

# LA Dodgers, Cards Win On Thursday In Tight NL Race

Youth can be wonderful — and the Los Angeles Dodgers have plenty — but the "old men" of the team seem to have taken charge of its 1963 destiny.

These are the men who most resent the choke-up charges they have heard since the San Francisco Giants "stole" the 1962 National League pennant. Gold solid pros... like Wally Moon... Maury Wills... and John Roseboro.

It's clearly the hour of the Dodgers' greatest need, with the St. Louis Cardinals coming on like gangbusters and it's these men who have answered manager Walt Alston's call for help.

Stiffening in the face of the Cardinals charge, the Dodgers have won their last three games to retain their three-game edge over the Cardinals, who've taken 15 of their last 16 including six in a row. First it was Moon driving in two runs in a 4-2 victory, then it was Wills with four hits in a 9-4 triumph, and Thursday night it was Roseboro with a grand slam homer and five runs batted in for a "personal" 5-3 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Under Pressure

The Dodgers started their game in Pittsburgh Thursday night under the most extreme sort of pressure. The Cardinals' 8-3 afternoon victory over the Chicago Cubs already was on the scoreboard and 16-game winner Bob Friend was on the mound for the Pirates.

Roseboro provided the Dodger answer when he went to bat with the bases filled and two out in the first inning — and connected for the second grand slam of his career to send the Dodgers off to a 4-0 lead. Roseboro singled home Moon in the third inning to make it 5-0 and Johnny Podres protected the margin until the eighth when he needed the relief help of Ron Perranoski. The win was Podres' 13th against 10 losses.

The Cardinals continued their

terrific late drive behind the seven-hit, seven-strikeout pitching of Ernie Broglio, who scored his 16th victory. Bill White hit a two-run homer and drove in three runs and Dick Groat and Stan Musial had two hits each in the 11-hit attack.

**Giants Beat Mets**

The San Francisco Giants stopped their two-game skid with a 6-0 win over the New York Mets and the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Houston Colts 4-1, in the only other National League game. In the American League, New York defeated Kansas City, 5-2, Minnesota topped Cleveland, 3-2, and Los Angeles beat Boston, 2-0.

Juan Marichal pitched a four-hitter, struck out 13 and hit his first major league homer to win his 22nd game of the season for the Giants. Felipe Alou sent the Giants in front with a homer off Tracy Stallard's fist pitch of the game and Ed Bailey also homered in San Francisco's 10-hit attack.

Former Dodger star Duke Snider was honored in pre-game ceremonies, which included the introduction of most of the Brooklyn stars of the 1950-57 era. He went hitless in three official trips to the plate but made a leaping one-handed catch to rob Chuck Hiller of an extra-base hit.

Hard-throwing rookie Ray Culp pitched a five-hitter and struck out seven to win his 13th game for the Phillies. Homers by Roy Sievers and Tony Taylor led the Phillies' eight-hit attack.

## Yanks Seek AL Clincher

The New York Yankees, who handle mere mortals with ease, will pit their magic against the mysteries of the supernatural today.

A successful conflict by the New Yorkers against the age-old superstitions represented by a Friday the 13th will result in their fourth straight American League pennant and the 28th in their history.

Their mortal opponents will be the Minnesota Twins, currently holding down second place, 13 games behind the Yankees. Each club has 14 games remaining.

And, as usual, the Yankees have an ace up their sleeve. Even if they lose today, they'll still have three more cracks at Minnesota over the weekend to nail down the flag.

Either Jim Bouton (19-6) or Al Downing (12-4) will work for New York against Twin ace Camilo Pascual (18-8).

The only other team with a slim hope of catching the Yankees is the Chicago White Sox, 14 games off the pace in third place. But just one Yankee win or Chicago loss would eliminate the Sox and any combination of two New York victories or Minnesota defeats would knock out the Twins.

The Yankees moved to the border of mathematical certainty by whipping the Kansas City Athletics, 5-2, Thursday. Stan Williams went the distance to make his season record 8-5 and John Blanchard provided the punch with a two-run homer.

Minnesota kept its faint hopes alive by edging the Cleveland Indians, 3-2, in 10 innings, and in the only other American League game the Los Angeles Angels blanked the Boston Red Sox, 2-0.

Williams was in trouble twice early in the game and finished strong after yielding two runs in the fifth inning. The hard-throwing right-hander gave up eight hits and struck out only three.

Blanchard provided Williams with all the support he needed for his 15th home run in the fourth inning after the Yankees had scored once in the second. Moe Drabowsky (6-12) was the loser.

