

Kennedy Gets Report On Johnson's Tour

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson today gave President Kennedy an encouraging report on his whirlwind good-will tour of Northern Europe and said he found "great encouragement for our position in the world."

Johnson, who returned early today from his 15,000 mile journey, made the report during the regular weekly meeting of congressional leaders at the White House and he was praised for the manner in which he carried out the trip.

He later told reporters that it was a "very successful" trip. He said there is "great recognition of the objectives we are working toward" and he had come away with the feeling that the United States has many friends in the nations he visited.

At 1:17 p.m. Monday an overheated clothes dryer set accumulated lint on fire at the home of Mrs. V. Martin Lampman, 116 SE Hoover. Damage was estimated at \$25.

Firemen answered a call at 7:30 p.m. at the home of Rella Smith, 1019 SE Pine, and stood by during a fire. No damage was reported.

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Fischer Quints Get Many Gifts

ABERDEEN, S.D. (UPI)—The Fischer quints were assured today of everything from diapers to shoes to college scholarships.

Gifts have poured in from throughout this region of rolling plains since the news of the births was flashed around the world just before dawn Saturday.

Already the value of the gifts has been estimated at between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

Aberdeen's chamber of commerce Monday began acting as a clearing house for the Andrew Fischers. The office has been keeping a running list of gifts, and answering the seemingly endless telephone calls.

The list includes: an adding machine, a year's supply of packed pickles, a \$200 scholarship to two colleges, a \$200 scholarship fund to any college in South Dakota, "his" and "hers" sports shirts, one-year beauty treatment for Mrs. Fischer, bakery goods until the quints are 21 years old, haircuts for the boy for the next five years, butter, shoes, washer and dryer, honey, baby food, toys, jewelry, and diapers.

The chamber's office also said it would construct a home for the Fischers according to the Fischer's specifications.

Chamber officials said the house would cost "a great deal."

The latest chamber list carried the names of 79 firms and individuals who had called to offer gifts. Others called later Monday and they will be added to the list today. The chamber is storing some of the gifts in a room in its office.

Angell Forgery Trial Scheduled Today

Judith Angell, 22, Roseburg, went on trial at 10 a.m. today on a charge of forgery in connection with a bank check made out to Joseph Frank Guse in the sum of \$224.88.

The trial opened in the court of Judge Charles S. Woodrich with Deputy Dist. Atty. Philip J. Washburn trying the case and George Weigum as attorney for the defense.

Miss Angell is accused of forging the name of Bruce R. Briggs, to a payroll check of the R. A. Briggs and Sons Logging Co., which check allegedly was cashed by Guse at Frank Webster's Food Mart in Roseburg Feb. 12.

An important witness in the case is Guse, 28, who was returned to Roseburg from Tacoma by sheriff's deputies. Guse, out on bail here from two charges, subsequently was arrested in Tacoma for armed robbery and is awaiting disposition of his case there.

Guse is accused here in Grand Jury indictments of burglarizing the Briggs office at 497 SE Ramp Rd. and further of uttering and publishing a forged check.

Guse and Miss Angell were arrested in New Mexico and returned here to face the charges. Both were indicted by the Grand Jury but pleaded innocent on arraignment and were released on posting bail. The trial is expected to take two days.

Flu Fire Reported In Tenmile Area

A flu fire at the J. A. Melius home on Reston Road in Tenmile was the occasion of some surprise to the owners around 5:30 p.m. Monday when fire trucks from the Tenmile Volunteer Fire Department and the DEFA station at Tenmile arrived on the scene before either Melius or Mrs. Melius knew there was an emergency.

According to Mrs. Walter Coats, correspondent, the alarm was turned in by Mrs. Lloyd Thomas, a neighbor, who noticed smoke rolling from the Melius chimney. Melius was working in the woods nearby, and Mrs. Melius was in a field visiting with another neighbor. Neither was in a position to notice the smoke. A fire had been started earlier in the fireplace of the home.

Mrs. Coats reports that both departments stood by until the fire had burned itself out. There was considerable smoke damage in the house, according to reports.

Court To Inspect Two Road Projects

Members of the Douglas County Court will inspect two road construction projects this week and then conclude the week by attending a meeting of the Association of Oregon Counties in Grants Pass Friday.

On Wednesday, the County Court will view the grading of the final section of the North Umpqua Highway which has been completed by the Hamer Corp. A contract for paving of this 8.2-mile section has already been let to Morse Brothers Construction Co. of Lebanon.

Beckley & Thomas of Roseburg have received the subcontract to do the rock crushing and base preparation on the project and are scheduled to start on the job next week. They had originally planned to start earlier this month, but were delayed when the Bureau of Public Roads held up approval of the site from which the rock will be taken. Approval of the site selected by Beckley & Thomas has now been given, and the project can get under way.

On Thursday, the County Court will tour the Rock Creek Road project with officials of the Bureau of Land Management.

Friday's meeting in Grants Pass will be between County Court members from Douglas, Coos, Curry, Jackson and Josephine Counties.

HAIR OILINESS

Q. What is the cause of excessive oiliness of the hair?
A. Some people have dry scalps, some oily scalps, and some in between. When the "normal" scalp more or less suddenly becomes too active in producing oil, a change of shampoo may be called for. Some medicated shampoos tend to make the scalp oily. Switch to a different brand of shampoo and see if that helps.

NYLON

Q. My skin breaks out every time I wear nylon stockings or underclothing. How can this "allergy" be overcome?
A. So far as is known, there is no really effective way to desensitize again nylon. Just avoid wearing nylon clothing.

