SHIRLENE BRAZIER'S FOOD FOR THOUGHT

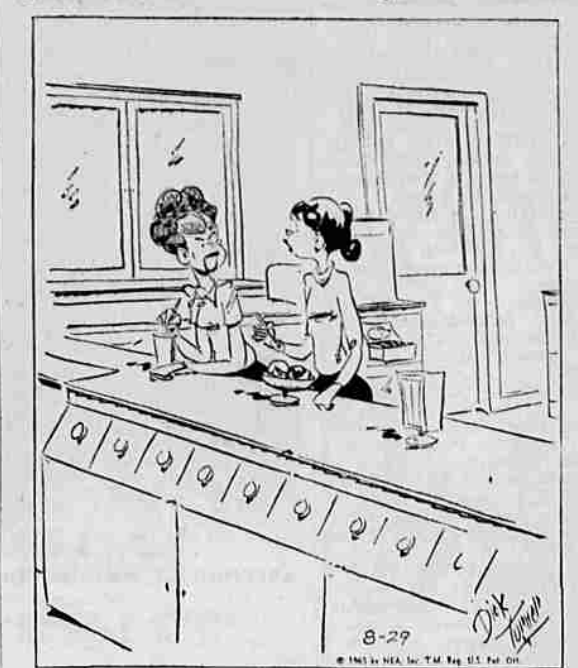
Everyone has heard of a New England Clambake. The clambake starts with a pit in the sandy beach, lined with rocks. A roaring fire of wood is built. When there is a good, thick bed of coals, wet seaweed or kelp is spread on the coals. The raw clams are laid on first and covered with a layer of seaweed; next a layer of raw lobsters are covered with seaweed, and then corn and unpeeled potatoes are put in and covered with another layer of seaweed. The pit is then covered with canvas and sealed with about 4" of sand. The food is left to steam for 1 to 1½ hours; then dug up with pitchforks and eaten with melted butter, salt and pepper.
