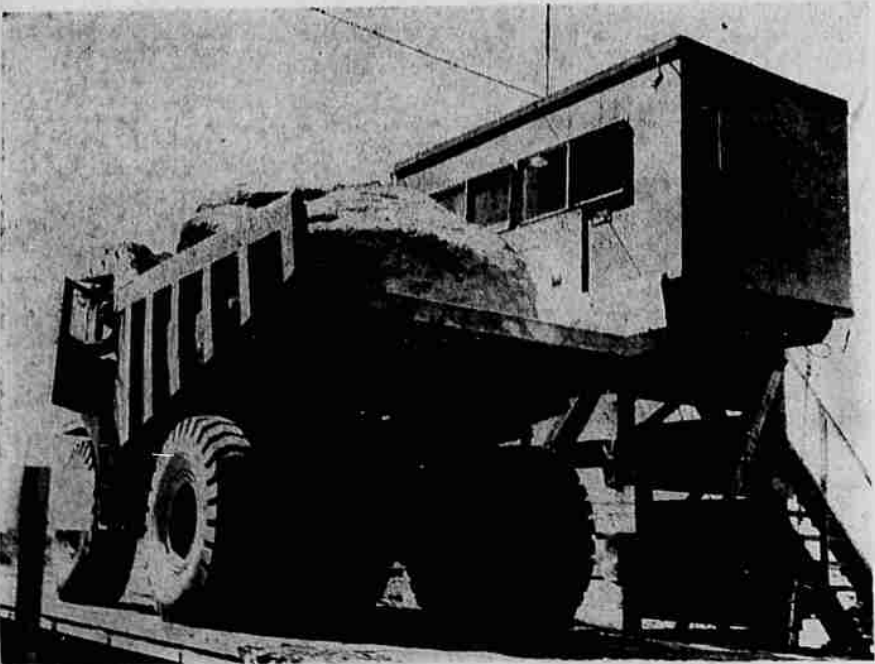

Clatsop Memorial Dedicated Sunday

ASTORIA (UPI)—Fort Clatsop National Memorial was dedicated Sunday by state and national officials at the site of the Lewis and Clark Expedition's winter camp in 1805-06.

Conrad L. Wirth, director of the National Park Service, was the main speaker at the ceremonies. He and Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore., predicted that Oregon would have another park, the Oregon Dunes National Seashore, when this session of Congress ends.

The 125-acre memorial four and a half miles southwest of here became a part of the national park system in 1962. About \$400,000 had been spent on facilities prior to Sunday's dedication. Hundreds of visitors passed through a new museum and the reconstructed park.

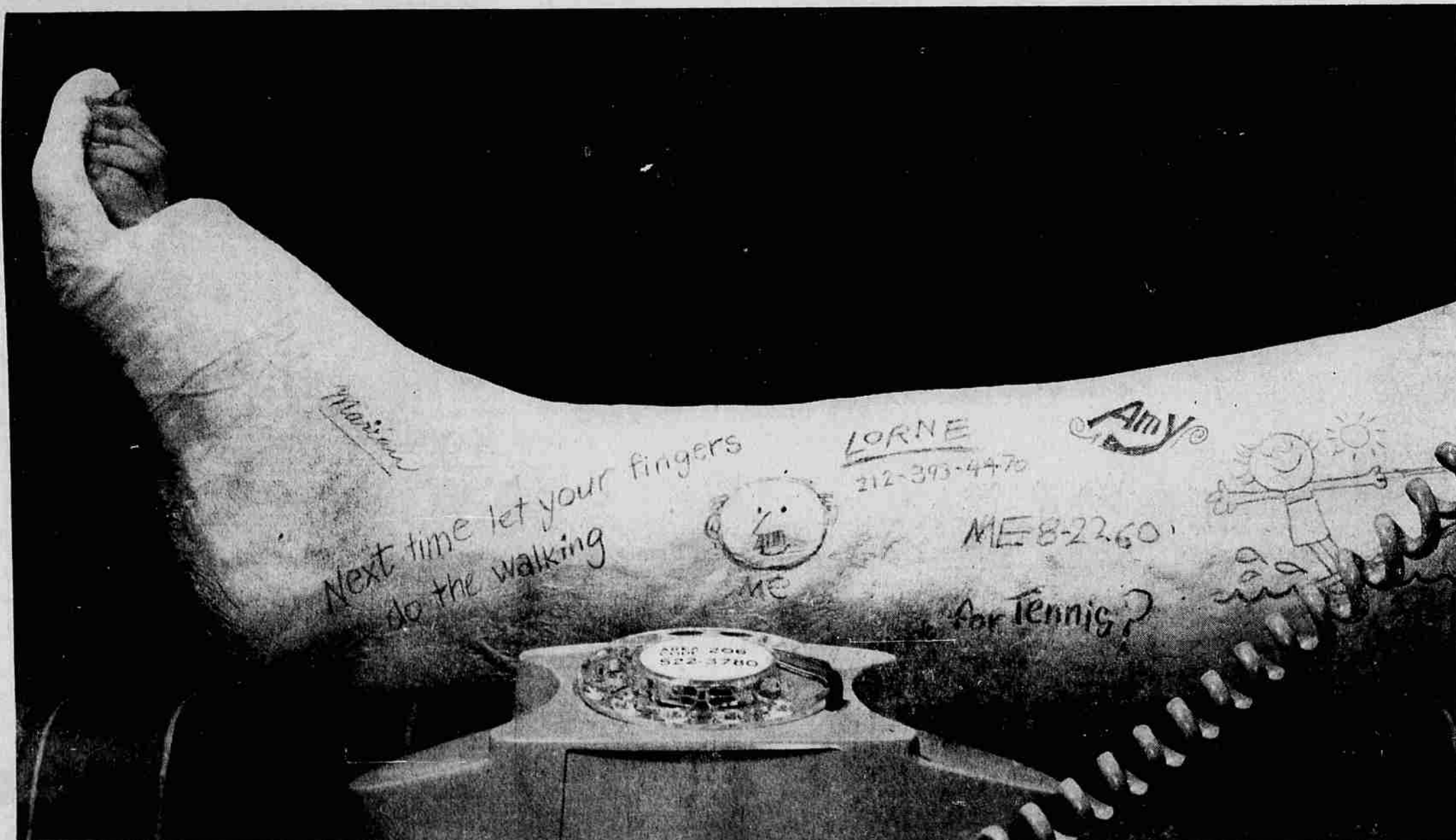
