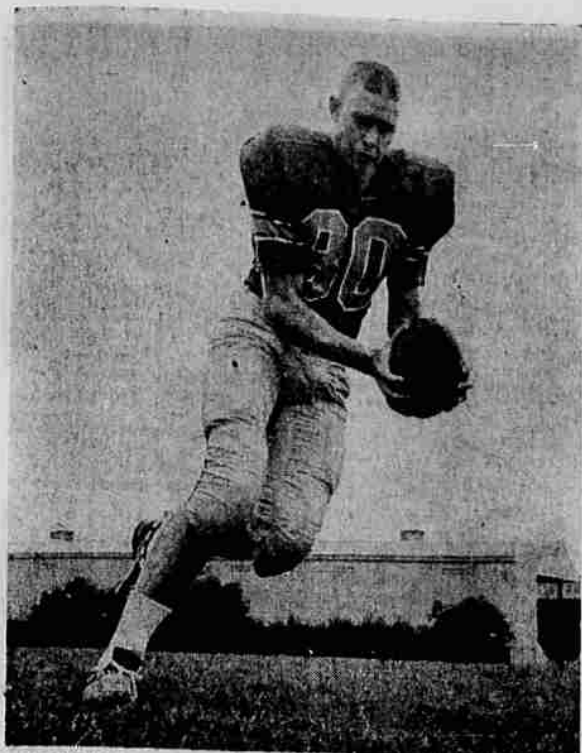

Texas, Arkansas Rated As Power In Southwest

DALLAS (UPI)—Two weeks ago when fall practice started, champion Texas and runnerup Arkansas, whose combined losses last year consisted only of Texas' 7-3 defeat of the Razorbacks, were solid choices to lead the Southwest Conference parade again.

There is a growing feeling that Texas Christian and Rice may be developing strength enough to end the domination which Darrell Royal of Texas and Frank Broyles of Arkansas have held over their rivals since 1959. One or the other, or both, have figured in four straight titles.

Baylor and Texas A&M may have muscle enough to argue

strongly with any of the other "big four" in face-to-face meetings.

That leaves only Southern Methodist and Texas Tech to be "written off" as at least potential pretenders until it is recalled that a smaller, less-experienced SMU team last year beat two league teams and lost to the other five by a combined total of only 22 points.

Among the area's independents, only Houston plays a major schedule. The Cougars' assignments of Auburn, Baylor, Mississippi, Texas A&M, Mississippi State and Alabama the first six Saturdays of the season appear enough to dampen any hopes of national prominence.

Favored To Repeat
Both Texas and Arkansas, on paper, shape up as repeat performers in the conference chase, but injuries have been cropping up in workouts at both camps and Broyles has lamented that his Arkansas players reported in the worst physical condition since he's been at the helm.

Texas retains 28 lettermen, including six starters, from a team that ranked No. 4 nationally and—again on paper—does not have a serious problem, including depth, at any position.

Veteran Duke Carlisle looks adequate at quarterback, and Tommy Ford and Ernie Koy promise solid running potential in the backfield behind a big, mobile line anchored on All-America candidate Scott Appleton at tackle.

Losses Offensive Strength
Broyles at Arkansas lost three-fourths of his backfield and says "our defense is going to have to pick up the offensive slack we lost."

Arkansas also retains six starters, five of them up front where Broyles has big, fast talent to burn like center Ronnie Caveness, guard Tommy Brasher, tackle Dave Adams and ends Jim John and Jerry Lamb.

The lack of proven runners, aside from returnee George Walker, will force Broyles to plan a more active overhead game built around junior passer Bill Gray and Lamb, a receiver without a peer in the Southwest.

Jo Lane Gridders Set For Busy Week

The Joseph Lane Pioneers have four football encounters on tap this week for the seventh, eighth and ninth grade team.

Wednesday the Pioneer freshmen will host the Roseburg High School sophomores at 4 p.m., then the Jo Lane and Fremont ninth graders will square off Friday at 4 p.m. at Joseph Lane.

The seventh and eighth grade teams have games scheduled for Thursday. The eighth grade will host the Fremont Generals, while the seventh grade will be at Fremont. Both games are set for 4 p.m.

In the Junior High Jamboree the Jo Lane seventh graders toppled Fremont, 12-0, as Jim Cave and Jim Taylor handled the scoring. The Fremont eighth graders emerged victorious by a 14-0 count, and the ninth grade crews of the two Roseburg junior highs battled to a hard-fought 13-13 tie.

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Dodgers Trip Red-Hot Cards, 3-1

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—It's beginning to look like the elated Los Angeles Dodgers won't have to wait until next year because they won "the big one" despite a boner that rarely is seen even on the sandlots.

They not only survived that "rock" Monday night, but increased their shriveled National League lead to two games by snapping the St. Louis Cardinals' 10-game winning streak with a 3-1 victory.

The setback for the Cardinals was only their second in 21 games, and even ultra-conservative Walt Aiston conceded "things look a little better."

