit took \$3,871 in a similar robbery last May 20 at a branch of the Pacific National Bank in Seattle.

Stock Sale Stop Issued Against Two Corporations

ASTORIA (UPI)—The State Corporation Commission Thursday issued a cease and desist order against International Transportation Equipment Lessors and Transport Development Association under the securities provision of the commission's laws.

The order was issued personally to the presidents of the corporations, Amos Heacock of ITEL and George Haines of TDA, and the other officials by Harold Lewis, assistant state corporation commissioner in Salem.

The order means the corporations cannot solicit or sell stocks or memberships in either company until they have been registered by the commission, according to Lewis.

The Corporation Commission started an investigation here several days ago, interviewing a number of residents. Tuesday the commission issued a verbal request to Heacock and Haines, asking that they stop selling stock or memberships.

Transport Development Association is an Idaho corporation formed by Haines to promote local development activities. Application was recently filed by ITEL for use of the abandoned Tongue Point naval base as a free port and industrial park.

Training Mishap Kills Reservist

FT. LEWIS, Wash. (UPI)—A Portland reservist was fatally injured in a training accident here Thursday night.

Staff Sgt. Robert L. Wilhoit, 29, Portland, was on two-weeks active duty summer training when he fell from a tree while repairing telephone wires. He was taken immediately to Madras Army Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Sgt. Wilhoit, an insurance salesman in civilian life, was a member of Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 218 Artillery, Portland. He is survived by his wife, Beverly, and four small children.

Physical Exams Set For MC First Graders

Dates for physical examinations for first graders who will enter Myrtle Creek district schools have been set.

Children expecting to attend Tri-City school will have examinations Tuesday Aug. 27 from 9 a.m. until noon at that school. Children attending Myrtle Creek primary school will be examined there Thursday, Aug. 29, from 9 a.m. to noon.

Children must have birth certificates or other proof that they will be six years old by Nov. 15.

Dr. R. E. Williams of Myrtle Creek will be present and will be assisted by county health office personnel. Parents may have the children examined by their own physicians if they wish.

Add Tricks By Thinking

Good defense is far tougher than good dummy play. Somehow or other it is much harder to visualize the division of cards between your partner and the declarer than for declarer to visualize the di-

No! If he had one of them he would have played it when he had the chance.

How about the ace of spades? If South held it he would have held 17 points and opened one no-trump. Hence, East is marked with the ace of spades and a spade shift is clearly indicated.

West shifts to a spade, but if he wants to beat the hand he must lead the king. He continues with the deuce whereas East takes his ace and leads back the suit to give West two more tricks.

West opened the six of hearts and East's king lost to declarer's ace. South led a diamond to dummy jack, then tried the club finesse.

At this point most defenders would simply lead the jack of hearts in order to establish some heart tricks. West was not the ordinary defender. He took time out to think. What did declarer hold for his opening bid? The ace and queen of hearts made 6 points. The king of diamonds made nine and the ace of clubs 13.

Could East hold either the king of diamonds or the ace of clubs?

Actress Gets 3-Year Probation For Forging Drug Prescription

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Actress Marie (The Body) McDonald today began three years' probation for forging two prescriptions to obtain the pain-killing drug percodan.

Superior Judge Donald R. Wright imposed sentence on Miss McDonald Friday. He also fined her \$250. She pleaded guilty to the charge last July 26.

The blonde actress was accompanied to court by San Francisco attorney Jack Ehrlich, who told the judge her physician had given her permission to sign his name to prescriptions when he was not available.

Ehrlich submitted to the court a doctor's report which said the actress was not addicted to percodan or to any other drug. He said she had taken the drug to alleviate pain from ulcers, which caused her hospitalization in Australia earlier this year.

The actress told newsmen she had not taken percodan—an opiate derivative similar to co-
