Padres, '89ers Win Crucial PCL Counters; Bevos Lose

Only a breath separates the San Diego Padres and the Oklahoma City 89'ers today in their "down-to-the-wire" battle for first place in the Pacific Coast League's southern division race.

Both teams won Wednesday night — the Padres nipping the Hawaii Islanders, 1-0, on John Flavin's four-hitter and the 89'ers downing Salt Lake City, 3-2, on key hits by Al Heist and Carroll Hardy.

As a result, San Diego held first place today with a .5231 percentage, while Oklahoma City was at .5228. The 89'ers have won one more game but also have lost one more.

Eli Grba was charged with his seventh loss for Hawaii, although he deserved a better fate. The only run he gave up to San Diego was scored in the sixth inning — and it came on a break.

After Art Shamsky doubled, Grba struck out Miles McWilliams, but the third strike eluded catcher Al Roselli and officially was recorded as a wild pitch. Shamsky moved onto third on the play and came home when Grba lost his touch and, in succession, walked Tony Perez and Tommy Helms.

Bill McCool (2-0) pitched against Bob Belinsky (4-0) today in the

second game of the San Diego-Hawaii series.

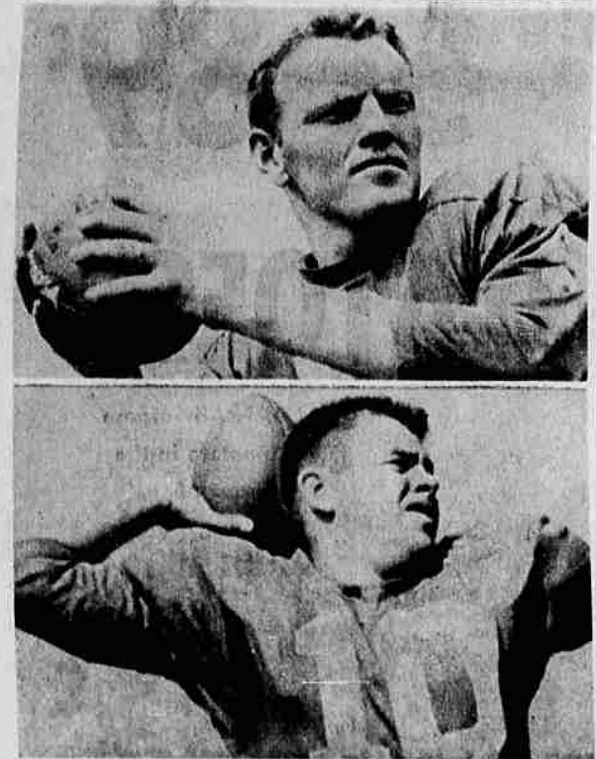
The 89'ers got their win over Salt Lake City by scoring all three of their runs in the third inning. Four singles and a walk did the damage with Heist driving in two of the runs and Hardy the third.

Jerry Nelson pitched the first six innings for the 89'ers to gain credit for the victory — his 14th against seven losses. Jim Golden took over in the seventh when Nelson tired and held the Bees off the rest of the way.

Ben Johnson (10-9) goes for the 89'ers today against Al Lary (12-12) for the Bees in the second game of their three-game set.

In other games Wednesday, Howie Reed gained his 18th victory against seven losses as the Spokane Indians edged the Tacoma Giants, 3-2, and Rac Sluder's three-run homer in the middle of a five-run rally powered the Seattle Rainiers to an 8-4 triumph over the Portland Beavers.

John Werhas' bases — empty homer and a pair of unearned runs accounted for Spokane's runs. The Indians already have clinched the northern division title and will meet the southern division winner in the best-of-seven playoff for the league championship beginning on Sept. 10.

Jim Brown Still Big-Gun For 'New Era' Cleveland Browns

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — A new era gets under way for the Cleveland Browns this year as a new head man — Blanton Collier — tries his hand to come up with a winner.

Collier, a 36-year-old student of football, took over as head coach

in January, succeeding Paul Brown, under whose guidance the Browns roared to four All-American Conference crowns and six consecutive Eastern Division titles in the National Football League. The Browns won their last title in 1957.

Brown will be missing from the field because he was booted upstairs to a vice presidency by youthful owner Art Modell.

