

Hoosier Parents Are Protesting 'Fire Trap' Condition Of Schools

COALMONT, Ind. (UPI) — Determined parents kept up their marathon "around the clock siege" of the high school in this small Hoosier town today in protest of alleged "fire trap" schools in nearby Midland and Jasonville.

For eight days men and women, farmers and housewives, have picketed the high school in six daily shifts of four hours each in numbers ranging from 10 to 50.

State Sen. Kenneth Reagin said they were protesting such things as a loose fireproof ceiling, broken concrete steps and railings, and roosting pigeons at the junior high school at Jasonville.

At the elementary school at Midland, Reagin said, brick and stone above the east entry was bulging and ready to fall, and dry and rotting wood in the attic presented a fire threat.

He said there were exposed wires in wall sockets, unrepainted and rotten floors, unlocked and openly wired main switch boxes and overflowing water supply tanks in washrooms.

Coalmont, Jasonville and Midland form an equal-sided triangle in west-central Indiana about 20 miles southeast of Terre Haute. Each of the tiny towns — Jasonville is by far the largest with 2,937 population — supports a different level of school for the area.

There is nothing wrong with the high school at Coalmont, Reagin said, but the parents have had what he called "such poor luck" in their protests of the conditions at Jasonville and Midland that they decided to demonstrate against the senior high anyway.

The blockade forced the high school to close. Classes continued with only "normal" absenteeism at Midland and Jasonville.

Observers said teachers were being forced to "teach from memory" because all high school books were behind the locked doors of the blockaded Coalmont high school.

Indiana Fire Marshal Ira Anderson accompanied Reagin on an inspection tour Monday. Anderson said after the inspection that "there were no apparent major violations of state regulation."

Cycling Students End Long Journey

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI) — Two sun-tanned shorts-clad college students who bicycled nearly 1,800 miles from the West Coast delivered a letter from Washington's Gov. Albert D. Rosellini to Gov. Harold E. Hughes Monday.

Hughes was not in his office to receive the letter but it was received in his behalf by his executive assistant, Kirk Boyd. David Hedman, 20, Seattle, and Jon Runnestrand, 20, Ettrick, Wis., left Seattle Aug. 20 carrying the letter in which Rosellini said he was pleased with the number of Iowans who attended the World's Fair at Seattle last year.

They tried to follow the Oregon Trail as much as possible and traveled every day except for the Labor Day weekend when they had to wait for stores to open so they could obtain parts to repair their bicycles.

Hedman said they averaged 100 to 200 miles per day and decided to make the trip "for adventure."

"The trip had nothing to do with President Kennedy's physical fitness program. We're Republicans," Runnestrand told said.

They plan to cycle to Forest City in time for Hedman to enroll at Waldorf Junior College for his sophomore year. Runnestrand, a recent graduate of Waldorf, plans to return to San Francisco where he has a job as a shipping clerk.

Red Chinese-Russian Relations Take New Turn Downward Today

MOSCOW (UPI) — Sino-Soviet relations, already strained to the breaking point, took a new turn downward today with Russia's expulsion of more Chinese for trying to smuggle anti-Soviet literature into the country.

The Kremlin sent a strong protest note Monday to the Red Chinese Embassy regarding the expulsion, according to the official news agency Tass.

The latest incident occurred Saturday at the Naushki crossing point on the border of Mongolia when officials were inspecting the Peking-Moscow train. Tass

said several Chinese "hooligans" had to be expelled.

The incident was the latest in a series of differences that have sent relations between Moscow and Peking spiraling downward over political and ideological issues.

Tass said several Chinese, including members of the train crew, brawled with Soviet officials Saturday and Sunday after the officials confiscated banned literature.

Three Chinese Embassy officials and two other Chinese were expelled from the Soviet Union in June for distributing similar documents.

Western diplomatic sources said the Naushki incident made it appear the Peking regime still is trying to goad the Kremlin.

They pointed out that the incident served to focus attention on border problems once again.

The Chinese four days ago charged the Soviets carried out "large-scale subversive activities in the III region (of Sinkiang China), and enticed and coerced several tens of thousands of Chinese citizens" into Soviet territory in April and May, 1962.

Four Survive Utah Plane Crash

FORT BRIDGER, Wyo. (UPI) — A young man and his three small children told Monday of surviving five nights without food in Northern Utah's rugged Uinta Mountains after their plane crashed.

None of the four was injured in the landing. But all they had was some candy, apples and

cookies which the children's grandmother had given them in Hastings, Neb., before they left. A fisherman found a note which the man, David Brophy, 28, of Silverdale, Wash., had placed on a barricade across a mountain road, and brought the family to Fort Bridger, about 27 miles to the northeast, Sunday.

Brophy's children are Donald, 7, Donna, 5, and Michael, 4. "We were starved," Donald said. "We were cold, too."

His father made a shelter of pine boughs and aerial charts from the plane and the family slept under it. The crash-landing occurred last Tuesday afternoon.

Brophy, an unemployed aircraft mechanic, was flying a pre-war single-engine Taylorcraft from Hastings, where his parents live,

to Silverdale. "I hit a downdraft at 11,000 feet and was unable to come out of it," he said.

He was bruised on the leg in the crash and stayed in the plane until the weekend. Sunday morning, he struck out from the plane and reached a logging road three-quarters of a mile away, he said. He followed the road to the top of the mountain where he left a sign, telling of his plight.

Don Simms of Provo, Utah, on a weekend outing, spotted the sign and found Brophy.

Brophy said the children were brave through most of the ordeal, "but they cried about the airplane being 'all wrecked'."

He added, "All they could figure out was what they wanted to eat when they got out."

Solon Sees Danger To Press Freedom

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A House Republican spokesman has criticized two recent developments within the Kennedy administration as endangering traditional press freedom.

"This could be the beginning of the end of a free press in this country," according to Rep. Bob Wilson, R-Calif.

Wilson made the statement in an article carried in the Republican Congressional Committee's weekly newsletter. Wilson is chairman of the group, which serves as the campaign organization for House Republicans.

The GOP member referred to the recent inauguration of an Agriculture Department farm market wire service and a speech last week by Lee Loevinger, a member of the radio and television industry, that it develop its own, specialized news service rather than rely on the two general services — United Press International and the Associated Press.

Wilson's remark capped a GOP outcry against both developments. Several bills are pending that would prohibit the government from operating a news service.

Critics claim the Agriculture Department news service is competing with privately owned facilities already in this field.

Last week a GOP "task force on news management" delivered a broadside at the Loevinger speech. It interpreted his remarks as a "thinly veiled threat" to take reprisals against broadcasters if they did not carry out the suggestion.
