



Jacoby Explains Use of Stayman

During the war years George Raabe and Sam Stayman of New York developed a system of responding to opening no-trumps in which the two club response to the opening no-trump was an artificial forcing bid. Stayman's name was attached to the convention and today every expert in the world uses it in some form or other.

The uses diverge tremendously, but they all go under the general name of Stayman so I will call mine Jacoby-Stayman. Of course, Jacoby-Stayman fits perfectly with the Jacoby transfer bid, but whether or not you use the transfer bid you should use Jacoby-Stayman.

The bidding shown in the box would be that of any pair using any version of Stayman. The hand shows why all experts use the convention.

Without the artificial club North would probably respond three no-

Famed Athlete To Appear During Bible Study Event

One of America's all-time football greats, Donn Moomaw, who was Lineman of the Year and College Player of the Year while playing football for UCLA in the 50's, will be in Roseburg this weekend as one of the principal speakers in the "Two Great Days With the Bible" event being staged by the Roseburg Ministerial Association and the American Bible Association. Over 20 churches of the area are participating in sponsoring the event Saturday and Sunday.

Moomaw will speak first at a men's breakfast at St. George's Episcopal Church at 7 o'clock Saturday morning. That evening at 7:30 he will address a giant youth rally to be held at the Roseburg High School auditorium. His final appearance will be on Sunday at 7:30 p.m. when he will address a "Festival of Faith," also to be held at the high school auditorium.

All church members and non church members are invited to hear Moomaw speak and also to attend any or all of the events to be held in connection with "Two Great Days With the Bible." A complete schedule of the two-day event will be announced during the week.

Moomaw, expected to be one of the big drawing cards of the mammoth Bible rally, now serves as minister at large of the First Presbyterian Church at Berkeley, Calif. While a junior at UCLA and at

the height of his football fame, he committed his life to Christ with the same all-out dedication he brought to his team on the football field. In 1957 he was elected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of the five outstanding men in California for that year. He was a member of the Billy Graham team during the London Crusade and was one of the official group organizing the "Fellowship of Christian Athletes."

His Roseburg appearance will be one more in a long series of special activities resulting from his demand as a speaker and Christian leader.
