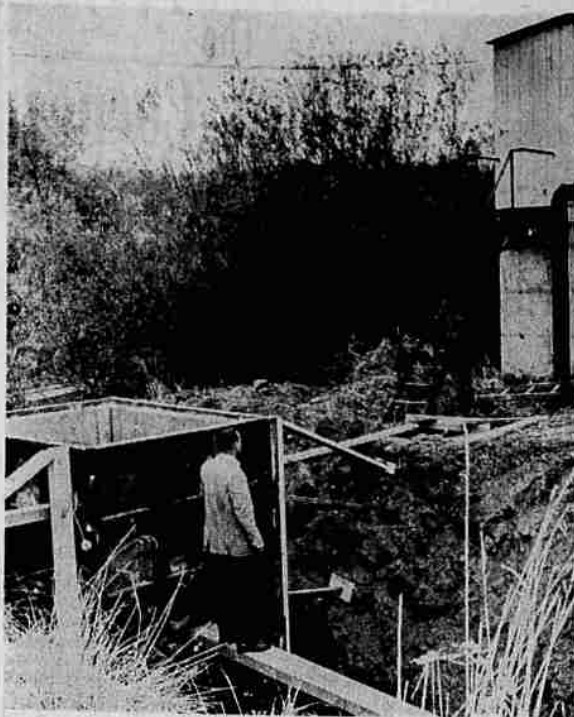

Water Corp. Installs New Intake For Oakland Plant

The Oregon Water Corp. has just completed installation of an intake structure to convert water from Calapooia Creek to a pump site nearby, announces Alton Andrews, Roseburg-Oakland area manager.

The intake permits screening out of floating debris and settling of sand before the water reaches the pump. In the past this has been

a problem with flowing material clogging the pump resulting in a short supply of water to the town from time to time.

The company also encountered the problem of heavy sand remaining in the filters after the "backwash" from the filtration plant for cleaning purposes. This sand would limit the life of the filter beds if allowed to continue.

Installation of the intake, costing around \$2,000, is part of a \$50,000 investment which the company has made to provide Oakland with satisfactory water supply.

The improvements include installation of a complete new filtration plant and two pumps, one of them a standby pump. The total represents about a 50 per cent increase in investment in the overall water system. The company also has put in a new main which increases the supply of water to Oakland Old Town.

The new intake is located about 30 feet from Calapooia Creek. A 42-inch pipe leads into the intake box, which is about 5-by-4 feet in dimensions. From it leads 24-inch pipes to pumps on either side. Water then is pumped into the filtration plant.

Construction of a small coffer dam was necessary to divert the stream water in order to dig down to bedrock for the intake installation.

Economic Picture Reported Favorable During August

With the settlement of the recent labor dispute and further aided by favorable weather conditions all firms in the logging and wood-working industries are operating at peak capacities, according to the report for August of F. C. Riley, manager of the Oregon State Employment Service.

An increase in the wholesale and retail trades can also be anticipated, he notes. Construction activities continue to progress at a rapid pace. The major project in Roseburg—The Roseburg Plaza, including the new Safeway and Pay Less Drug stores, is scheduled for completion within the next 30 to 60 days.

The string bean harvest is now mostly completed. During Aug. 92 young people under 22 years of age were placed in employment through the local employment office at 846 SE Pine St. The active file of job applicants is now at a

seasonal low, numbering 586 of whom 254 are female. Job opportunities should continue at a favorable level for the next 30 to 60 days.

New job applications stood at 240 in August, compared to 306 in July and 349 in August of 1962. Job placements numbered 283, compared with 201 and 402, and initial claims at 263, 546 and 412 for the three periods respectively. The average weekly number who claimed a week of joblessness was 355, compared with 459 and 320. The per cent of insured unemployment as compared to the average covered employment for the areas indicated showed Roseburg at 2.8 as against that for four weeks ago of 3.7, a year ago at 2.6, two years ago 3.9 and three years ago at 2.8.

The Grants Pass area percentage was 4.8; North Bend 3.8, Eugene 2.8 and the state total 2.6.

W. E. Garrison Completes Banking School At Seattle

William E. Garrison, president of the Douglas County State Bank, has completed a three-year course at the Pacific Coast Banking School in Seattle and received a diploma at formal graduation ceremonies Sept. 6.

The school, organized in 1938 is one of five regional banking schools in the United States and is held annually at the University of Washington for two weeks during the summer months.

Bankers from Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Ore-

gon, Utah and Washington comprised this year's entire student body of more than 400, with 125 in the graduating class.

Members of each class of the school's three-year course, both in the commercial and trust divisions, attend day and evening classes conducted by an impressive and authoritative faculty which now includes 30 leading bankers, educators, professional men and trust officers from throughout the country.

Lumbermen Slate Meet On Grades

What will be the new streamlined size of dry and green west coast lumber?

This question will be answered at a district meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association to be held at the Rogue Valley Country Club, Medford, on Tuesday, Sept. 17. The dinner meeting will start with social hour at 6 and dinner at 7 o'clock.

