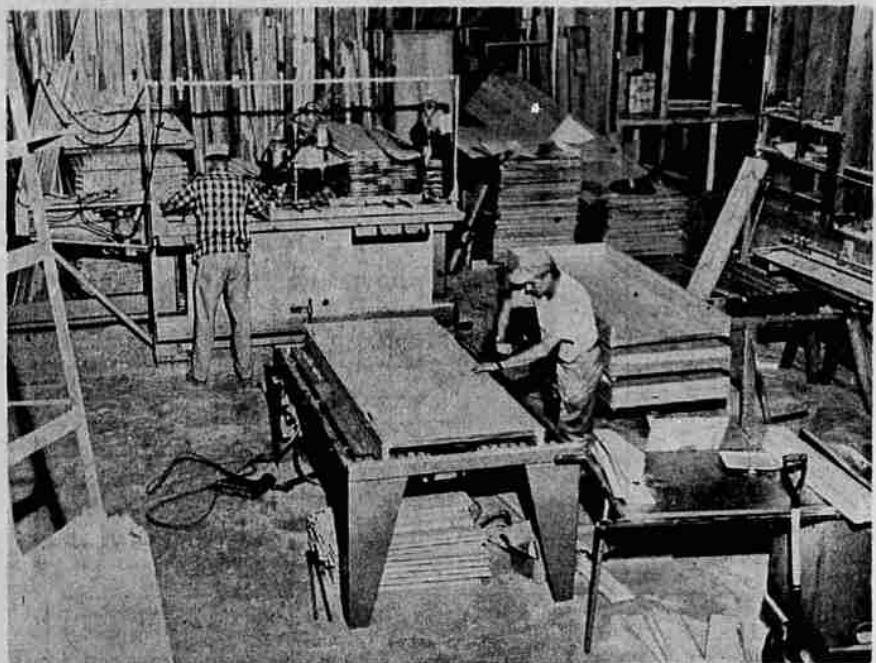
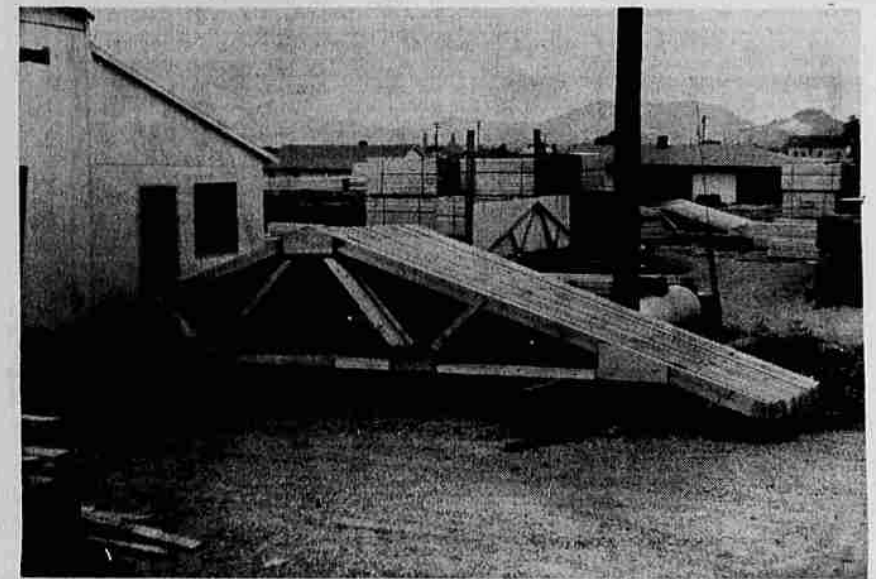


So. Oregon Fabricators Selected Payroll Builder For September

Maximum Highway Truck Use Eyed

The Oregon State Highway Department is undertaking a highway classification study which will determine maximum possible use of highways by the trucking industry, according to Forrest Cooper, state highway engineer.

Some of the state's older highways have sharp curves which cannot be negotiated by the largest-size trucks without crossing over the center stripe. For this reason, many of these older highways are restricted to trucks of shorter length.

A three-unit caravan will make the study. The pilot car of the caravan warns the other two vehicles of oncoming traffic with its two-way radio or stops the traffic when necessary. A bright red 40-foot semi-trailer follows the pilot car and tests curves in the road. The operator in the observation car behind the truck takes movies of the turn and voice-records some of the data. Some still pictures are also taken. If the semi's wheels cross the center line, it is recorded by the movie camera.

The classification study will pinpoint the trouble spots, and a modest program of betterment will be undertaken. In some cases, minor improvement of a very few isolated cases will permit reclassification of a highway to a standard permitting longer loads. This information will be made available to the trucking industry.

Previously some 55 per cent, or 4,100 miles, of highway had been classified. There is no problem with the Interstate highways as they will take any legal-size truck.

When the remaining 45 per cent, or 3,400 miles, of primary and secondary highways are test run, the Highway Department will have a complete inventory of its roads and the sections that need improving, Cooper said.

12,925 Workers In Non-Farming Businesses Earn Taxable Wages

About 12,925 workers in Douglas County's non-farming businesses earned taxable wages under the old-age, survivors and disability insurance program, according to the latest edition of County Business Patterns, Dean O. Haley, Social Security district manager in Eugene reports.

