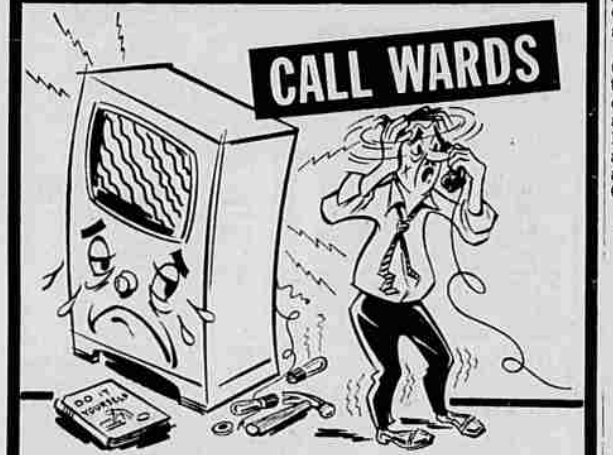

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Police Chief Cecil Pruitt has been informed that he will not be re-hired as chief beyond Sept. 1.

City Manager John Porter told Pruitt in a letter that he would not recognize a petition of some 350 persons to keep the chief beyond Sept. 1 when he reaches compulsory retirement age.

Pruitt, who has been chief here for more than 15 years, had asked to be kept on. Porter has not appointed a replacement.

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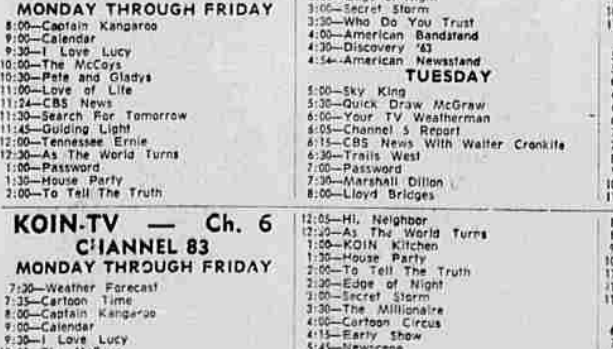

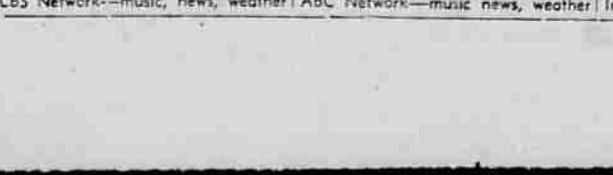

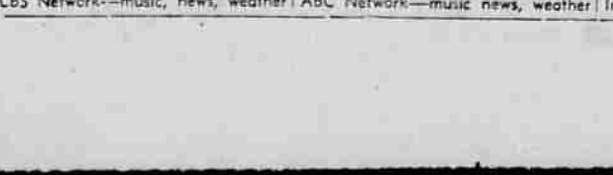