"One game better, anyway," he hedged, smilingly.

It was the first time the Dodgers manager had smiled in days and he had ample reason after southpaw Johnny Podres and Ron Perranoski collaborated in a three-hitter.

Podres, who pitched perfect ball for 5-1-3 innings and was

credited with his 14th victory, was the hero beyond any doubt in the victory, and his batterymate, catcher John Roseboro, nearly wound up the goat.

Connects For Triple

Roseboro, whose three passed balls figured prominently in a 6-1 loss by the Dodgers at the hands of the Phillies last Sunday, connected for what appeared to be a triple off Cardinal starter Ernie Broglio in the second inning.

Roseboro's blow hit the right field screen and barely missed being a home run. The Dodger catcher made it all the way to third and was dusting himself off when four Cardinal pitchers, sitting in the St. Louis dugout, frantically began waving to Broglio, urging him to throw the ball to second base.

Shortstop Dick Groat didn't know what it was all about either but he finally took Broglio's throw and tagged second.

The Cards then appealed to the umpires, insisting that Roseboro

had neglected to touch second. First base umpire Ed Sudol agreed and declared the Dodger catcher out.

After the game, Roseboro admitted he hadn't touched second. Tommy Davis singled home the first run of the game in the sixth inning, and Stan (The Man) Musial tied the score in the seventh with his 12th homer of the season and 475th of his career.

Musial's wallop stirred the capacity crowd of 32,442 at Busch Stadium into a near frenzy, but hopes for a Cardinal victory were short-lived because the Dodgers cracked through with two runs in the ninth.

Little Bobby Shantz took over the pitching for the Cards in the ninth after Broglio had yielded for a pinch hitter in the eighth.

Ron Fairly hit Shantz' second pitch off the right field screen for a double and after Roseboro struck out, Willie Davis singled to score Fairly with the winning run. The Dodgers added an in-

surance run when second baseman Julian Javier threw wildly to second on a double play ball hit by Moose Skowron, pinch hitting for Podres.

"I'm not at all pessimistic because we lost the first game," said Cardinal manager Johnny Keane. "The defeat isn't fatal to our pennant hopes. We still have our two big men to throw at them."

He meant southpaw Curt Simmons, who'll be shooting for his 18th victory and fourth straight shutout tonight, and Bob Gibson, who will pitch Wednesday night.

Sandy Koufax goes for the Dodgers tonight and Pete Richert Wednesday night.

Only two other games were played in the majors Monday night, with the Giants beating the Braves, 4-3, and the Pirates downing the Cubs, 1-0.

Juan Marichal scored his 23rd victory for the Giants in handing the Braves their seventh straight loss with a six-hit effort. Orlando Cepeda's 31st homer off loser Tony Cloninger in the fifth proved to be the winning run after Denis Menke hit a three-run homer in the second.

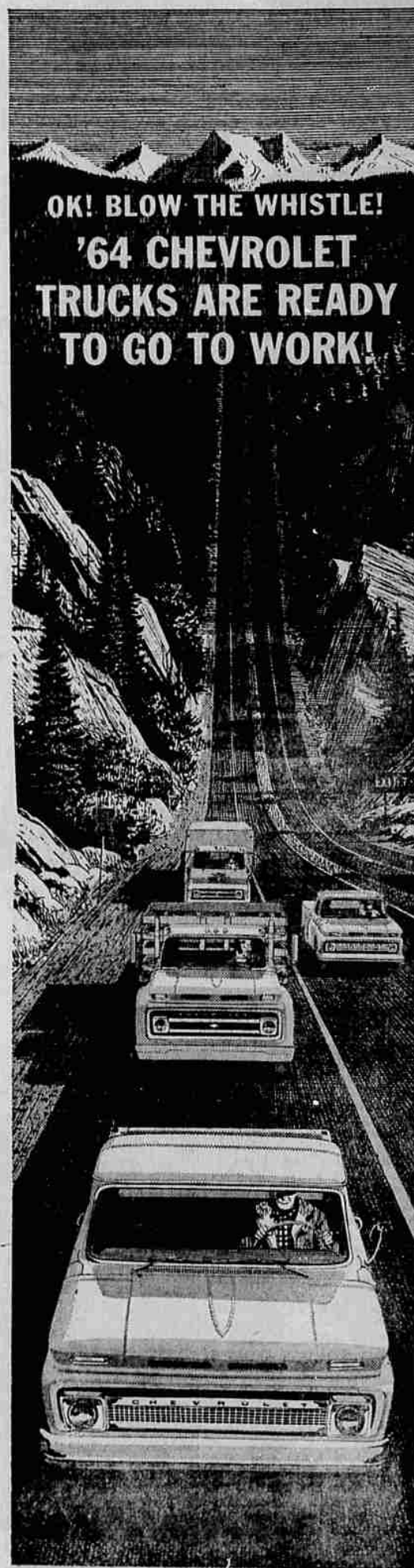
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