Don Lee pitched four-hit ball in 100-degree weather before 1,530 fans, the smallest crowd ever to witness a major league ballgame in Los Angeles. It was the eighth victory in 18 decisions for Lee. The Angels scored both their runs in the seventh inning on a sacrifice fly by Jim Fregosi and a Boston error.

# Roseburg Opens Grid Season Tonight

## Willamette Is Foe For Favored Tribe

Roseburg's rugged Indians will get their "baptism of fire" tonight on the Willamette gridiron against the scrappy Wolverines as the full Midwestern League (District 5-A-1) schedule gets under way.

Kick-off time for the season's opener is 8 p.m. Elsewhere in league play Cottage Grove will be at Marshfield, Sheldon will be at Springfield and Thurston will be at South Eugene. Saturday the lone game finds North Bend playing North Eugene at Eugene's Civic Stadium.

The Tribe, boasting a big, experienced crew, will go into tonight's game as the favorite because of their overwhelming size which has given them the label as the team to topple in league play. Strongest support to teams given a chance to keep the Indians from winning their third consecutive district title is being offered to Springfield, Marshfield and Cottage Grove.

While the Wolverines do not have the size to match the Indians, they are reported to have good spirit and will be gunning for an upset of the invaders. Coach Floyd Ogden feels his team will battle from start to finish, despite having only eight varsity lettermen back to form the nucleus of the 1963 squad.

On the other hand, 18 veterans of varsity warfare give the Redskins experience, while the remainder of the team has seen plenty of action on Jayvee and sophomore teams.

Defense has become a keyword in Roseburg plans under coach Roy Thompson, and this year is no exception. The defensive line is one, if not the, biggest in the state with the "Ferocious Four" of Doug DuFresne (205), Jesse Hart (220), Terry Rudolf (215) and Dennis Frank (210) plugging the holes. The linebacker spots will be filled by Dick Gwaltney, Dick Yost, Mike Leep and Vince Peetz.

Anchoring the line and providing leadership for the team is two-time all-league center Phil Daniels. Daniels, tipping the scales at 175 pounds, ranks as one of the top prep centers in the state.

The Trojans will have a pair of tough guards in David Rust and Bryan Lansing, a duo of newcomers breaking into the starting lineup. At the tackle positions will be a pair of 200-pounders, Larry Rust and Jerry Langdon. Larry Rust is a two-year veteran, while Langdon is a transfer student.

At the end spots Wolfe lists three boys as regulars, with the trio set to change back and forth to give the Trojans fresh pass receivers at all times. The top trio consists of Ron Stobbe, an all-conference choice last year, Russ Anderson and Chuck Person. The three are all lettermen.

In the backfield along with quarterback Withers will be rugged fullback Jim Heard, a 188-pound junior with plenty of power, and halfback lettermen Don Mincher and Ray Shepherd.

Plenty of line reserve strength will come from end David Proctor, guard Mike Loerts, defensive starter at guard, Warren Hill, defensive end Robert Trimble, and center Roy Ellis. Hill is the giant of the team at 270 pounds on a 6-1 frame. All are lettermen.

Backfield reserve power will come from quarterback and defensive back Gary Brown, Bruce Thrasher, sophomore halfbacks Pat Patterson and Bob Langdon and sophomore fullback Bill Heard. Brown was the second team quarterback last year before being injured early in the season.

The Trojans will open the season Saturday when they host the always-strong Coquille Red Devils in a 2 p.m. encounter. The first league outing finds the Trojans hosting the Sutherlin Bulldogs Oct. 5.

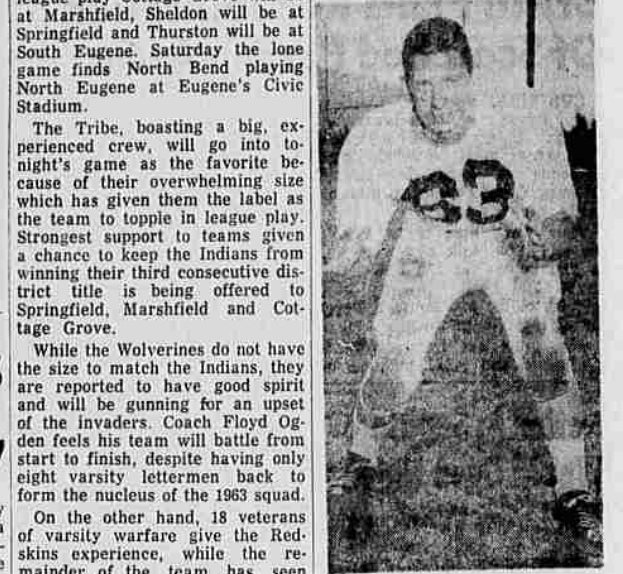
