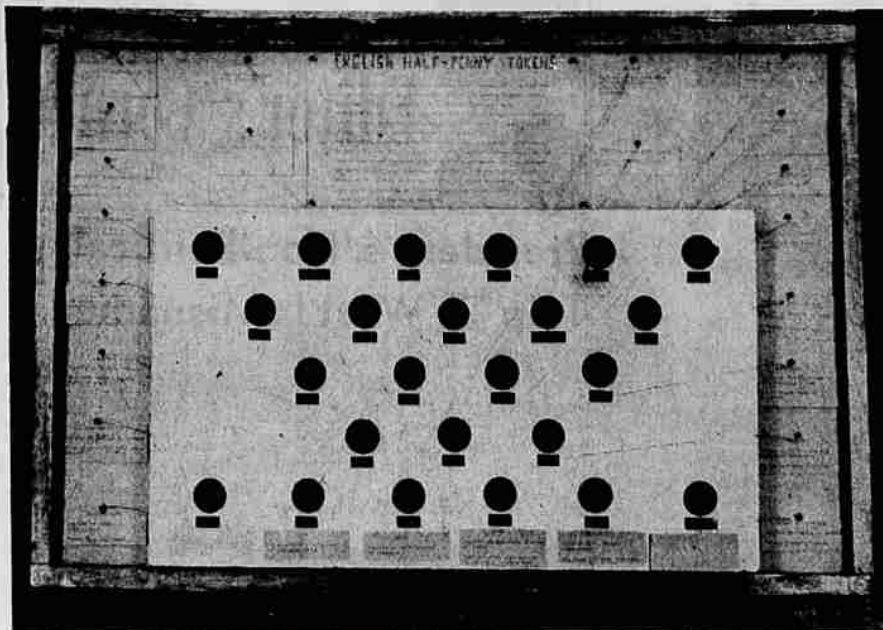

## Republicans Seek Curb On Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican leaders today accused President Kennedy of ducking the issue of heavy federal spending and pressed toward a major House showdown on harnessing his proposed \$11 billion tax cut.

Kennedy told the American people Wednesday night that "this nation needs a tax cut now," and pleaded for "your help, your voice" against partisan attempts to weaken or delay the bill.

In a nationwide radio-television address, the President stressed the measure's promise of helping boost consumer pocket money, of fighting a recession, creating more jobs, opening up new markets, balancing the budget and ending the U.S. dollar drain overseas.

At the same time, he pledged an ever-tighter rein on federal spending and asserted that "no wasteful, inefficient or unnecessary government activity will be tolerated on the grounds that it helps employment."

With that and a tax cut, he said, "prosperity will balance our budget."

Republicans promptly complained that these assurances were not specific enough. They vowed an all-out battle on the House floor next week to sidetrack the entire tax cut unless government spending is held to strict levels during the next two years.

GOP National Chairman William E. Miller charged Kennedy

with preaching "economic brinkmanship" and "credit-card government." He demanded equal time for the GOP viewpoint on major radio and television networks.

Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, said the President "was uttering good Republican gospel" on economic goals Wednesday night but differed essentially from the traditional GOP approach that "spending should be geared to the revenues."

Everyone wants a tax cut, said Rep. Thomas B. Curtis, R-Mo., a member of the tax-writing

House Ways and Means Committee. "But you have to earn it by cutting expenditures and he (Kennedy) didn't really even discuss that."

## Annual Garden Roundup Opens Saturday

A blending of the horticultural and artistic talents of three segments of the local population will result Saturday and Sunday in the fourth annual "Garden Roundup" show to be presented in the auditorium of the Veterans Administration hospital.

Entries will be accepted from the general public, members of garden clubs of the area and hospitalized veterans who take part in the horticultural therapy program at the hospital.

The "Garden Roundup" is the last major flower show of the season here and offers a fine opportunity for area residents to display their garden treasures, according to those in charge. Public participation both in show entries and attendance is urged, committee spokesmen state.

The show is being staged by the Umpqua District of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, other Roseburg area clubs, and the Veterans Administration Hospital. The show will be presented in six sections and ribbons will be awarded for first to fourth winners in each class of the different sections. New this year is section VI, featuring special displays, which is open to individuals or organizations, commercial or amateur. According to the committee in charge, many interesting and unusual horticultural and other exhibits will be on view.

No reservations are needed for entries in the horticultural and arrangements division which will make up the greater part of the show. Anyone having a choice bloom, fruit or vegetable is invited to bring it in for entry on Friday between 1 to 5 p.m. Flower containers will be provided. Arrangement entries will be received during the same hours. Judging will take place Saturday morning.

The show will be open for public viewing on Saturday from 1 to 5 p.m. and on Sunday from noon to 5 p.m. Door prizes will be given, and there will be no admission charge.

Section I, fruits, includes the many variety of apples, peaches, pears, plums, quince and filberts and walnuts. Section II, vegetables, includes all the popular varieties of garden vegetables as well as oddities of unusual size and shape.

Section III, horticultural flowers, has classes for annuals, perennials, bulbs, corns and tubers, roses and potted plants. Section IV is on arrangements with two special classes limited to hospitalized veterans only. Section V is for children from 8 to 18 years of age and has classes for flowers, vegetables and arrangements.

Anyone who would like to enter an exhibit in the show and who has not yet secured a schedule book listing show rules and entry details may secure one at the Veterans Administration Hospital, the Farm Bureau Exchange, the county extension office, or from any member of the committee in charge. Garden clubbers of the area also have the books for distribution.

General chairmen of the event are Russ Madison and John C. Benson of the hospital staff and Mrs. W. W. Painter and Mrs. E. H. Card. In charge of publicity are Mrs. Sidney Domenico and Alfred Malone. Mrs. C. L. Bowles and David Supple have charge of properties and staging and Mrs. J. Durgin is in charge of veterans' entries. Mary Nolen and Mrs. G. C. Blank head the hospitality committee. Any of these persons may be called for additional information about the show.

According to Mrs. Domenico, it is hoped that many persons from Roseburg and surrounding areas will come in to view the exhibits, sign up for the door prizes and in general enjoy the beauty of the late summer flowers from the areas many fine gardens.

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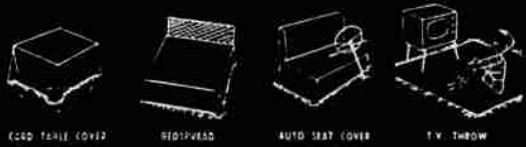
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
