

AL Pitchers Listen To Booming Bats All Night Long

They started batting practice in the American League at 6 o'clock Friday night and still were at it by midnight.

A barrage of 142 hits, 84 runs and 19 homers rattled off all those lively bats and sent pitchers scurrying for bomb shelters in the seven games played.

The cannonading produced such top-sided scores as the Los Angeles Angels' 17-0 rout of the Washington Senators; the Detroit Tigers' 17-2 shellacking of the Kansas City Athletics; and the Baltimore Orioles' 14-4 assault on the Minnesota Twins.

Detroit and Baltimore won twin doubleheaders, each club winning the nightcap by a modest 6-2 score. In the other games, the New York Yankees drugged the Chicago White Sox, 7-2, to widen their league lead to 11 games, and the Boston Red Sox edged the Cleveland Indians, 3-2, on Lou Clinton's 13th-inning homer.

Russ Snyder of the Orioles and Norm Cash of the Tigers led the homer-hitting with two each. Leon Wagner walloped his 24th for Los Angeles; Jimmie Hall his 23rd for Minnesota; Jim Gentile his 21st for Baltimore; and even 38-year-old Vic Werz of the Twins got into the act with his third of the year.

In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers 6-1; the San Francisco Giants walloped the Cincinnati Reds 11-3; the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-2; the St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Houston Colts 4-1, and the Chicago Cubs edged the New York Mets 6-5.

Ken McBride of the Angels, who finally gained his 13th victory in his seventh try since July 24, benefited from the lustiest batting support — and the best fielding — of the night. While he held the Senators to three hits, the Angels rapped 19 in three, double plays, the six double plays were one short of the major league record set by the Yankees in 1942.

Gonzales Picked 13-5 Over Rivero

NEW YORK (UPI) — Middleweight contender Jose Gonzalez of Puerto Rico is favored at 3-5 to beat slugger Juan (Rocky) Rivero of Argentina tonight in their nationally televised fight at Madison Square Garden.

Gonzalez, 23, and seeking his fifth straight victory, is ranked eighth among 160-pound contenders by The Ring magazine and 10th by the World Boxing Association. Rivero, 25, is not ranked by either.

However, Rivero — the wild-looking "Little Bull of the Pampas" — is the more explosive puncher. He scored an impressive 35 knockouts among his 38 victories in 46 fights. And he never was stopped.

Gonzalez, a slicker boxer and more accurate hitter, registered only six kayoes while winning 25 of his 33 starts. He was stopped twice.

Gonzalez is a heavy favorite because he is the only man who has beaten contender Joey Archer of New York. Moreover, he had stopped the highly touted Rubin (Hurricane) Carter in the sixth round last March 30.

In Rivero's three previous bouts in New York in 1961 and 1962 he looked dangerous but unskilled. He lost verdicts to Billy Pickett and Don Fullmer but knocked out Canadian Willie Greaves.

Tonight's 20-rounder will be televised nationally by ABC at 10 p.m., EDT.

Pott Holds 3-Stroke Lead In Third Round Of Classic

AKRON, Ohio (UPI) — Johnny Pott was making a strong bid today to win his first major golf tournament of the year, holding three strokes lead going into the third round of the American Golf Classic.

The 27-year-old pro, whose last victory was in the Waco Turner Open in May of 1962, was the only golfer able to break par on the long, narrow Firestone Country Club course for two days in a row.

His second round two-under par 68, coupled with his first round 67, gave him a tournament record total of 135 at the halfway mark, three shots better than another 27-year-old pro, Bobby Nichols.

That total was five shots better than Jack Nicklaus, the Masters and PGA champion, and six shots in front of favored Arnold Palmer.

"I just hope I can keep it up," said Pott. "It's time I get back on the winning track."

Palmer Not Optimistic

Palmer wasn't at all optimistic about his chances of repeating. "I'm just not playing well," Palmer said. "I feel fine, but I'm off in my driving and as for my putting — well let's not talk about it."

Nicklaus, who won his biggest golf purse \$50,000 here a year ago

in the World Series of Golf, wasn't happy either although he had shot two par 70 rounds.

"This course is just too tough for me," he complained. He admitted that his driving was making it tougher for Friday he missed seven fairways.

But neither Pott nor Nichols was complaining.

Pott started out with three birdies on the first five holes — two of them on putts of 60 and 55 feet — and had only one bogey, driving the rough on the long par five, 625-yard 16th.

"I was extremely lucky," Pott smiled. "The difference was the putts. I made — especially those two long ones. I'd like to chop up some of those 60 and 55 footers."

Nichols Earns Bonus

Nichols, who two under par 67 was the best second round score and earned him \$500 in bonus money, also wielded a hot putter. He had 10 one putt greens and needed only 26 putts in all.

Four strokes off the pace going into today's televised play were Miller Barber, Bruce Crampton and Dave Hill, all at 139. At 140 with Nicklaus came Open champion Julius Boros, Dave Marr and Gay Brewer.

Palmer was all alone at 141 while there were 11 tied at 142, seven strokes off Pott's lead.

