

Elkton Registration Set For Thursday

Schools will open at Elkton Wednesday, Sept. 4, with buses running on their usual schedule and the school lunch program in operation, according to Leo Crisman, superintendent. Dismissal Wednesday will be at 2:15 p.m.

Physical examinations will be held at the high school for ninth graders on Thursday, Aug. 29, from 1:30 to 3 p.m. with registration to follow from 3 to 4 p.m. High school athletes will have their physical examinations from 3 to 4 p.m.

General registration for 10th 11th and 12th graders will be held on Thursday from 9 to noon and 1:30 to 3 p.m. Girls are encouraged to register in the morning hours while football practice hours are in effect. Football practice is now under way weekdays from 10 a.m. to noon.

Registration fees will remain substantially the same as last year Crisman said.

Some increase is expected in the high school enrollment, according to Crisman, with elementary school rolls expected to be about the same as last year.

Kid's Luck Is Really Skill

Several years ago one of my fellow oldtimers pointed out a young bridge player to me and said, "There is the luckiest kid I have ever seen."

It seems that West had cashed the ace and king of hearts and shifted to the nine of clubs. The kid had won with the king, played a spade to dummy's ace and then another spade. My friend, sitting East, had won with the king (dropping his partner's queen) and cashed his jack. Then he led another club. The kid had won with the ace, led the queen of clubs, gone into a short huddle and ruffed with dummy's last trump.

This left him in dummy with nothing but six diamonds. He had led the ace of diamonds; dropped my friend's singleton king and made his two spade contract with an overtrick.

In "All Fifty-two Cards" the kid, who is Marshall Miles, explains the play.

He points out that West had passed originally with a long heart suit headed by the ace and king, plus the queen of spades. Many players would open the hand; all players would if it also included the king of diamonds.

In addition it appeared that West had 7-2-2-2 distribution. East was marked with the singleton king of diamonds and Marshall had decided to have a little fun and act like a dope who had ruffed his own winner by mistake and then been forced to drop a singleton king.

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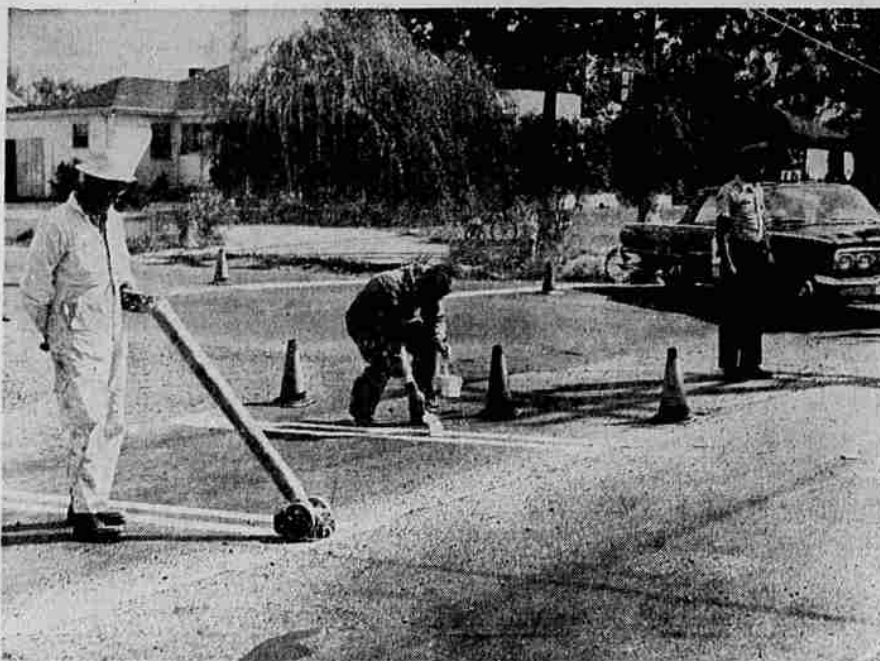
