Some of the best card play occurs in a hand that appears humdrum and prosaic. South played the queen of diamonds from dummy and took

attack hearts immediately. East led the eight of hearts.

South went right up with that ace and cashed the ace and king of trumps. Then he played three rounds of clubs. He hoped that East would ruff the last club, but East stayed out of that trap and merely discarded a diamond.

South got rid of his losing heart, but he still held two diamonds. He led a diamond from dummy, but it did him no good. East won with the jack; cashed his high trump and led a diamond to his partner.
