Roseburg will be one of nine Douglas County school districts opening its doors for the 1963-64 school year on Tuesday. Five of the districts will open on Sept. 9, while Riddle will wait until Sept. 12 and Camas Valley has already opened.

Other schools slated to start on Tuesday are Canyonville, Gardiner, Glendale, Reedsport Elementary, Reedsport Union High, Winston-Dillard and Drain.

Elkton schools will start on Wednesday.

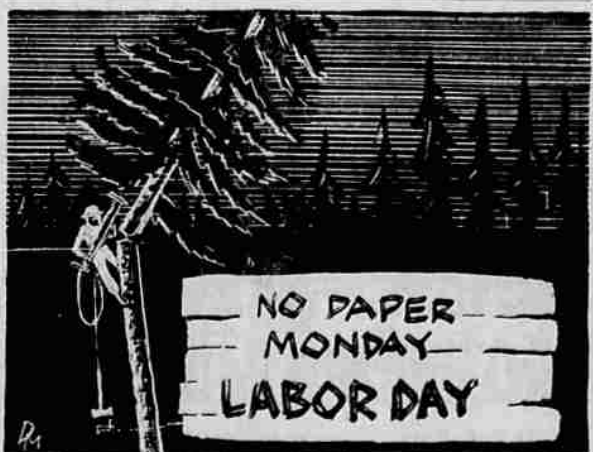

Kennedy Sets Oregon Visit In September

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — President Kennedy will visit Oregon as part of a 10-state tour of conservation and natural resource areas in September, the White House announced today.

The White House said no details of times or places were available, but Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., said in Washington, D.C., that Kennedy planned to speak at a dedication of the city's new high rise public housing project for the aged.

It also was expected Kennedy would visit the Oregon Dunes seashore area.

The White House said Kennedy's trip would take him to Pennsylvania, Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Washington, Oregon, California and Nevada.

The President said he hoped the journey would "focus attention on the vital part of American life and stimulate further efforts in the field of national conservation."

The White House said Kennedy's trip would take him to national parks, national seashores, wilderness areas, dams and power and redevelopment projects.

There has been talk of the President possibly visiting the Hanford atomic works and Grand Coulee Dam in the state of Washington.

The projected visit to Portland Sept. 28 would bring Kennedy into Oregon just two weeks before Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York and Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, two Republican presidential nomination possibilities, attend a Western GOP meeting in Eugene Oct. 12.

Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore., said in Portland, "The President's announcement to visit Oregon bears out the plan that I knew he had to visit the site of the Oregon Dunes National Seashore. I am delighted that he will have the opportunity to compare at first hand the Oregon dunes with his own Cape Cod, which he has long taken an interest in."

The White House announcement said an advance team of White House aides would embark next week on a planning expedition.

It said Kennedy would visit projects "devoted to the development of resources and energy, to the protection of wilderness and wildlife, to the preservation of the natural beauty of stream, forest, desert and shoreline, and to the enlarged public opportunities for touring and recreation."

News Secretary Pierre Salinger said "This is a non-political trip, wholly non-political."

Close Vigil Kept On Forest After Lightning Flurry

Carl Yeust, fire control officer for the Diamond Lake District, reports a severe lightning storm occurred between 6 p.m. and midnight Friday in the North Umpqua region.

Lookouts reported 120 lightning strikes in the district. However, because of heavy fog in the valleys, ground crews have not been able to locate any fires, according to Mrs. Arthur Selby, Glade correspondent.

Fire suppression crews are keeping a close lookout for any evidence of blazes as soon as the fog clears. Less than one-half inch of rain occurred during the storm.

The Little River District fared better. While a storm occurred in higher elevations, no lightning strikes were reported.

The fire weather forecast was for scattered showers with only a 40 per cent chance of further lightning near the upper Cascades and little change in temperature. Humidity is high and winds are of low velocity.

200,000 Rally In Square In Support Of Diem Policy

SAIGON, Viet Nam (UPI) — Vietnamese gathered in downtown Saigon today at a government rally called in support of the crackdown on Buddhists and imposition of martial law.

The government-controlled Viet Nam press agency said 200,000 persons jammed city hall square in front of the U. S. Information Office. Unofficial sources put the

crowd at about 30,000.

Reliable sources said the rally was organized on orders of Ngo Dinh Nhu, the powerful brother of President Ngo Dinh Diem, to demonstrate support for the government's policies in a time of crisis.

The government's play for popular backing came as diplomatic sources said U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge probably will

meet with Diem within the next few days for a showdown on the Buddhist crisis.

The sources said Lodge is expected to demand the removal of Nhu as the only way to end the crisis and press ahead with the government's drive to wipe out the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas.

Nhu, who heads South Viet

Nam's secret police, is thought to hold most of the real power following the government's raids on Buddhist pagodas and mass arrests of opposition elements last week.

About 10 government-controlled organizations participated in the rally. Most of the crowd appeared to be civil servants or soldiers in civilian clothes. They showed little emotion.

Speakers of the various organizations praised the government's decision to impose martial law 11 days ago and denounced Buddhist leaders as "political speculators."

They urged all Vietnamese to "give all-out support to President Ngo Dinh Diem, the people's only leader."

About 10,000 of those attending were blue-uniformed members of the Republican Youth Organization headed by Nhu, or members of the women's solidarity movement, headed by Madame Nhu, the politically influential sister-in-law of the president.

One of the girls at the rally was Madame Nhu's daughter, Ngo Dinh Le Thuy.

It had been expected that Nhu himself or Mme. Nhu, would attend, but neither put in an appearance. Their 18-year-old daughter attended with a group of Mme. Nhu's women's paramilitary corps.

Diplomatic sources interpreted the government's removal of gold and foreign exchange from Saigon banks to the presidential palace as a precaution against a head-on clash with the United States over current policy. The sources said the withdrawal of the currency is in preparation for shipping it out of the country.

The sources said Lodge will deliver to Diem the demands outlined in a Voice of America broadcast to Viet Nam — but later repudiated by the State Department.

The demands, accompanied by a threat of reduction of the U. S. aid to South Viet Nam, were believed to include these:

—Outrigger of the secret police officials responsible for carrying out last week's raid on Buddhist pagodas and the arrest of thousands of Buddhist priests and nuns.

—The resignation of Nhu and the removal from influence of his outspoken wife, Madame Nhu, who has called the Buddhist leaders Communists and referred to their protest suicides by fire as "barbecues."

Negro Home Under Guard

State troopers today guarded the home of a Negro family in a previously all-white neighborhood at Falcroft, Pa., to prevent further demonstrations by angry whites.

A force of 60 troopers Friday night pushed back a crowd of 500 whites outside the home of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Baker, who moved into the house Friday afternoon. Several persons were injured by stones thrown by white teenagers and a news photographer was punched in the mouth.

Police cleared an area 150 yards deep on either side of the Baker home and set up roadblocks around the area. Falcroft is a community of 7,800 about 1.5 miles southwest of Philadelphia.

State troopers also reinforced local police at Williamstown, N.C., today to help preserve order in the event of renewed racial demonstrations. Around 400 Negro students hurled soft drink bottles at police Friday when officers turned back an attempted march on downtown Williamstown.

Evans Granted A Week To Enter Murder Plea

PORTLAND (UPI) — Robert Evans, 26, Honolulu, was given another week Friday before entering a plea to a charge of first degree murder in connection with the strangulation death of Irene Davis, 41, Payette, Idaho, here earlier this month.

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
