Harry G. Anderson and Leo Ragan, dba A. & R. Tire Co. vs. Joe Heidrich. Plaintiff demands judgment against defendant for \$1,067 plus interest, attorney fees and costs alleged due on promissory note.

Mary Ella Johnson vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. Plaintiff asks reopening of her claim and award of temporary total disability with further medical and surgical treatment as needed, or in the alternative, permanent partial disability equal to 100 per cent loss of function of an arm for injuries to her back and 75 per cent loss of function of a leg for injuries to her right hip and leg. Injuries claimed suffered Sept. 1, 1960, while she was picking pears and fell from an 8-foot ladder while employed by Clarence L. Mabley.

Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Federal Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 P.M., October 8, 1963, for all merchantable timber marked or designated for cutting on an area embracing 214 acres, more or less, within section 32, T. 29 S., R. 1 E., and sections 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, T. 30 S., R. 1 E., W.M., surveyed in the Umpqua National Forest, Oregon. The estimated volumes are: 575 M board feet of Douglas-fir, 105 M board feet of sugar pine and other species of pine, 70 M board feet of white fir and other species. The minimum acceptable bid per M board feet is as follows: Douglas-fir \$22.15, sugar pine and other species of pine \$17.00, white fir and other species \$9.20. This includes the following rates, per M board feet for stumpage including deposit for sale area betterment: \$3.00 base rate plus an additional \$17.20 for Douglas fir, \$3.00 base rate plus an additional \$12.05 for sugar pine and other species of pine, \$2.00 base rate plus an additional \$5.25 for white fir and other species and \$1.95 for slash disposal for all species. The stumpage rates payable for each species will be increased by the amortization rate in effect for that species when the unamortized estimated cost of the main haul roads has been amortized by timber sealed. The unamortized estimated cost is \$790.00. Amortization rates are Douglas-fir, \$1.06 per M board feet, sugar pine and other species of pine \$1.06 per M board feet, and white fir and other species, \$1.06 per M board feet. Amortization of estimated main haul road costs is computed on 100 percent of the estimated timber volume. The prices bid for stumpage shall be considered as tentative rates subject to quarterly calendar adjustment upward or downward by 0.5 of the difference between the average of the monthly Douglas-fir region indices, as calculated by the Forest Service or the Western Pine Association Lumber Price Index for the three previous months, and the following base indices: Douglas-fir 110.00 (D), sugar pine and other species of pine 107.54, white fir and other species 93.00 (A). Such adjustments in the price for stumpage shall be applicable to timber sealed during the three-month period following the quarter for which the adjustment is computed. Decrease Noted In Fire Acreage

Forestry officials in Oregon and Washington have reported some decrease from last year in the number of acres burned by forest and range fires this summer.

Oregon state Forester Dwight Phipps said recently 589 fires on state-protected land through the end of August had burned 5,120 acres, most of it grassland. During the same period last year, 587 fires burned 6,148 acres.

The Washington State Department of Natural Resources reported today 786 fires so far this year have burned 1,262 acres. In the first eight months of 1962, 616 fires burned 1,410 acres.

In Portland, U.S. Forest Service chief dispatcher Clarence Edgington said 1,121 forest fires in the two states through August burned 3,336 acres. The figures do not include two national forests in Eastern Washington.

Only three fires were reported on state-protected land in Oregon Wednesday, despite one of the worst fireweather days of the season. The Forest Service had seven in Oregon and Washington.
