

Former Lions Club Leader To Speak At Local Meeting

Curtis D. Lovell of Gardiner, Maine, who served as president of Lions International from June 1962 to June 1963, will be in Roseburg Friday night to address some 400 Oregon Lions, expected here to observe the 35th anniversary of the Roseburg Lions Club.

The banquet will be held at the Elks Temple, starting at 8 p.m. following a social hour at 7. A full program of honors for charter members and others prominent in Lionism is scheduled, according to A. G. (Mike) McLain, an international counselor, who is chairman of activities.

The Roseburg observance will be a forerunner of the mid-year conference of Lions in Grants Pass Saturday, when Lovell again will be the principal speaker.

Elected In France

Lovell was unanimously elected president of Lions International at Nice, France in 1962, at the first international convention held in Europe.

"Curt," as he is known to Lions throughout the world, has had a long and distinguished career in Lionism. He is a charter member of the Gardiner club, organized in 1949. At the local club level, which he joined in 1940, he served the Lions Club of Augusta, Maine, in several offices, including the presidency, and is an honorary member of that club. While at Augusta he organized the Lions in nearby Gardiner and held several offices.

At the district level, he served as zone chairman, deputy district governor (two terms), and for several years has been editor and publisher of District 41 magazine, the "Forty One." District 41 is the only one in Lions International which includes clubs under the flags of three nations: The United States, state of Maine; Can-

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Tito Prepares Western Visit

BELGRADE (UPI)—President Tito of Yugoslavia today prepared to start on a five-nation visit to South America and the United States that will include an "informal call" on President Kennedy at the White House.

Tito is expected to start his journey from the Belgrade Airport late tonight. Yugoslav officials advised newsmen to be at the airport at 11 p.m., but would not say exactly when the president would take off.

Tito will travel to Brazil, Chile, Bolivia and Mexico before going to New York for the 18th session of the United Nations' General Assembly.

The Communist leader will visit Washington Oct. 17. Western observers in Belgrade said Tito apparently will attempt to soothe any Western fears that Yugoslavia may have moved closer to the Soviet bloc.

Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev recently concluded a 15-day visit to Yugoslavia amid indications the two leaders may have ended the 15-year feud between their nations.

The late Soviet dictator Josef Stalin kicked Tito out of the Communist bloc in 1948 for daring to pursue an "independent road to socialism."

Observers said Tito, 71, will try to shore up his image as one of the world's "neutralist" leaders during his travels through Latin America.

August Bond Sales Up From Last Year

Savings bonds sales in Douglas County for August were reported by county chairman L. J. Fullerton today to have been \$56,887. The total for a year ago was \$52,320.

In Oregon as a whole, E & H Bond sales last month were excellent, amounting to \$2,819,438, up 3 per cent compared to August of 1962. Volunteer savings bond leaders in the state feel that this is an especially good showing in view of the unsettled conditions which have prevailed in the lumber business during most of the summer.

Fullerton pointed out that in most of the major cities in the state, the school stamp program will be getting under way again during the latter part of September. Oregon grammar school youngsters who had a chance to take advantage of this thrift program bought more than a quarter of a million dollars worth of 10 and 25 saving stamps during the last school year.

Police To Sponsor 'Grand Ole Opry'

The Roseburg Police Department is sponsoring the appearance here Saturday night at the Fairgrounds of the famous "Grand Ole Opry," which features among its top entertainers Faron Young, one of the leading recording artists of the day.

The performers will appear in a stage show at the Fairgrounds Community building at 7 p.m., then return for a dance at 9:30. This will be the annual police department benefit performance.

Young has had best-selling records on the market almost continuously for several years. He is approaching a decade of stardom on the "Grand Ole Opry." Of the many stars in the Opry's 35-year history, Young is reputed to exemplify better than any other the "new school" of country-western music. He is said to subtract the twang, add a rich strong voice, but keep the warmth and plain feeling of the music.

