

Danish Girl Fourth Exchange Student To Study At Reedsport High School

Denmark probably is faring all right in the capitals of the world if she is as ably and charmingly represented as she is in Reedsport during the coming school year. Lis Strandsberg, flaxen-haired, tall, with a clear and direct gaze and a warm, spontaneous smile, arrived in Reedsport Sunday as the fourth American Field Service high school student.

The 16 year old Danish lass is sharing the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Sherman — typical of those American homes where both parents are public school teachers.

Lis comes from a Danish merchant's home in the 17,000-population city of Virum, ten miles from the almost fabled metropolis of Copenhagen. Her father operates a

grocery store, employing nine people, and just beginning, Lis explains, to reflect the super-market distribution influence.

When she completes her year as Reedsport Union High School student, Lis will probably return to her home to enter the "gymnasium" phase of public schooling, for which she has been qualified by passing the entrance examination. She has been attending a parochial school of about 700 pupils, all girls.

Lis has one brother in Denmark. In her Reedsport home, she shares the family with two sisters: Pat, who is to be a junior in high school this year, and Sylvia, who leaves in mid-September for Cottey College, Missouri.

She has studied four languages besides her native Scandinavian

tongue, which equips her for conversation with both Norwegians and Swedish people. She has had five years of English — which she speaks with all the command of a native Oregonian — four years of German, three of French and one of Latin.

Douglas County Horseman Owner Of Two Champions

The care and training of horses has become a big thing in Douglas County. Horse shows have become a regular part of the county activity scene, and Roseburg was even honored this summer by having one of the state's biggest shows, the Oregon Appaloosa Association judging this summer.

This interest in horses isn't limited to adults either. One of the young people who has taken up training and breeding seriously is Doug Dykeman of Roseburg, a pre-dentistry student at Southern Oregon College. He proved it at this year's Douglas County Fair by entering two horses which claimed grand championships. They are mother and son.

The mother, Cheri Sheika, a Morab (half Morgan and half Arabian), took first in its class to qualify for the grand championship judging with 11 other horses and then walked off with the 4-H grand championship in showmanship. Showmanship judging is based on obedience to rider, neatness of both horse and rider, etc.

Actually, the championship was nothing new to the 8-year-old mare.

She had been grand champion two years ago in horsemanship.

Her son, Cheradin Dark Star, only 14 months old, also got off to a good start in the show ring. He was named reserve grand champion in the conformation class — against an enormous field of 101 horses. The stallion showed his championship stuff by claiming the title in the first show in which he was ever entered.

Young Dykeman is particularly proud of the stallion and is already making plans to enter him in other shows. His father was a registered Appaloosa owned by Al Farbaugh of Roseburg, and Dykeman expects to have him registered as an Appaloosa next year when his spotted coloring is complete.

Despite the two purple ribbons and the coveted Gerry Garrett trophy won by the 18-year-old Roseburg youth and his horses, he will not be taking part in the State Fair. Under a new 4-H ruling, a horse cannot be entered in the state competition if its owner has attended college a semester. Dykeman will be a sophomore at SOC this year.

He explains the reason is that horsemanship is often taught at college and this would give a horse owner an unfair advantage against other 4-Hers.

But this ruling isn't bothering young Dykeman. He knows he and his two prize horses are in for a lot of other trophies in the future.

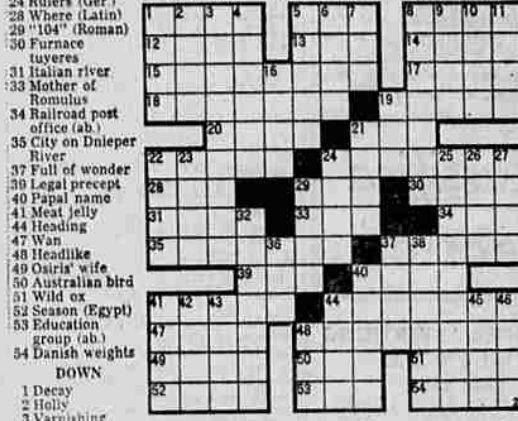

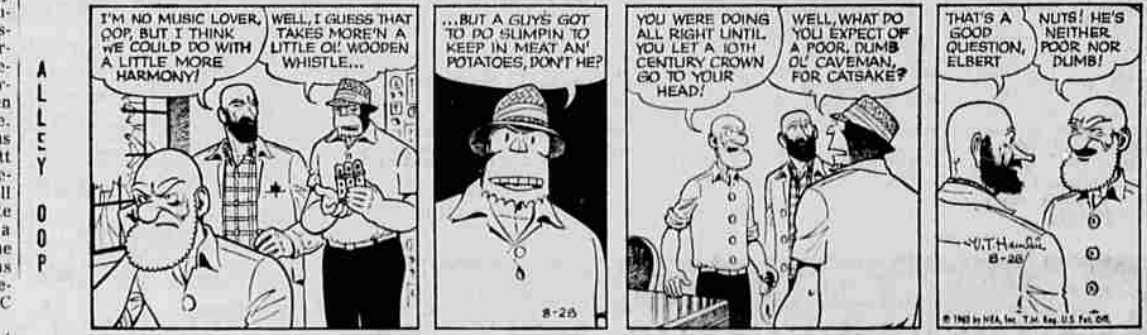
