

# Minnesota Twins' Bats Boom Again

Not so long ago, friend and foe alike would have invited a deep scowl had they dared mention home runs within hearing distance of Camilo Pascual.

Opposing batters were reminding him often enough of his one big pitching weakness.

Pascual reached his low point in 1956 when he gave up 34 home runs, at that time an American League record, and lost 18 games in 24 decisions. Not helping him any was the fact he had worked for the Washington Senators, habitual tailenders even then, and got little hitting support of his own.

The move from Washington to Minnesota during the expansion three years ago apparently brought out the muscles in his teammates and the sharpness in Pascual because the home run now is coming off the other bat.

The long ball meant the difference again Friday night as Harmon Killebrew and Bob Allison sparked back-to-back homers to snap a tie and provide the Minnesota Twins with a 5-3 victory over the Chicago White Sox. Not only did the win mark Pascual's 18th success of the season, but it moved the Twins into second place, a half-game ahead of Chicago.

A two-out, ninth-inning homer by Rookie Larry Brown provided the winning margin for Cleveland and broke an eight-game Tiger winning streak. Relief pitcher Gary Bell (6-5) got credit for the victory.

The Yankees picked up three runs in the first inning, two of them unearned, and coasted home behind the six-hit pitching of Al Downing, who won his 11th game in 15 decisions. Steve Barber (18-10) was the loser.

Don Zimmer blasted a grand slam homer in the fifth inning and Don Lock drove in two other runs with singles to spark the Washington attack. Claude Osteen gave up five hits in winning his eighth game.

## Spokane 9 Gains PCL Title Friday

The Spokane Indians, under the fine managerial direction of Danny Ozark, are the Northern Division champions of the Pacific Coast League.

The Indians clinched the title prior to the end of their game Friday night as Hawaii was a downed by Oklahoma City to fall two far behind to catch the Indians, even if the Islanders won every remaining game and Spokane lost all of its games.

The new champions took over first place in the division on July 1 and never relinquished the top spot. They will meet the winner of the Southern Division in a best-of-seven series starting at Spokane Sept. 10 to decide the league champion.

## Drysdale Gets 3-1 Victory In Big Game Friday Night

The Giants are dead. They were buried for all general purposes Friday night, nice and proper like by the Dodgers, who even said a few kind words over them after applying the coup de grace with a 3-1 victory.

Don Drysdale delivered the eulogy and when it was all over the Giants had dropped to third place and the Dodgers had increased their National League lead to seven games.

Drysdale not only scattered nine hits in winning his 17th, but he also singled home what proved to be the winning run off loser Juan Marichal in the fifth inning and had the added satisfaction of holding his long-time nemesis, Willie McCovey, hitless.

A crowd of 54,849, which swelled the Dodgers' home attendance to 2,022,527, saw their heroes make it two-out-of-two over the Giants in the current four-game series.

Chuck Hiller's single, an infield out and a single by Willie Mays put the Giants ahead in the first inning but that run turned out to be the Giants' only one of the game.

**Deadlock In Third**  
The Dodgers tied the score in the third when Jim Gilliam's double brought home Willie Davis, and Drysdale broke the tie by singling home John Roseboro in the fifth. Los Angeles added an insurance run off Don Larsen in the eighth.

The Dodgers victory was marred only by the fact that shortstop Maury Wills jammed his ankle when he stole second base in the eighth. He left the game to have X-rays taken.

The Milwaukee Braves climbed into fourth place with a 3-1 victory over the New York Mets, the St. Louis Cardinals dropped the Philadelphia Phillies into fifth place by beating them, 11-6, Cincinnati nipped Pittsburgh, 2-1, and the Houston Colts cuffed the Chicago Cubs, 5-1.

The Braves, who are the hot-

test club in the majors at the moment, made it four in a row and 14 victories in their last 17 games by defeating Tracy Stallard of the Mets.

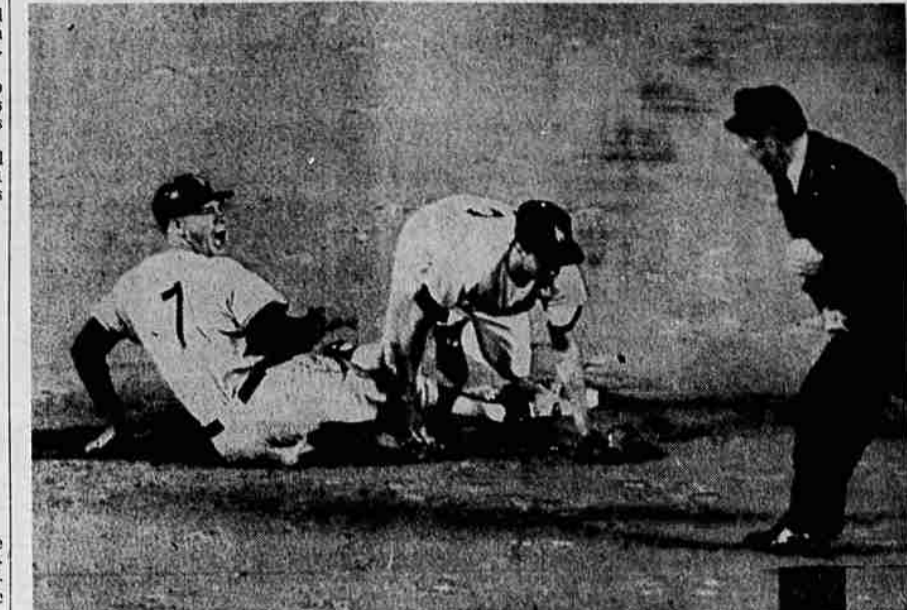

## Seasons, Limits Increased On Waterfowl, 'Uplands'

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Game Commission gave waterfowl and upland game bird hunters present recently in the form of longer seasons and larger bag limits.

The commission announced the regulations after a public hearing. The season on ducks and geese will run for 90 days, opening at

noon Oct. 8 and closing Jan. 5. The season was set within the limits established earlier by the Department of Interior and is 15 days longer than last year's.

Bag limits will be four ducks daily and eight in possession. Not more than two may be wood ducks and not more than one a hooded merganser. There will be no open season on redheads or canvasbacks.

**More Mallards Allowed**

As in 1962, two more mallards will be allowed in the daily limit and four more in possession in Baker, Malheur, Wallawa, Umatilla, Union, Gilliam, Sherman, Morrow and Wasco counties.

The bag limit on geese will be three daily and six in possession. It may be increased to six daily if three or more are snow geese. One Ross's goose will be allowed in the bag limit this year.

Black brant season will be Nov. 18-Jan. 31 with a bag limit of three daily and three in possession. The season on American and red-breasted merganser will be Oct. 8-Jan. 25, with a bag limit of five daily and 10 in possession. Coot can be taken from Oct. 8 to Jan. 25 with a bag limit of 25.

For upland game birds, the season on cock pheasants and

valley and mountain quail starts Oct. 12 and ends Nov. 24 except in Malheur County. The pheasant limit is three daily and 12 in possession. Limit on quail is 10 daily and 20 in possession. There will be no open season on bobwhite quail this year.
