

Grid All-Stars Return To Pace Riddle Attack

Lack of depth and experience at key spots will present the Riddle Irish with their biggest stumbling block in defending their Umpqua Valley League football title.

Coach David Campbell, at the helm of the Irish for his first season, feels that his team will have strong competition from the Douglas Trojans, the Myrtle Creek Vikings and the Glendale Wildcats in the race for the UVL crown.

Replacing such stalwarts as end Gary Frahm, fullback Bill Markham, halfback John Brown and tackle Tom Roberts poses a major problem for the Riddle coaching staff.

However, four UVL all-stars are back to provide a strong nucleus for the defending champions. The quartet of all-stars is evenly divided between linemen and backs.

In the backfield Mike Markham, honorable mention quarterback on the 1962 UVL all-star team, is returning to serve as field general for the Irish. Markham, a junior, is a two-year veteran capable of threading the needle with the pigskin.

Tom Morrison, another junior, heads the list of ball carriers after a stunning '62 season at a halfback position. Morrison was named to the first unit of the all-star team last year.

All-star linemen returning includes center Jay Ball and end Keith Hanson. Ball and Hanson were both second team choices on the all-conference team last year. In addition to being an outstanding end, Hanson is also capable of charging the line from the fullback spot.

Hanson and halfback Gary Paetz are three year lettermen, while two-year veterans joining Markham are tackle-guard Merle Blankenship, fullback Larry Ruckel and tackle Dave Nearing. Other returning lettermen are ends Art Fisher and Charles Preston, Morrison and Ball.

Top prospects among the newcomers to the Irish roster are tackle Al James, Rusty Akers and Mike Brown; guards Jack Gent, John Sorenson and Bob Lakin; end Jim Owens; center Ken Vedder; quarterback Fred Wagner and halfback Mike Rasmussen.

Campbell reports that 42 boys reported for tryouts at Riddle, and the boys are displaying excellent spirit while preparing for the season. Campbell is assisted in the coaching department by John Zarneke.

The Irish will open the 1963 season Sept. 13 against Pacific's Pirates at Pacific. Kick-off time for the opening game is 8 p.m. In UVL action the Irish will test the power of the Glendale Wildcats in their conference opener Oct. 5 at Glendale.

McKinley Last U. S. Hope In National Tennis Tourney

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (UPI)—The moment of truth is approaching for chunky Chuck McKinley and his aching back.

Sooner or later, the ailing Wimbledon champ from San Antonio, Tex., will have to forget about his torn muscle and turn on all the power—like maybe today when he faces 18-year-old Thomas Koch of Brazil in a bid for a semifinal slot in the U.S. tennis championships.

Brazil was famous hereabouts chiefly for coffee and gal tennis as Maria Bueno, but that thinking changed Thursday when Brazil's Ron Barnes flattened third-seeded golden boy Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., in straight sets and gained one semifinal along with lanky Frank Froehling of Coral Gables, Fla.

There are some who think Koch, a movie actor type, is even better than Barnes. Koch is a stylish left-hander who required only four sets earlier in the tournament to knock out seventh-seeded American Davis Cupper Gene Scott of St. James, N.Y.

"I'm erratic," says Koch. "Some days good, some days bad." McKinley has been limping along at about half his normal stroke speed since injuring his back in the first round but he says he'll be ready when the time comes.

Unless he's ready for Koch, U.S. chances of winning its home championship for the first time since 1885 will be slim. Unseeded Marty Riessen of Evanston, Ill., was matched against fourth-seeded Rafael Osuna of Mexico in today's other quarter-final with Osuna strongly favored.

Senators' Top Hitter Beaten By Yank Hurler
NEW YORK (UPI) — Chuck Hinton, the Washington Senators' leading hitter, remained hospitalized in "satisfactory" condition today after being beaten Thursday by New York Yankee pitcher Ralph Terry.

The 24-year-old outfielder was hit behind the left ear by a pitch in the third inning of the game and was carried from the field on a stretcher and taken to Lenox Hill Hospital.

Doctors said he suffered a concussion but not broken bones and would be held for observation for 24 to 48 hours.

FOSS SAYS SEATTLE NEEDS NEW STADIUM
SEATTLE (UPI) — This Puget Sound metropolis may sit and visit a long time for professional football if it demands a franchise commitment before it builds a stadium.

Plain-speaking Joe Foss, president of the American Football League, said if a city wants a pro football franchise, "you have to go after it."

He spoke after representatives of two groups described plans to build a stadium for pro football in the Seattle area. One group hopes to build a sports center near Kent, midway between Seattle and Tacoma. The other is thinking in terms of a floating, all-weather arena, tied to the city's waterfront on Elliott Bay.

He said the Seattle-Tacoma area has been considered seriously and probably would have a pro football team today if it had a stadium large enough to seat 40,000. The University of Washington football stadium, with a seating capacity of 55,000, is not available for pro football.

CAUTION WITH FIRE URGED FOR HUNTERS
SALEM (UPI) — State game director Phil Schneider Wednesday reminded hunters to use the utmost caution with fire during the hunting seasons now underway.

He added that failure to comply with fire safety rules could result in the closure of the upland game bird and big game hunting seasons.

The game director said the cool and damp summer has influenced the growth of grasses and shrubs, and with the drying autumn this year, a fire hazard in many parts of the state.

'Firehouse Four' Shine For Ducks
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — The same enthusiasm which prevailed throughout spring practice is once again evident during the early fall workouts of Oregon's 1963 football team.

Coach Len Casanova's Ducks, nearing the end of their first full week of workouts, are going through their practice paces with eagerness and hustle.

The Ducks' highly-regarded "Firehouse Four" backfield has displayed loads of class with All-American halfback Mel Renfro proving why he earned that high rating a year ago in every practice session.

Quarterback Bob Berry looks even sharper than last fall, halfback Larry Hill is his usual reliable self and fullback Lu Bain has taken to his new home with amazing compatibility.

Not all the early workout standouts, however, have been on offense. The Webfoot linebackers have proved to be tenacious and vicious defenders.

Junior center Oliver McKinney has been downright devastating and he's had plenty of capable assistance from junior center Ron Stratton, sophomore centers Don Causey and Dave Tobey and sophomore fullback Tim Casey.

Webfoot ranks have been pared slightly with the loss of three performers expected to return for the current campaign. Sophomore guard Jim Ritchko and sophomore fullback Bud Harrington have been forced to give up the sport because of medical reasons, while junior quarterback Terry DeSylvia decided not to return to Oregon and indicated to Casanova he would transfer to a smaller school.

DUCK PUBLICATION IS NOW AVAILABLE
The Fish and Wildlife Service of the U. S. Department of the Interior announces publication of a 24-page booklet, "Ducks at a Distance."

It contains information on identification of species by color areas, sound and flock formations. It also provides a back cover index giving hunters an opportunity to test their own powers of identification. Illustrations by Artist Bob Hines are used in connection with the various facts aiding in identification.

Because "moderate increases" have been forecast for Pacific, Central and Mississippi flyways, as contrasted with a "small increase" for the Atlantic flyway, the Fish and Wildlife Service anticipates many hunters new to the waterfowl hunting sport. The book, it is stated will be of particular value to the new hunters.

The booklet is being made available for 25 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, 25, D.C.