He said 1,210 reporting units of employers of non-farm employees covered under the program paid out some \$15,241,000 in taxable wages in the county during the first quarter of 1962. The report shows 24 of the employing units reported 100 or more workers each at that time. The largest proportion of employment, 6,838 workers, was in manufacturing, with 6,484

Californian Buys Superette Store

Ernest Kinder of Vista, Calif., has purchased the Superette grocery and market in Canyonville. Kinder, a former California supermarket chain executive, was co-founder and executive vice president of the Buy and Save chain in San Diego County.

George and Bonnie McClane have owned and operated the Superette for the past 16 years. Both McClane and his wife attended schools in the Canyonville district and have been active in civic affairs in south Douglas. The McClanes have not yet announced their plans for the future.

Marvin Baker of Oceanside, Calif., is expected to be here by next week to help in operating the Superette. Baker was formerly affiliated with the Buy and Save chain, reports Beth Chappell, Canyonville correspondent.

Southern Oregon Fabricators, an outfit which manufactures component parts for homes and other buildings, is being saluted by the Roseburg area Chamber of Commerce as the industry of the month for September.

The business, located at 141 Sherry St., in Winston, is owned by a partnership consisting of Newell Howard and Walter Nuckolls. It was started in 1961 and has shown steady growth. The industry is the type which shows potential for future expansion, and was chosen as the "payroll builder" which the chamber is promoting in an effort to stabilize local economy.

The industry does not go into complete prefabrication of homes, but limits its work to outside and inside sheathed walls, partitions (including openings for doors and windows, and doors with frames and hardware fitted), roof trusses and preliminary drawings as distinguished from prefabrication.

Kindred Interest
The business was started when Howard and Nuckolls found they had kindred interest and experience to go with the equipment each had and the location to set up this enterprise.

Howard has been operator of a building supply business, including commercial refrigeration and store fixtures, merchandising and retail sales. Nuckolls has been a building contractor for homes, apartments, motels, barns, and so on.

The business started small, with first year sales about \$50,000, swelled to around \$200,000 the second year. The number of employees ranged from two to three the first year and nine the second year and a payroll ranging up to \$100,000.

The industry is housed in a frame building with 6,400 square feet of space and a loading dock 60 by 16 feet. The owners include in their service area places they can reach by truck, from Eugene to Medford and way points. They have their own truck and trailer for deliveries.

Supplies from local lumber and plywood manufacturers are mostly hauled by the same equipment.

Since output of the firm is difficult to display, there will be no displays as such around town as there has been in connection with some of the other payroll builders for Roseburg. Recognition will be largely by newspaper and air media, and a picture display in the office of Pacific Power & Light Co.

Indian Theatre To Reopen With List Of New Features

The Indian Theatre reopens Sept. 4, following summer closure, and owner Eino Hemmilla announced a list of topnotch and some roadshow attractions for early showings.

Starting the season will be Earl Hammer Jr.'s "Spencer Mountain," starring Henry Fonda, Maureen O'Hara and James McArthur, showing Sept. 4-7. It will be followed by "PT 109" with Clifford Robertson and Ty Hardin Sept. 8-10.

"The Longest Day," a roadshow with 42 stars is dated for Sept. 11-17. Next in line will be "Wonderful World of the Brothers Grimm" with Lawrence Harvey, Claire Bloom and Russ Tamlyn, Sept. 18-21 and "The Caretakers," with Robert Stack, Polly Bergen and Joan Crawford, Sept. 22-24.

The much publicized "Mutiny on the Bounty," a roadshow attraction starring Marlon Brando and Trevor Howard is booked from Sept. 25 to Oct. 1. A comedy "Bye Bye Birdie" with Janet Leigh, Ann-Margaret and Dick Van Dyke is scheduled Oct. 2-5, and "A Tickle in the Ear" with Shirley Jones, Gig Young and Red Buttons, Oct. 6-8.

Booked for early showings but not yet dated are "Lawrence of Arabia," the roadshow which drew the eight academy awards; "Irma La Douce," with Jack Lemmon and Shirley MacLaine, and a re-issue showing of the Walt Disney hit, "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea."

Weekday theatre opening will be at 7 p.m., the show to start at 7:15 and feature at 7:45, with single feature showings. On Fridays and Saturdays the theatre opens at 6:30 with two shows nightly, except for road shows or lengthy features.

Kiddie matinees start Oct. 5 and the first "Curtain at 8:00" will be Oct. 15.

Hemmilla announced the Pine Motor Theatre will have a movie marathon Sept. 1 of four feature pictures. The Monday night show and the Tuesday Ladies' night feature next week will conclude the summer season.

The theatre then will adopt a winter schedule. This will include Friday-Saturday night showings of the same feature attractions, and a separate bargain-night program on Sundays. This Friday-Saturday-Sunday arrangement will continue as long as the weather is favorable.

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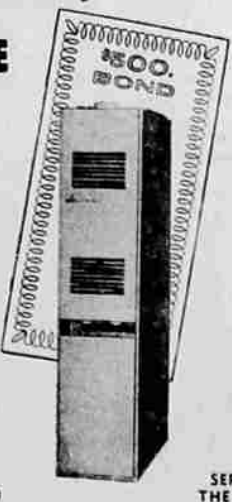
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
