

Green Bay Topples Giants; Colts Roll On Undeatead

GREEN BAY, Wis. (UPI) — Jimmy Taylor of the Green Bay Packers met Sam Huff and the New York Giants headon again Monday night.

And again the Packers took the measure of the Giants, as they have in the past two National Football League title games — this time by a 24-17 count.

Taylor ground out 95 yards rushing, scored two touchdowns, had another called back and was pulled down from behind while apparently on his way to still another.

Taylor's touchdowns twice pulled the Packers from behind. Huff, the villain in last year's playoff game when Taylor received one of his worst beatings ever, surrendered that role to end Andy Robustelli in this one.

It was Robustelli who hauled down Taylor after a 45-yard gallop to the New York 42.

And it was Robustelli who gave Taylor his biggest working over. Taylor returned the compliments — but got a penalty for it. He was called for a personal foul after roughing up Robustelli shortly after the start of the second quarter. The penalty pushed the Packers into a hole and helped set up the first score of the game — a 12-yard field goal by Don Chandler.

Herb Adderley pulled the Packers ahead on the ensuing kickoff by taking Chandler's boot on the goal line and returning it 100 yards.

An eight-yard run by rookie Nat Craddock and one of the wildest plays ever seen in City Stadium

gave New York its scores.

On the last play of the first half, Erich Barnes tapped a Bart Starr pass in the direction of Jim Patton who intercepted on the New York nine. Patton returned 24 yards and then lateraled to Dick Lynch who went 67 more for the touchdown that gave New York a 17-14 halftime lead.

Jerry Kramer's 24-yard field goal provided Green Bay insurance late in the third quarter.

The Baltimore Colts emerged as the only unbeaten team in the pro football ranks when they rallied to down the Washington Redskins 27-21 for their fourth straight victory Saturday night.

In other NFL holiday weekend action, the Philadelphia Eagles turned back the previously-unbeaten Minnesota Vikings 34-27, the Cleveland Browns whipped the Los Angeles Rams 23-14, and the St. Louis Cardinals scored a comeback 17-14 victory over the Chicago Bears.

The San Diego Chargers wound up with the best record among American Football League clubs at the conclusion of the exhibition schedule. The Chargers downed the Oakland Raiders 13-3 for their fourth victory in five tune-ups Saturday night.

The Buffalo Bills downed the Denver Broncos 21-14, the Houston Oilers turned back the defending champion Kansas City Chiefs 23-17, and the New York Jets scored their first victory by edging the Boston Patriots 22-20 in the AFL's other final exhibition tussles.

San Diego Surging In PCL Pennant Race

All of a sudden there is a race in the Pacific Coast League's southern division.

It took a while but the San Diego Padres are operating under a full head of steam today and as a result only one game separates them from first place in the southern division.

The Padres, PCL champions last year, struggled through 13 innings Monday but hung on to gain a 2-1 victory over the Oklahoma City 89ers, who only a week or so ago looked like sure division winners.

The two clubs meet again today in what could be the most important game of the season for both.

Oklahoma City and San Diego both have lost 72 games but the 89ers have two more victories. They have 11 games left to play and the Padres 13.

Dick Luebke, who took over for Jim Owens in the 12th inning, was the winning pitcher in Monday's game for the Padres. Gordon Jones, the last of three 89er pitchers who came on in the ninth, took the loss.

George Williams' bases-empty homer in the sixth tied the score but the Padres won out in the 13th on a double by Art Shamsky and Les Peden's single.

Meanwhile, the Spokane Indians kept right on rolling along even though they have clinched the northern division title. They will meet the winner of the southern division race in the best-of-seven series to determine the league champion starting on Sept. 10.

Yanks Lead Biggest In 22 Years

Even manager Ralph Houk should be ready to admit now that the New York Yankees have tucked away their 14th American League pennant in 17 years.