All lumber manufacturers in Southern Oregon and Northern California are urged to attend, reports G. C. Edgett, executive vice president of the association. This will be one of five district meetings being held in Washington, Oregon and California to acquaint lumber producers with the latest developments in the proposed change in grading rules governing west coast lumber, Edgett said.

Principal speakers will be Nils Hult, president of West Coast Lumbermen's Association; Milton Luton, vice chairman of the executive committee of West Coast Lumber Inspection Bureau, and Edgett.

These men will explain the position each of the two organizations has taken in the current move to engineer lumber grades to meet changing demands of the construction industry.

Students must complete certain extension assignments and finally submit their thesis, an original study on some phase of banking or trust work.

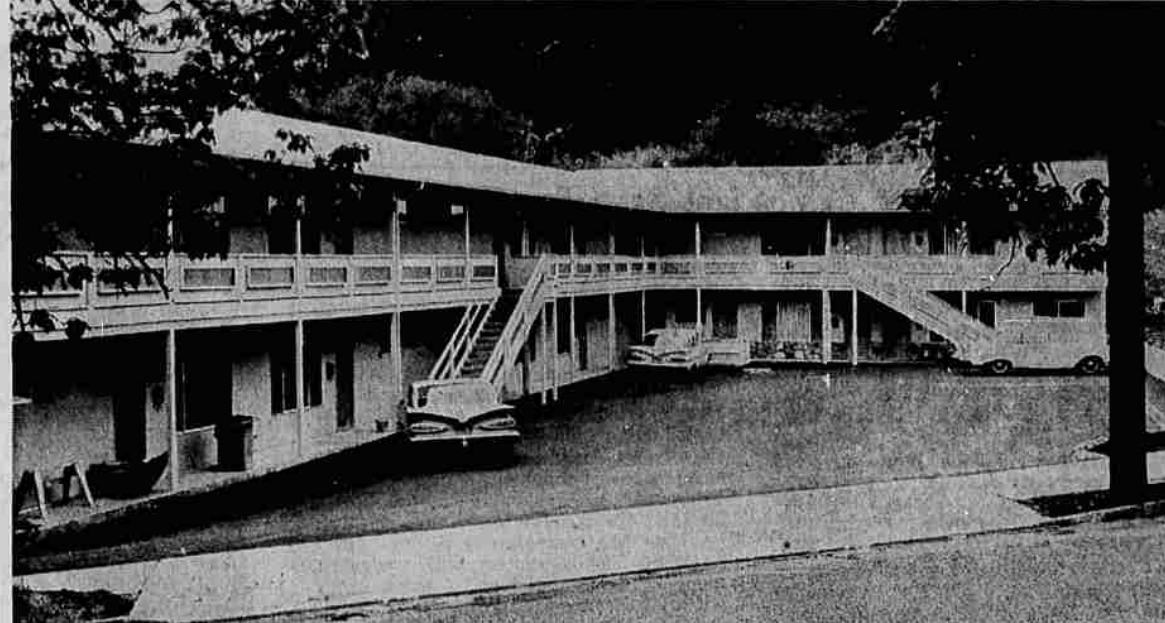

Fourteen Karat Apartments Name Selected By J. Wests

Fourteen-Karat Apartments is the name selected for the new apartment house erected by Jack and Viletta West in the 600 block on NE Winchester St.

The building is now completed and most of the apartments occupied, the Wests report.

As the name implies there are 14 apartments, of which 10 are two-bedroom, three are one-bedroom and one a bachelor apartment. Five of the apartments, located on the ground floor of the two-story frame and stucco-covered building, open to the rear into enclosed patio areas.

The Karat portion of the name, adopted from the Wests' jewelry business, is carried out in the decoration motif. The overall exterior is painted a dusty rose, with pastel panels and gold inserts.

The 14-karat gold motif is carried out in the linoleum on the floors and painting of the ceilings to contain flecks of gold which give a sparkle.

The overall building dimensions are 330 feet for the long part of the "L" and 85 feet width for the short portion of the wall. The building width is 24 feet and each apartment is 33-by-24 feet in size.

Special insulation for the ceilings and walls have been installed, to provide minimum penetration of sound. This also serves for insulation against heat.

Adequate black-topped parking area is provided for the apartments and shrubbery planted around the building. Native stone also has been used to advantage.

"Chuck" Collins was contractor for the structure, for which a building permit of \$110,000 was issued. This was for the structure only, exclusive of the land, apartment furnishings and other necessary development.

A building to the rear of the property was moved to the west facing SE Stephens St., and the Wests plan future remodeling and use for the structure.

Kelley's Korner Station-Grocery New Building Open

The grocery store-service station business at Kelley's Korner, three miles south of Roseburg on old Highway 99, was doubled the past week, when the new building housing the combined Signal Oil service station and grocery was completed and occupied.

Both the new and old stores and service stations will remain in operation for some time under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Pres Wynegar, who have had the old building under lease for the past 2 1/2 years and plan to keep it in operation until their lease expires.

A grocery store has been in operation here since 1912. Signal Oil erected the new building.

J. Manning Takes Over Key Post With WCLA
