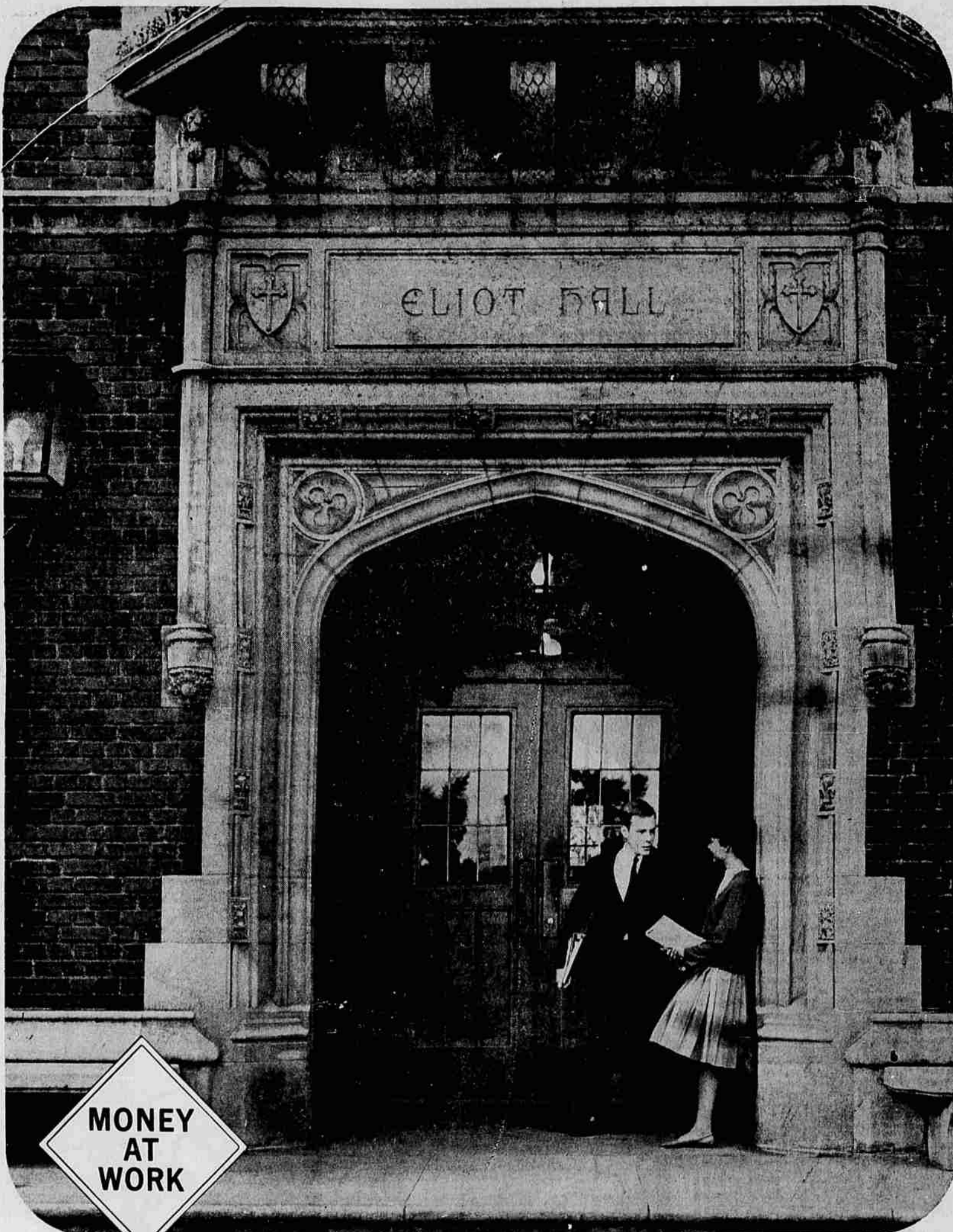
car in the rally. He explained he only wanted to stop the car and find out who the driver was.

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