The biggest problem facing Collier is coming up with a top-notch running mate for the incomparable Jim Brown, who has gained 7,439 yards in six seasons.

Brown has been the "Mr. Big" of the Browns' ground game, ripping to five consecutive league rushing crowns before being stopped last year.

Via For Position
Ken Webb, a transplanted Detroit Lion, Ernie Green, a second-year man, and rookie Frank Baker, a 215-pounder from Toledo University, are battling for the halfback slot.

With the opening game but 10 days away, it looks as if Frank Ryan will be the starting quarterback. Ryan started slowly this spring but caught fire on the

West Coast to push Jim Ninowski into the back-up job.

The new era also will see the quarterback doing most of the play-calling, although Collier plans to send in plays when the situation warrants it.

Collier plans to employ a wide-open offense, including such things as a double-wing, men in motion and receivers flooding one-side. He believes that "pro football can't be played conservatively."

Makes Strong Bid
Clifton McNeil of Grambling College is making a strong bid to win a berth as a pass receiver, the strongest point on the team.

McNeil, a skinny-appearing youngster, possesses blazing speed and is sure-handed.

Other youngsters who have a good chance of making the team as receivers are: rookie Tom Hutchinson, the Browns' No. 1 choice last December, and Gary Collins, former Maryland standout, now in his second year.

Rich Kreitling, former Big Ten star, Ray Renfro, a 12-year man, and Johnny Brewer also are standouts of the Browns' catching corps.

Cards Cut Dodgers NL Lead To 5; Yankees Fatten AL Lead To 12½

General manager Bing Devine says he can see "definite signs" of a St. Louis Cardinals pennant victory despite a wavering voice from Los Angeles that keeps saying that's a lot of birdseed.

Devine claims that the Cardinals players, all fired up by a seven-game winning streak which has cut the Dodgers' lead to five games, honestly feel they can overtake Walt Alston's crew.

The Cards, who beat the Mets, 6-5, Wednesday night while the Cubs downed the Dodgers, 2-1, in 11 innings have two big things going for them — the schedule and a burning desire to win the pennant as a fitting farewell for retiring Stan Musial.

Fifteen of the Cardinals' remaining 23 games are scheduled at home and that includes three

with the Dodgers.

As for the 42-year-old Musial, he has no intention of sitting around and not contributing his share.

Stan the Man socked the 473rd homer of his career Wednesday night and his 10th of the season with one man on in the fifth inning after Bill White had hammered his 24th homer in the fourth.

Ken Boyer, however, broke a 5-4 tie when he singled off loser Larry Bearnarth in the seventh for his 100th run batted in of the year. Sam (Toothpick) Jones pitched to one batter in the seventh and that was enough to earn him his second victory.

Ken Hubbs snapped a four-game Dodger winning streak by singling home Andre Rodgers in the 11th inning with the winning

run for the Cubs.

In other National League games, the Braves blanked the Pirates, 1-0, as Warren Spahn won his 19th, the Phillies nipped the Reds, 3-2, and the Giants defeated the Colts, 8-3.

The Yankees' magic number now is 11 and that adds up to a rather empty invitation Commissioner Ford Frick extended to the Twins and the White Sox.

Frick invited both Wednesday, as well as the Yankees, to attend a meeting in Chicago next Monday for the purpose of discussing World Series arrangements.

Can't you just picture representatives of the Twins and White Sox standing around at that meeting twiddling their thumbs and trying to make themselves believe it'll all be different next year?

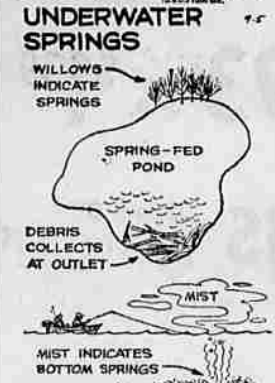
One thing is sure: They can forget about this year unless they plan a private squabble of their own for second place. But who ever remembers which team finished second by Christmas?

The White Sox dropped to third when the Athletics beat them twice, 4-2 and 7-3; the Tigers ripped the Red Sox, 6-1, and the Orioles edged past the Indians, 6-5.