If Houk needs any coaxing, this little bit of intelligence should convince him:

The Yankees cake-walked past the Labor Day milestone with a 12-game lead — their biggest bulge at this stage of the race in 22 years. Back in 1941, New York led the AL by 18½ games after Labor Day action and finished the season 17 games in front of the second-place Boston Red Sox.

Whitey Ford became the American League's first 20-game winner of the season when the Yankees turned back the Detroit Tigers 5-4 Monday in the opener of their holiday doubleheader.

Tigers Win Nightcap

The Tigers bounced back to win the nightcap 2-1 behind Hank

Aquirre, but what did that matter to the Yankees? Their nearest "pursuers," the Chicago White Sox, also settled for a split against the Los Angeles Angels — pulling out an 8-7 victory after losing the opener 7-5.

The Cleveland Indians blasted the Washington Senators 15-3, and then dropped an 8-7 verdict; the Boston Red Sox turned back the Baltimore Orioles twice, 4-3 and 2-0, and the Minnesota Twins won a pair from the Kansas City Athletics, 6-2 and 3-1.

Mickey Mantle returned to the Yankees' starting lineup for the first time in almost three months in the nightcap and banged out a pair of singles in three official at-bats.

The Angels snapped Gary Peters' 11-game winning streak in the opener. However, the White Sox rallied to win the second game on J. C. Martin's two-run double in the ninth inning.

Hit Twelve Homers

Twelve homers were hit in the

Indians - Nats twinbill — six in each game. Homers by Larry Brown, Max Alvis, John Romano and Joe Adcock produced 10 Cleveland runs in the opener. The Senators opened a 6-2 lead in the nightcap on fourth-inning homers by Don Zimmer, Eddie Brinkman and rookie pitcher Ed Hobaugh, then needed a sacrifice fly by Chuck Hinton in the seventh to preserve the victory.

Bill Monbouquette, with relief help from Dick Radatz, became the first Red Sox pitcher in seven years to win 19 games in one season when he turned back the Orioles in the opener. Rookie Bob Heffner posted his first major league shutout in the nightcap, allowing only five hits.

The Twins used their siege guns to good advantage against the Athletics. Two-run homers by Harmon Killebrew and Bob Allison settled the opener and Jimmy Hall unloaded a two-run clout to back up Lee Stange's five-hit pitching in the nightcap.

Ashman Captures SO Golf Crown

MEDFORD (UPI) — Bob Ashman, an 18-year-old from Bellevue, Wash., posted a 1-up victory over veteran Lynn Creason of Medford in the 36-hole finals of the men's division in the Southern Oregon golf tournament Monday.

Ducks Boast Veteran Backfield, Feature Untested Line Strength

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Oregon's speedy Webfoots, facing a rugged opening game assignment against Penn State at Multnomah Stadium Sept. 21, get the fall practice routine underway Sunday.

Coach Len Casanova, who counts 19 lettermen on a 63-man squad, will send the Webfoots through a single drill Sunday afternoon before settling into the two-day practice schedule Monday.

Eight of Oregon's vets are backs, including three regulars from last year, headed by All-American halfback Mel Renfro. In addition to Renfro, tabbed by many grid experts as the nation's finest performer, Casanova can call on daring quarterback Bob Berry and halfback Larry Hill, the squad's second leading ground gainer last fall, to man first unit backfield spots again.

Fullback Lu Bain, shifted from halfback at the conclusion of spring drills, halfbacks H. D. Murphy, Ron Martin and Monte Fitchett and quarterback Doug Post complete the list of backfield lettermen.

The situation is different in the line, where only one 1962 starter is included in the list of 11 returning vets. Lone regular from last year is end Dick Imwalle, who figures to start at tight end this fall.

Imwalle has experienced help at end from Rich Schwab, Buck Corey, the extra-point specialist who booted 29 of 31 last season, and Paul Burleson.

Casanova has four lettermen tack-

les from which to draw. This group is composed of Lowell Dean, Ray Johnson, Milt Kanene and Ron Berg.

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