"RESISTANCE" TO POISON IVY

Q. Are some people naturally resistant to poison ivy?
A. Yes, people born in the Orient are much less likely to be bothered by poison ivy and poison oak than people born in this part of the world.

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Local Resident Struck By Auto

Clifford M. Shoemaker, 38, of Rte 2, Box 391, Roseburg, was taken to Douglas Community Hospital for treatment after he was struck by a automobile in the driveway of his home about 8:50 p.m. Monday.

The sheriff's office investigation shows Shoemaker was out in the front of his home playing with his small son. A car with three young people drove into the driveway, and one of the boys got out of the car.

Mrs. Shoemaker asked what they wanted but did not receive any satisfactory answer. She tried to find out their names and to whom the car was registered but was told it was none of her business.

Shoemaker went to the rear of the car to get the license number, but the boy who was out of the car got back in, saying "Let's get out of here." He started the car and drove backward quickly, striking Shoemaker with the car and knocking him to the ground, the deputy sheriff reported.

The youth was said to have then gotten out of the car, looked at the man lying on the ground, laughed and said: "You're all right," then drove away.

The deputy called to the scene found the injured man in the kitchen of his home. Several neighbors, witnesses to the incident, also were there. The district attorney's office is investigating further.

Local Man Enters Plea Of Innocent

Donald Bruce Ekholm, 24, Roseburg, pleaded innocent to larceny of an automobile before Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich Monday.

Ekholm was charged in a Grand Jury indictment with the theft July 23 of a 1956 Volkswagen, the property of Associated Discount Corp. Trial was set for Oct. 22 and bail was continued at \$1,500.

In another case before Judge Woodrich Monday, Fred E. Dickinson, 26, Winston, withdrew a plea of innocent on appeal of a conviction for assault and battery and substituted a plea of guilty. He was convicted in District Court before Judge Gerald R. Hayes of assault and battery May 25 on Harold L. Kirk in an argument over a bill for power mower repairs performed by Kirk. He had appealed the conviction. Judge Woodrich fined him \$350 but suspended execution of sentence for one week.

Test Ban Treaty Gains Support From New Key Southern Democrat

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nuclear test ban treaty gained support today from another key Southern Democrat when Sen. Sam J. Ervin, N.C., announced that he would support the pact, though "without great enthusiasm."

Ervin's announcement in a Senate speech brought to 82 the number of firm or probable votes for the treaty. Ervin had been regarded as one of the fence-sitters before today's announcement.

Ervin said his treaty endorsement was "the most difficult decision I have had to make since coming to the Senate nine years ago."

He made his decision known as Sen. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., the nation's first Air Force secretary, defended the pact on one of its most debated points—the ability of U.S. missile sites to survive a nuclear attack. He said he is confident that the Russians do not know any more about such vulnerabilities than the United States.

Seek Vote Friday

Senate leaders hope to bring the treaty to a vote by Friday. Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., reasserted this target today to newsmen after the weekly White House legislative conference.

Mansfield said he anticipated votes this week on proposed reservations and "understandings" and if a final vote is not attained on the treaty itself, then it will come "perhaps next week."

Symington, who had access to secret military testimony before two committees on the treaty, said in a speech prepared for Senate delivery, "The evidence is that the Soviets know no more than we do about such vulnerabilities."

He challenged one of the principal anti-treaty arguments, saying, "The evidence is that they have not conducted any large-scale tests of this kind."

Treaty opponents have stressed that the Soviet Union probably knows much more than the United States about super-bomb effects because of the Russians' 1961-1962 atmospheric testing of high-yield weapons.

Thurmond Also Speaks
Speeches by Symington and Sen. J. Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., a sharp opponent of the pact, will follow.

The treaty cleared its first parliamentary hurdle Monday with backers citing the birth of the Fischer quintuplets as a symbolic reason for its ratification.

The Senate took the parliamentary step when it agreed unanimously to accept the actual text of the treaty without amendment and begin consideration of the separate ratification resolution.

Jones Sentenced To Reformatory

Raymond Leroy Jones, 23, of Roseburg, whose defense attorney said he had led an aimless life since losing both parents in the Aug. 7, 1959, Roseburg blast, was sentenced Monday to serve up to 20 years in the Washington state reformatory.

Jones pleaded guilty in Washington Superior Court at Tacoma Monday to a charge of robbery in connection with the Aug. 31 armed robbery attempt at a Tacoma Safeway store. Prosecutor S. J. (Jerry) Witt told the court Jones was arrested inside the store.

Witt said Jones and two other Roseburg men, Joseph Frank Guse, 28, and Charles Wallace Dickerson, 24, were involved in the robbery attempt.

Guse has pleaded innocent to the robbery charge and Dickerson, also charged with robbery, has not yet entered a plea.

Jacqueline Kennedy Set For 'Change Of Scenery'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy will go to Greece Oct. 2 for a two-week visit with her brother-in-law and sister, Prince and Princess Stanislaus Radziwill, the White House announced today.

The First Lady's press secretary, Pamela Turnure, described the trip as "wholly private."

She said the President's 34-year-old wife will join her sister at a home the Radziwills have rented near Athens.

Mrs. Kennedy has been recuperating at Newport, R. I., following the birth of a son, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, who lived for only two days. The premature child was born on Aug. 7 and died on Aug. 9 at Children's Hospital in Boston.

It was Mrs. Kennedy's fourth Caesarean section.

Miss Turnure said the First Lady is "doing very well." But she added that it was felt that a "change of scene" would be good for her.

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
