

Minnesota Twins Blast Homer Mark While Winning 2

They sounded the all-clear in Washington today.

That means it's okay for everyone to come out now because the Minnesota Twins finally have left.

Before departing, however, they did everything but level the nation's capital with a terrifying bombardment that broke two major league records and tied two others.

The Twins caused all that devastation by burying the Washington Senators, 14-2, while rookie Jimmie Hall, Vic Power and Bernie Allen hit two apiece.

Bob Allison, Rich Rollins and Zorro Versalles settled for one each as Minnesota collected 20 hits in the opener and 15 more in the finale.

The spectacular long-ball exhibition set major league records for most homers hit in four consecutive games (17) and for three straight (15).

For the statistically-minded, the eight homers by the Twins in the opener equalled a major league record for a single contest and another mark was tied in the same game when six players on one team hit homers.

The 12 homers for a doubleheader fell one shy of the major league record of 13 established by the 1939 Yankees but they were more than enough to help Lee Stange to his eighth victory in the opener and rookie Dwight Siebler to his first major league win in the nightcap.

Stange gave up eight hits, including a homer by Uen Retzer, which was Washington's only extra-base hit of the day, and Siebler hurled a three-hitter.

Pete Burnside, who relieved in both games for Washington, was tagged for three of the homers as was Ron Moeller. The losers, Don

Rudolph and Jim Duckworth, each gave up two.

Washington manager Gil Hodges missed it all. He was home in Brooklyn with the virus. Ed Yost handled the club.

In other AL games, the White Sox beat the Indians, 7-2, the Red Sox nipped the Yankees, 4-3, and the Tigers won their eighth straight with a 6-1 decision over the Angels. The Orioles and Athletics were idle.

The Dodgers moved 6½ games in front in the National League with an 11-1 victory over the Giants. The Mets defeated the Pirates, 7-4, and the Cubs beat the Phillies, 2-1, in the only other scheduled contests.

Baby-faced Harmon Killebrew was the Twins' ring-leader with three home runs, raising his season total to 32, while rookie Jimmie Hall, Vic Power and Bernie Allen hit two apiece.

Bobby Layne To Be Honored At Detroit During Pro Exhibition Contest Tonight

They're going to roll out a barrel of sentiment in Detroit tonight to honor one of the most hard-nosed competitors the game of football has ever seen.

Bobby Layne, the tough Texan who ruled the huddles of the Detroit Lions and the Pittsburgh Steelers with an iron hand, will be honored during halftime festivities when these two clubs clash in a pre-season game.

One of the greatest quarterbacks in National Football League annals, Layne established NFL records for career passing yards and touchdowns passes before he retired after the 1962 season. The highlight of "Bobby Layne Night" will be the official announcement of a scholarship fund in his name at the University of Texas, his alma mater.

The only other scheduled exhibition game tonight pits the San Francisco Forty Niners' "walking wounded" against the Dallas Cowboys at Bakersfield, Calif. The Forty Niners may be hard pressed to find 11 men to man their positions. The Cowboys have compiled a 1-2 slate to date.

In other NFL developments, middle linebacker Ray Nitschke of the Green Bay Packers brushed off criticism of New York's Sam Huff for his violent tackling of teammate Jim Taylor in last year's championship game as part of "his job." The Packers were preparing for a Labor Day rematch with the Giants, whom they have now beaten five consecutive times.

The Los Angeles Rams dropped defensive halfback John Griffin and acquired Nat Whitmyer, a castoff of the Cowboys, for the same position. The Chicago Bears will spend tonight in a Chicago hotel where they will be under an 11 p.m. curfew prior to Saturday night's meeting with the St. Louis Cardinals.

In American League camps, the San Diego Chargers disclosed that their outstanding end, Don Norton, will miss the entire 1963 season because of a ruptured disc suffered Tuesday. The New York Jets, in the role of hungry dogs waiting for something to drop off the table, snapped up tackle Charlie Janerette, who was released Wednesday by the Giants. Kansas City reported that offensive stars Curtis McCClinton, Abner Haynes and Stone Johnson had recovered from minor ailments and were ready for Saturday night's game with the Houston Oilers, a rematch of last season's championship encounter.

New Rule To End Platoon System, Woody Hayes Says

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—The new college football substitution rule will "just about do away with platoon football" and reverse a trend toward getting more players into the game, the president of the American Football Coaches Association said today.

A rules committee spokesman has described the new rule as liberalizing substitutions. Ohio State football coach Woody Hayes said, "but actually it does not, repeat, does not."

The Buckeye mentor, starting his 13th season here, said the rule was "considerably more intricate than the rules committee anticipated."

He predicted confusion on the part of coaches, officials and fans, but said commissioners of the major conferences have promised the coaches that officials will cooperate in handling the new rule.

He also said that the number of substitutes which can be sent in at one time depends on the situation. He outlined 10 different situations some almost similar, when the number of men who could enter the game differed.

"The new rule is like some contracts in that it appears to give you something in the big print and take it away in the fine print," Hayes said.

He said that while it would be possible to send in an entire new team, it would be impossible to make the change at the time coaches like to platoon.

As an example, a team getting ready to punt on fourth down could send in only two men instead of its entire defensive unit.

The team going on the offense, he said, could send in only two substitutes until it made a first down or until the clock was stopped after it ran one play.

Hayes said the rules committee made the changes without studying game films to analyze situations which could arise. Thus, he said, in some instances on first down when a player jumped offside before the ball is snapped, no subs could be sent in; but if the ball were snapped, each team could send in 11 men. Such situations will be difficult for fans, coaches and officials to keep up with, he predicted.

All-Oregon Final Set For Golfers

Sandy Koufax First To Win 20 Games

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Sandy Koufax, the majors' first 20-game winner, still was in a state of semi-shock today.

Not because of those 20 victories so much, but because of all those Dodger players who kept crossing home plate Thursday night in an 11-1 romp over the Giants.

Koufax hadn't seen so many runs in more than two months. The Dodgers had scored a total of two for him in his previous two tries for his 20th victory.

But they did the job up brown before a record crowd of 54,978 at Chavez Ravine Thursday night, breaking out for five runs in the third inning to turn the contest into a "laugh" and increase their National League lead to 6½ games over the second-place Giants.

"With a big lead like that, I let them hit the ball," said Koufax.

Not too much, though.

Get Three Hits

The Giants were able to collect only three hits and that included Orlando Cepeda's 23rd homer which produced their only run in the second inning.

Koufax, whose record now is 20-5, struck out five and walked only one in becoming the first Dodger left-hander to win 20 since Preacher Roe did so in 1951.

Southpaw Billy Pierce, who replaced Giant starter Bob Bolin in the second inning, got the side out in that frame but was chased in the third when the Dodgers put together six hits, including a two-run homer by Frank Howard, for five runs.

The Dodgers then batted around again in the fifth when they added three more runs on four hits.

feating the Phillies, 2-1.

In the American League, the Red Sox shaded the Yankees, 4-3, while Willie Davis kept things going with two doubles and a single.

Giants Appear Goners

The setback just about cooked the Giants' chances even though Alvin Dark refused to look at it that way.

"The loss won't have any effect on our club," he said. "We'll be back tomorrow. Before this game, I said we'd have to win five of our last seven games with the Dodgers—now it's five of six."

Even should the Giants win the next three games of the current four-game series, however, they still would leave Los Angeles 3½ games out with less than a month to go.

Only two other games were played in the National League Thursday, with the Mets beating the Pirates, 7-4, and the Cubs defeating the Phillies, 2-1.
