### Oregon To Invite Game Convention

Oregon will extend an invitation to the International Fish and Game Association to meet in Portland in 1965. John Amacher, Roseburg, state game commissioner, reports Amacher in company with Phil Schneider, state game director, and Charles Campbell, assistant, will leave Portland Sunday morning by plane for Minneapolis where the 1963 convention will be held. This meeting, Amacher reports, brings together approximately 1,000 fish and game experts from all over the world to discuss technical subjects and to exchange experiences and ideas. Amacher has represented the Oregon Game Commission at the annual meeting for several successive years. Last year's meeting was held at Jackson Hole, Wyo. The convention in 1964, it is stated, probably will go to the Atlantic Coast. The Oregon delegation is carrying an invitation for the 1965 meeting to be held in Portland.

### O'Neil Play Is Next For Merely Players

Merely Players Inc. held a special board meeting at Umpqua West Theater Thursday night to decide on a substitution for the play "The Rainmaker," originally scheduled to be the next production of the group. According to Glen Yates, publicity chairman, script for this play has been withdrawn because of the fact it is to be made into a musical. As soon as the script arrives, a call for tryouts will be issued, Yates said.

## New Construction In City Climbs Past \$3 Million

New construction within the city of Roseburg climbed past the \$3 million mark during August, with another million plus dollars of construction for the month. The new Douglas Community Hospital addition was largely responsible for the August total of \$1,023,785. The hospital permit taken out by Todd Building Co. was for \$922,333. Plans call for expansion of the present facilities and reconstruction of some of the existing hospital for greater utility. One other new building permit was issued to Oscar Tufts for a new building to house his Douglas Machine and Welding business at 2335 NE Diamond Lake Blvd., for

\$15,500. Tufts is leasing his present building at 1735 NE Diamond Lake to Umpqua Motor & Implement Co., which will move there about Oct. 1. This building is being enlarged to include a show room on the front end.

Top commercial repair permit is that of the Umpqua Hotel. Todd Building also took out the permit for this job at \$32,269 for construction. The hotel announces a \$50,000 approximate expenditure for converting certain rooms into 14 apartments.

Rushton & Reynolds Music Store obtained a \$3,500 permit for remodeling their building front, and the Silver Nook Cafe took out a \$500 permit for minor remodeling. Home building was at a minimum. Only two permits were issued, one to Kerby Glass, 1777 NW Calkins Rd., for \$12,304, and the other to R. D. Hill, 1513 NW Keasey Road, \$14,756.

The report of Building Inspector Oliver Eggleston showed 38 permits, including four plumbing for \$1,725; 11 electrical for \$3,880; 9 dwelling repairs, \$11,100; 3 commercial repairs, \$36,296; 2 commercial for \$337,833, and 7 miscellaneous for \$5,925.

### County's Building Permits \$157,700

The Douglas County Planning Commission reports building permits for \$157,700 issued during August. Hult Lumber Co. obtained one permit for a shop for \$5,000 and another for a storage shed for \$7,000.

Commercial construction lists a winery at Elgarose for \$1,000 and remodeling of a Roadside Cafe, \$300. Permits were obtained for 10 dwellings for a total value of \$141,500; two additions to dwellings, \$1,500 and three garages and carports, \$1,400.

### Colony Market Being Enlarged And Modernized

Work was started this week on enlargement of The Colony Market, located on NW Keasy and Calkins roads. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Greenfield are the lease operators.

Total of 700 square feet will be added to enlarge the building by about one-third, in addition to modernizing the present market building.

To be added are a 10-by-12-foot walk-in refrigerator and addition of frozen fruit cases. The building will have new lighting and other improvements to meet the growing need of this residential area, it was announced.

### Oakland Branch Bank Undergoing Remodeling

The Oakland Branch of the Douglas County State Bank is undergoing remodeling and redecorating, reports correspondent Edith Dunn, Oakland.