Steelhead Fishing Good On N Umpqua

PORTLAND (UPI) — The week-end fishing outlook, prepared by the Oregon State Game Commission:

Northwest: Salmon angling slowing in Tillamook-Nestucca district; some chinook and sea-run cutthroat taken in Salmon River; Depoe and Yaquina bays fair; Siletz jaws and Alsea tidewater also fair. McKenzie and lower Willamette good for trout on flies. Clear Lake good, other Cascade lakes fair to good.

Southwest: North Umpqua and lower Rogue good for summer steelhead, Salmon angling slowing in Winchester Bay, Coos Bay, lower Umpqua and Smith river, some boats reporting good albacore tuna catches 15 miles off Coos Bay bar. Silver salmon angling excellent over Rogue bar; chinooks and jacks plentiful inside the bay. Trout angling good at Diamond Lake.

Central: Lower Deschutes good for steelhead, Trout angling fair to good at Ochoco and Pelton reservoirs; good on bait in Deschutes at Warm Springs; good at Wickiup and Crane Prairie reservoirs; good on flies at North Twin; excellent on troll at Three Creek Lake. Paulina Lake good on bait during day on flies in evening. Odell Lake good, most Klamath County waters fair.

Northeast: Steelheading fair in Columbia River in McNary area, good in lower Grande Ronde and Wenaha River, spotty on lower Imnaha, good in Eagle Creek, McKay Reservoir good for trout. Rainbow biting in Wallawa River, Eagle Creek, Anthony Lake and Unity Reservoir.

Southeast: Malheur Reservoir good for small rainbow. Fish Lake in Harney County, Thompson Valley Reservoir in Lake County good; most other areas slow.

Pinson Charged With Assault Of Cincinnati Sports Writer

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Cincinnati Reds outfielder Vada Pinson was charged with assault and battery Wednesday night following his second skirmish in little over a year with the same sports writer.

The writer — Earl Lawson of the Cincinnati Post and Times-Star — filed the warrant. He said Pinson "grabbed my neck and shoved me against a wall" of the Cincinnati clubhouse after a night game in which Philadelphia defeated the Reds, 3-2.

Pinson posted \$300 bond and was freed. He was scheduled to appear for a hearing in police court today.

The incident was touched off by a story Lawson wrote for Tuesday editions of the paper in which he said Pinson could win the National League batting championship if he would bat occasionally.

At the time of the writing, Pinson was third in the league with a .322 average.

Pinson accosted Lawson on his way out of the clubhouse after

interviewing players for a

story.

"He blocked my path and started waving the story I had written in front of me with profanity flowing," Lawson said. "I started to walk away and he grabbed my shirt around the collar. He pulled me toward him, ripping the shirt. I tried to walk away again and he pushed me up against the wall. I made no retaliation and said nothing. Then I called the police."

Police Enter Clubhouse

Pinson was visibly upset when police entered the clubhouse and advised him to go with them to the station to post bond so they wouldn't be required to get a warrant and take him forcibly. Lawson signed the warrant at the police station and Pinson posted bond immediately and was released.

Pinson did not deny Lawson's accusation. He complained that the writer "always criticizes us when we're on the road, hoping we won't get to read it."

"My job isn't to hunt," Pinson said. "If the man (Cincinnati manager Fred Hutchinson) told me to hunt, I would. But he hasn't said anything to me about hunting. You don't drive home 86 runs hunting."

The first incident involving Pinson and Lawson occurred in June, 1962, at Pittsburgh. On that occasion, Pinson took issue with something Lawson had written and punched him in the face.

Robinson Gets Angry
After Wednesday night's skirmish between Pinson and Lawson, Pinson's road roommate, Frank Robinson, almost got in a fight with Lawson's baseball-writing sidekick, Cy Bureick of the Dayton, Ohio, Daily News.

Robinson accused Bureick of being "just like Lawson. You're all alike."

After arguing face to face with Bureick for several minutes, Robinson and Bureick parted.

Pinson explained that he was referring to another incident earlier this season in Los Angeles when he reportedly got into "a little trouble" with Hutchinson.

"Both of them (Lawson and Bureick) gave me their word they wouldn't print what I told them in an off-the-record interview in which I explained the Hutchinson situation," Robinson said. "But the next day the story appeared in a Louisville, Ky., paper. I don't blame Vada. He should have knocked Lawson down."
