E. Freemont Avenue between N. E. Jackson Street and N. E. Nash Street in the following manner:

1. By grading the street to proper subgrade.
2. By constructing concrete curbs and gutters on both sides of said street 35 feet from back of curb to back of curb.
3. By grading the right of way and surfacing asphalt.
4. By constructing sub-drains.
5. By constructing five foot wide concrete sidewalks on both sides of said street.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City, and the grades, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 12th day of August, 1963, which said grades, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted. The estimated costs to be borne by the City for providing drainage, intersections and engineering are \$27,114.40.

The balance of the costs of said improvements, including interest and other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvements shall be levied upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of the City. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Engineer is directed to give notice of the intention to construct and install said sewer as provided by the Charter of the City.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONSTRUCT A SANITARY SEWER IN THE LOWER HAMILTON STREET AREA
Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held August 12, 1963, the following resolution was adopted: "RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary to construct a sanitary sewer in the lower S. E. Hamilton Street area, partly within and partly without the corporate limits of said City, to be known as the Lower Hamilton Street Sanitary Sewer (Sundale Village) 1963, in the following manner:

1. By excavating a trench to proper subgrade in which to install a sewer pipe and of sufficient width to permit proper installation and inspection.
2. By laying and installing approximately 142 feet of eight inch sewer pipe 245 feet of six inch sewer pipe.
3. By laying and installing approximately ten pipe tees and/or wyes.
4. By constructing approximately one concrete manhole with cast iron ring and cover and one cleanout.
5. By backfilling with suitable material as provided for in the specifications.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City, and the grades, plans and specifications and estimates of the City Engineer filed in the office of the City Recorder, August 12, 1963, which said grades, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held August 12, 1963, the following resolution was adopted: "RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary to construct a sanitary sewer system in the Garden Homes area, to be known as the Garden Homes Sanitary Sewer System 1963, in the following manner:

1. By excavating a trench to proper subgrade in which to install sewer pipes and of sufficient width to permit proper installation and inspection.
2. By laying and installing approximately 1,200 feet of four inch service connection.
3. 731 feet of six inch sewer pipe.
4. 184 feet of eight inch sewer pipe.
5. 727 feet of ten inch sewer pipe.
6. By laying and installing approximately 41 pipe tees and/or wyes.
7. By constructing approximately one concrete manhole with cast iron rings and covers and 2 cleanouts.
8. By backfilling with suitable material as provided for in the specifications.

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Music Hall, New Football Field Big Improvements At Days Creek

At Days Creek School this year it's a toss-up as to which will make the "mostest" students the happiest — the acquisition of adequate space for field sports, or the completion this summer of "Con-fusion Hall" into a choice music center with the addition of its acoustical tile and new storage cupboards.

Noise Was Handicap
Echoc and re-echos of band instruments and choir voices during the past school year while the former play shed was being made over into a music room and small auditorium were a distinct handicap to students and to the director, Boyd Swingley.

An office, kitchen and restrooms have been added, with the entrance door facing south toward the main building, and the two former doors being changed to exit doors. Painting of the exterior will be done after the start of school Sept. 3.

Construction of a long-hoped-for football field on the lower tract near the river on the 13.22 acres acquired earlier in the year has been a major project of the district's summer work program. Grass planting on the field has been delayed until the installation of the new water system which is now being completed for the opening of school. Red's Plumbing of Canyonville is the contractor.

The system will pump water from the South Umpqua River to a settling and storage tank where it will be chlorinated as it enters the tank. It then will be pumped by

pressure system to the buildings and sprinkling system. The buildings have been re-plumbed for the new system, with the former supply from the big spring on the hill being kept for drinking purposes. To relieve the load on the boiler water heating system, an electric water heater has been added for the kitchen and laundry and another for the home economy units.

Fencing In Offing
Fencing of the new acreage will be done right away. An unexpected item not budgeted for was the installation of a complete new drainage field for the septic tank, at a cost of about \$2,000.

An additional water supply for the Tiller School is in the planning stage with the new supply to be added this fall, according to Supt. Gerald Heibel.

Installation of new drain troughs and downspouts on the gymnasium, roof repairs and painting of the exterior of the gym were completed earlier in the summer.

At Tiller the entire exterior of the building was painted, a new roof put on the south wing and acoustical tile installed on three walls of the lunchroom with the room also being repainted. Avery Greenman, custodian, did the Tiller lunchroom work.

Part of the work load at the two schools was contracted and paid by the custodians. At Days Creek, Lee Fisher and Earl Ashbaugh were assisted full time by James Bush and Jack Johnson.