### V. Schuetze To Attend Insurance Conference

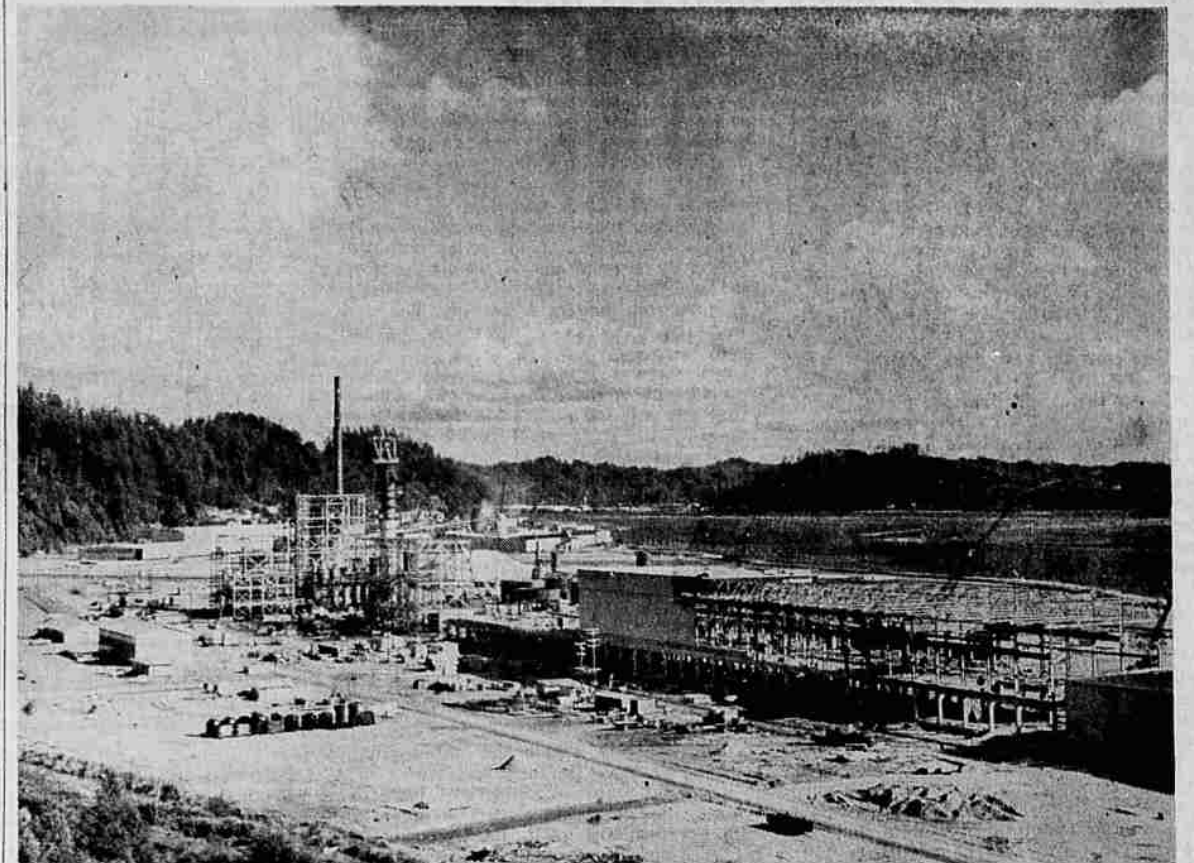

### Bank Debits Increase In West Central Oregon

Bank debits for the West Central Oregon area including Coos, Douglas, Lane counties increased in July, 1963, compared to July, 1962. The University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research has reported.

Debits for July, 1963, totaled \$248,726,555. For June, 1963, the total was \$240,402,508, and for July, 1962, the total was \$236,670,914.

Oregon, with 261 banks reporting had an increase in bank debits in July, 1963, of plus 13.7 per cent as compared with June, 1963 and an increase of plus 14.4 per cent as compared with July, 1962.
