

Wildcats Battle To Tie Against St. Mary's 11

After a shaky first quarter the Glide Wildcats recovered to battle the powerful St. Mary's Crusaders of Medford to a 12-12 tie Saturday night at Medford.

Quarterback Wade Sumpter provided the Wildcats with a spectacular passing offense, completing 12 of 27 aerials for 173 yards. Included in Sumpter's pass completions were a pair of TD aerials to Gary Mayfield and Craig Long.

The Crusaders depended on their ground game, but the determined Wildcats were equal to the task. The host crew picked up 119 yards on the ground and completed four of seven passes for 43 yards. The other three Crusader passes fell into hands of defenders, with Bob Paulson, Stan Young and Long each getting credit for an interception.

After the first quarter the Crusaders were held scoreless by the rugged defense led by Young, Jack Rust, Paulson, Mayfield and Long.

Starting their comeback in the second period, the Wildcats were within one TD of the Crusaders by halftime. The local A-2 squad took the ball in the second period and marched 48 yards in eight plays. A 15-yard pass from Sumpter to Mayfield climaxed the drive.

North Bend 11 Tops N. Eugene

North Bend's Bulldogs pulled into a four-way tie for first place in the Midwestern League (District 5-A-1) standings Saturday night by nipping the North Eugene Highlanders, 12-7.

The Bulldogs scored single six-pointers in the second and third periods to enjoy a 12-0 lead going into the final seconds when North Eugene struck on a 60-yard pass to avoid a shutout.

Quarterback Ken Snoddy was the spark of the Bulldog attack, tossing 28 yards to Steve Caruso for the first TD, then running the final four yards for the one that provided the coastal crew with the win.

The Bulldogs are now tied with the Roseburg Indians, the Cottage Grove Lions and the South Eugene Axemen for the conference lead. Each of the four teams won in the opening round of action.

Manager Grady Hatton's club made good use of eight hits and four Spokane errors Sunday to take a 12-2 victory over the Indians.

The sixth game of the series is scheduled tonight and the 89'ers must win. If they do the playoffs will go the full seven games with the winner of Tuesday night's game automatically champion.

Manager Danny Ozark started his ace, Howie Reed, on the mound Sunday night. For the first three innings he held the 89'ers scoreless but then in the fourth inning things began to happen. The 89'ers scored five runs in the fourth, one in the fifth and three each in the sixth and seventh frames.

George Williams cracked home runs in the fourth and fifth for Oklahoma City, each time with the bases empty. Jack Smith relieved Reed in the sixth.

Dave Giusti, who started the first playoff game but was knocked out of the box in the sixth inning, gained revenge as he held the Indians to but five hits in going the distance.

Phil Ortega, who won the third game of the series, is scheduled to pitch for the Indians tonight with the 89'ers relying on Russ Kemmerer, who jumped into a starting role about a month ago after being a reliever for many years, both in the major and minor leagues.

'Jolly Roger' Staubach Leads Navy Grid Attack

NEW YORK (UPI)—Navy's football team is flying a "Jolly Roger" this fall like the sea-faring pirates of old.

Instead of a skull-and-crossbones flag, this is a real flesh and blood Jolly Roger—quarterback Roger Staubach. He's Navy's make or break man in a bid for eastern football honors against a challenge from loaded Syracuse and Pittsburgh.

Penn State, two-time winner of the Lambert Trophy as champs of the East, is down for a rebuild, year but rates an edge over Army, Boston College, Holy Cross, Villanova and the other eastern independents in the second flight behind the big three.

In the Ivy League, Bob Blackman's Dartmouth Indians figured to survive the loss of quarterback Bill King and center Don McKinnon to repeat as titleholders in a close finish with Harvard.

Delaware is favored as usual in the Middle Atlantic university division and it's Massachusetts or Connecticut over New Hampshire's defending champions in the Yankee Conference.

Staubach, a 6-foot, 2-inch junior from Cincinnati, rushed from No. 4 quarterback as a Navy sophomore last season to national prominence in the last half of the campaign.

Percentage Leads Nation
Roger hit seven touchdowns, ran for seven more and led the nation in passing percentage with 68.4. He even completed a pass to himself during Navy's 34-14 rout of Army last December.

In addition to Staubach, Navy returns 25 lettermen including fullback Pat Donnelly who led the team in rushing last year. Among the linemen are stickout tackle Jim Freeman and center Tom Lynch.

At Syracuse, coach Ben Schwartzwalder lost only nine of last year's top 33 and the returnees include a dangerous quarterback-fullback combo in Wally Mahle and Jim Nance.

Pittsburgh has 28 lettermen led by halfback Paul Martha and fullback Rick Leeson, plus a murderously schedule up to the usual Pitt standards. A passer is needed and that chore could fall to Kenny Lucas, brother of ex-Penn State star Richie Lucas.

The new substitution rule spelled the end of the "Chinese Bandits" defensive unit invented by coach Paul Dietzel when he was at Louisiana State but Dietzel, now at Army, can be counted on for some new wrinkles. However, the Cadets again are desperate for a quarterback and won't move out of the middle of the pack unless one is uncovered.

Lose Many Seniors
Jack Concannon of Boston College is back at quarterback to lead the Eagles again but they lost 25 seniors and the task ahead is rough. Holy Cross is rebuilding after heavy losses.

Dartmouth lost 24 lettermen by graduation but the Indians played mob scene football with three units last year and the losses may not be quite so severe as indicated. Halfback Tom Spangenberg leads the survivors.

Harvard hopes to develop its tackles by mid-season and if it does, the Crimson attack led by quarterback Mike Bassett and

fullback Bill Grana will be hard to handle.

Quarterbacks Archie Roberts of Columbia and Gary Wood of Cornell are the Ivy League aces at that position but only Columbia may be in position to take full advantage of the situation. The Lions lost only eight seniors.

Princeton lost its entire backfield from last year. Yale, under new coach Johnny Pont, is a question mark. Brown and Pennsylvania expect improvements but not enough to make the first division.

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