The field was cut to the low 75 and ties — 79 made it in all for today's third round and Sunday's final round. Only six in the starting field missed out, none of them name players.

Today's round will be televised by the American Broadcasting Company from 5 to 6 p.m., EDT. Sunday's round will be televised from 4:30 to 6 p.m., EDT. In the event of a tie after four rounds of play, there will be a sudden death playoff.

Spahn Guns Down LA's Dodgers 6-1; Cards, Giants Win

Versatile Warren Spahn played a Nazi soldier by day and his accustomed role at night and he killed the people with both performances.

The 42-year-old Milwaukee southpaw made his debut as a Hollywood actor Friday and then hurried to the ball park to beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-1, and slice their National League lead to 5 1/2 games.

The fun-loving Spahn said he wasn't sure which gave him the bigger kick.

When he showed up on the set to play a Nazi sergeant in ABC's television "Combat" series, he was given a submachine gun which he grasped in his left hand.

Told to carry the gun in his right hand, Spahn quipped: "I fire better with my left."

That was the hand he used to gain his 16th victory of the season and the 343rd of his career Friday night against the Dodgers.

Scattered Nine Hits

Spahn scattered nine hits, drove in one of the Braves' runs with a sacrifice fly in the sixth, and scored another on Frank Bolling's single after doubling off reliever Larry Sherry in the ninth.

Dead set on winning 20 games for the 13th time in his career, Spahn also came in the first when Tommy Davis singled home Maury Wills from second. The Cardinals took advantage of the Dodgers' loss to gain a full game on them by beating the Colts, 4-1, while the Giants moved to within 6 1/2 games of first place with an 11-3 win over the Reds. The Phillies defeated the Pirates, 4-2, and the Cubs edged the Mets, 6-5.

In the American League, the Yankees increased their lead to 11 games with a 7-2 decision over the White Sox. The Orioles swept a doubleheader from the Twins, 14-4 and 6-2. The Tigers also took two from the Athletics, 17-2 and 6-2, the Red Sox beat the Indians, 3-2, in 13 innings and the Angels swamped the Senators, 17-0.

Gibson Won 14th

Bob Gibson won his 14th for the Cardinals with a five-hitter over the Colts. St. Louis scored all four of its runs off Dick Farrell (10-10) in the first inning. George Altman's two-run double being the big blow. Bill White had four of the Cards' eight hits.

Willie McCovey drove in three runs with three hits while Tom Haller and Chuck Hiller each homered as the Giants used a 16-hit attack to knock over the Reds. Bob Bolin, who relieved starter Jack Sanford in the fourth, blanked the Reds the rest of the way for his eighth victory. Jim Maloney (18-6) suffered the loss.

Dennis Bennett picked up his seventh victory for the Phillies against only two defeats although screwballer Jack Balderson had to throttle a Pirate threat in the seventh.

Wes Covington's 14th homer with one on off loser Don Schwall in the third put the Phils ahead for good and they scored what proved to be the winning run in the fifth on an error by third baseman Bob Bailey. Jim Pagnall homered for Pittsburgh.

Billy Williams hit a pair of two-run homers, his 20th and 21st, and drove in five of the Cubs' runs in their victory over the Mets. Paul Toth, first of three Chicago pitchers, was credited with his fifth win in 13 decisions while Larry Bearnarth dropped his sixth decision against two victories.

Jerry Nelson's No Hitter Stops Salt Lake City 9-1

The big noise in the Pacific Coast League today was the fine pitching performance by Gerald (Jerry) Nelson, 26-year-old right-hander from Oklahoma City who turned in a no-hitter, beating Salt Lake City 9-1.

The 6 foot 3 Beaumont, Tex., hurler, chalked up his 13th victory against five losses as his teammates pounded Dick Lemay and Wayne Carlander for 17 hits, one of them a home run by George Williams in the first inning with nobody aboard. He had four for five for the evening.

Nelson has made a habit of low hit games recently. He had a one-hitter against Denver Aug. 7, a four-hitter Aug. 15 against Dallas-Ft. Worth and worked six innings Aug. 19 to help his club to a 3-2 victory over Denver although he didn't get credit for the win.

The lone Bee run came in the fourth inning when Jesse White walked, went to third on a two-base throwing error and scored on a sacrifice fly.

The victory was Nelson's 10th straight as he faced only 39 men. Spokane snapped a 12 game winning streak for Hawaii, 4-2 to boost their first place advantage to 12 games. Dick Berardino accounted for all the Spokane runs, driving in two with a homer in the second and then singling home the deciding markers in the ninth.

Howie Reed annexed his 10th victory of the season while Eli Grba, just back from the main league, absorbed his sixth loss against seven victories.

San Diego appears to be making its bid for higher honors. The Padres moved into a tie for second place in the southern division with its victory over Tacoma. The loss was the Giants eighth straight as Ted Wills chalked up his 13th victory against nine losses. He went the distance to best Bill Hands. In 1913 in America, golf was a game enjoyed by only rich socialites, but that year England decided to send over its two most famous golfers, Harry Vardon, and Ted Ray, to compete in the United States Open.