Born Feb. 25, 1932, in Shreveport, La., Young has been singing as long as he can remember. He formed a band in high school, played guitar and sang anywhere there was a crowd. He snagged a spot on the Louisiana Hayride show, toured the South as vocalist with the Webb Pierce's band, has been going at top speed as a performer ever since. He has starred in several westerns, along with making other movie appearances.

County Jobs Included In State Bid Opening

Mark To Speak At Labor Meet

EUGENE (UPI)—Fifty-five resolutions, including five key ones dealing with the workman's compensation law—were introduced at the Oregon AFL-CIO opened its eighth annual convention here Monday.

The five top-priority resolutions would revise the law to provide universal coverage with minor exceptions, place all workers under workman's compensation and expand coverage to those not presently protected.

They specifically included farm laborers.

A resolution also was introduced opposing the proposed closing of the state's inland waters to commercial fishermen.

Oregon Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilsen spoke before the 800 delegates and said that he would "have no doubt about the future of labor if bargaining could be done on the basis of skill of membership as well as unity."

He said service unions—especially—should pay more attention to training as a part of their programs.

Nilsen told the delegates that if unions do not want equal opportunities for membership to minority groups, then employers would have a supply of nonunion labor available when certain circumstances arose.

Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore., spoke on some of the issues facing Congress.

Gov. Mark Hatfield was to speak today.

The convention runs through Friday.

Riddle Is Seeking New Supervisor

The city of Riddle is now receiving applications for the position of city superintendent, correspondent Erma Best reports. The post was left vacant by the recent death of Chris K. Hood.

At the last meeting of the City Council, two ordinances were amended. Ordinance 161, now ordinance 198, was amended to raise the maximum fine for dogs running at large from \$5 to \$20. The minimum fine is still \$1.

Section 52 of traffic ordinance 189, now changed to 199, was amended to read "no person shall ride or operate a bicycle upon the sidewalks of the city of Riddle." The recent meeting was a make-up one for a regular session earlier postponed. Mrs. Best reports. The next regular meeting will be held on Oct. 14.

Cut In Library Service Ordered In Face Of Threat To Tax Bill

SALEM (UPI)—A \$122,000 cutback in state library services was ordered Monday because of the threat of defeat of the legislature's \$60 million tax increase measure.

In addition, Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr., said he has ordered savings and cutbacks totaling \$300,000.

The library cutback was the first major agency paring announced in the face of the special tax election Oct. 15. Voters then will decide the fate of Oregon's \$60 million income tax package.

Librarian Eloise Ebert said up to a \$200,000 cutback may be ordered after the election but that if the tax measure is not defeated the cuts would be restored.

Appling said \$140,000 in economies had been ordered in his department and that this would be saved regardless of the outcome of the tax election. He also said he has ordered postponement of about \$180,000 worth of budgeted repairs, improvements, maintenance and additions to state buildings. The future of these projects depends on the outcome of the tax election, he said.

Among postponed projects are

extension of the library building elevator from the third to the fourth floor, repainting of interior woodwork in the library and state office building here.

Calls News Conference

Miss Ebert, who called a news conference, said effective next Monday, the library would "discontinue services to schools, colleges, universities and to students taking general extension courses."

In addition, the library will discontinue the purchase of all juvenile and fiction books. Mail reference services on genealogy pertaining to non-Oregon ancestry

also will be discontinued, she said. Miss Ebert said the library would not fill three existing clerical vacancies, and that three student workers usually hired to handle the increased fall workload would not be employed.

She said the action was ordered by the State Library Board, which met Friday at La Grande.

The action "was taken by the board following a directive issued by the governor's office to bring expenditures in line with an anticipated general fund cut of 14 per cent," she said.

The library's 1963-65 general fund appropriation was about \$877,000.

She said the directive was dated Sept. 9, and that Monday she received a directive dated Sept. 13 ordering plans for a possible 25 per cent cutback.

She said the 25 per cent figure would necessitate an additional \$78,000 cutback, and indicated if such a cut were made it would be achieved through layoffs of personnel.

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
