It's a unique experiment at a unique institution.

OCI is a maximum security prison without walls for first felony offenders sentenced to 10 years or less.

Situated at the foot of green, rolling hills, the green-painted main cellblock is surrounded by gardens.

In place of the traditional prison walls is a double fence watched day and night by armed tower guards.

For First Offenders
OCI was designed to isolate first offenders from the hardened criminals housed in the State Prison.

The emphasis is on rehabilitation. Shops offer courses in trades that can provide a livelihood for inmates on the "outside."

For those who want to enroll, there are courses on personality improvement, subjects such as public speaking. The new Jaycee club is a part of the unique rehabilitation project.

The chartering ceremonies will follow the 6:30 p.m. Sunday night dinner in the OCI dining hall, when the chapter's 26 members will be sworn in.

Attending the ceremonies will be national Jaycee vice president Ernest Lewis of Pleasant Hill, Calif.; Washington state president Robert Curtis and Oregon State president Frank Brawner.

George Flowers, Salem Jaycee and national director for the state organization, said the new inmate members "adapted themselves amazingly fast to the operation of a Jaycee club, despite the fact that we have to operate under the strict rules of a penal institution."

Among "external" projects are the providing of a portable altar for religious services at the new Marion County juvenile home, a

state-wide cooperative project with other Jaycees to repair bicycles and tricycles to be donated to underprivileged children, and the "adoption" of a Korean orphan.

"Internal" projects include gathering books for the OCI library, promotion of the institution's blood drive, an art contest, and the traditional self-improvement Jaycee courses.

Formation of the club began more than a year ago, after the State Board of control okayed the project.

Flowers said "because of the great possibility for rehabilitation of young men," he plans to make a national project out of promoting Jaycee chapters in other penal institutions.

Giggling Christine Keeler Charged In London Court

LONDON (UPI) — Scandal girl Christine Keeler, giggling nervously and her long hair in disarray, was formally charged in a London Magistrate's Court today with perjury and conspiracy to obstruct justice.

The charges grew out of the assault trial of one of her former Jamaican lovers, jazz singer Aloysius (Lucky) Gordon, accused of beating her up.

Miss Keeler, a key figure in the big Profumo scandal, and three alleged co-conspirators were ordered released on bail following a 10-minute hearing at which she was charged with "willfully" making false statements in the case.

Gordon appealed his conviction and three-year sentence on the assault charge and the Appeals Court rescinded the sentence on the basis of secret new evidence.

Although it was anticipated the arrest and charging of Miss Keeler with two other women and a man, may open a Pandora's box of new scandal, this morning's court proceedings were routinely quiet.

Miss Keeler had spent the night in jail — a new experience for the 21-year-old red-haired beauty whose affections brought the downfall of War Minister John Profumo three months ago and set off a scandal that almost toppled the government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

The other three suspects were Paula Hamilton-Marshall, 21, a friend of Christine, Mrs. Olive

Booker, Miss Hamilton-Marshall's maid, and Rudolf Fenton, a Jamaican. The two women were charged with perjury and conspiracy and Fenton was charged with conspiracy.

All were arrested Thursday night.

No evidence was presented in this morning's brief hearing, attended by about 30 spectators and an equal number of newsmen.

Christine carried her usual air of glamour, although her hair was uncombed. She was dressed in a smart olive-green wool suit with plunging neckline. The formal charges described her as a model.

The charges alleged that the defendants conspired to conceal from police "that on the night of the alleged assault (by Gordon) Miss Keeler had been assaulted by someone else, and that some of the injuries alleged to have been caused by Gordon could have been caused during the earlier assault."

Gordon had claimed he was being "framed" as a cover-up for some prominent person.

A further charge against Christine was that on June 6, at the Central Criminal Court where she appeared as a witness against Gordon, she "did willfully make a statement material in that trial which she knew to be false, or did not believe to be true" concerning the presence of another man at her apartment on the night of alleged assault.

Nightspot Lampoons Miss America Event

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI) — When shapely "Miss America" of 1963 is announced she screams her surprise, loses control of her crown and stumbles onto a pedestal.

Master of ceremonies "Bert Barks" sings:

"... She'll make a million dollars winning fortune and fame — 'By 1964 we won't remember her name."

"Oh, here she comes, 'Shedding a tear, she comes — 'Miss America, we love you.' This isn't the Miss America pageant at Atlantic City, N. J."

It's a back-hand version produced by an irreverent coffee house group in Minneapolis known as the Brave New Workshop.

In the third annual satirical "Miss America" pageant, now showing at the Cafe Espresso, "Laura Lovely," the local "Miss Minnesota," wins every time.

As an experiment last fall, the workshop sneaked one of its actresses, Mrs. Paul Williams, into the Miss St. Paul contest. She was so deliberately bad that half the audience wept for her and half roared with laughter.

The Brave New Workshop's "Miss America" pageant features three contestants — "Emily Plain" of South Dakota, "Esther Keene" of California, and "Laura Lovely"

the local favorite.

Laura is a graduate student in art appreciation. "I love books," she smiles. "Mostly orange ones. That's my favorite color."

The reigning queen, "Mary Maudlin of Painful, S. C.," pops in to sing the aria that won her the coveted title. Barks applauds: "It's exciting to hear her sing that for the last time."

Cave-In Hits Fellin Mine

SHEPPTON, Pa. (UPI) — The main shaft of the Fellin Coal Co. mine in which three men were trapped Aug. 13 began to cave in Friday leaving an ever-widening hole at the surface.

An hour after the walls of the slope gave way there was a hole about 35 feet in diameter at the surface. Ralph Lambert, chief mining engineer for the state Department of Mines, said right now (the slide) apparently has stopped.

Miners at the scene said that apparently the east wall of the slope gave way at the bottom and continued upward. First indication of the collapse appeared about 10 feet east of the mine entrance.

As dirt sank into the 300-foot shaft the hole at the surface widened in a westerly direction. One miner said there was "no telling" how much of the surface would eventually collapse into the shaft.

One of the three men, Louis Bo-va, 54, still is trapped below the surface and his wife said Thursday she would petition the Schuylkill County Court next week to declare him legally dead.
