

Local A-2, B Grid Teams Ready For Busy Weekend

Another busy weekend of football faces the Douglas County A-2 and B teams, with league counters on tap in the Emerald and Bico-Trico-B circuits.

Featured clashes in Bico-Trico-B League play finds Powers' Crusaders at Crow and the Yoncalla Eagles traveling to Elkton to face the Elks. Both games are scheduled for Friday at 1:30 p.m.

The four teams go into Friday's games without a loss as Crow and Elkton are tied for the League lead with one victory each, while Powers and Yoncalla battled to a scoreless deadlock in their opener last week.

Elkton's Elks turned in a flashy performance last week in rolling to a 20-7 triumph over the defending state champion Monroe Blue Dragons. The Elks feature a veteran backfield behind a relatively green line, but after last week's performance rate as one of the favorites in league play. Crow's victory came by a 7-6 margin over Lowell in a league opener last week.

Non-league battles on tap for Bico-Trico B teams include Lowell at McLaren Friday, while Monroe plays Siletz Saturday at Toledo and the Oakland Oakers will host the Myrtle Creek Vikings.

Drain's Warriors will attempt to keep their Emerald League record unscathed Saturday when they head north to battle the Harrisburg Eagles at 1:30 p.m. The Warriors opened in loop action with a thrilling 6-0 triumph over defending champion Elmira. As a result of the victory the Warriors just missed being rated among the top 10 A-2 teams in the state, and are figured to battle the Junction City Tigers and the St. Francis Saints for the 1963 league crown.

Oakridge's Warriors will travel to Central Linn to face the Cobras and Junction City will play the McKenzie Eagles at McKenzie in Friday's Emerald League counters. Saturday Creswell's Bulldogs will be at Elmira against the Falcons and St. Francis will take on the Hillbillies at Pleasant Hill.

UVL Terms Play

The six Umpqua Valley League teams will go into their second weekend of non-league play as they prep for the Oct. 3-4 conference openers.

Douglas' Trojans, winners of a 14-12 decision over the strong Coquille Red Devils last week, will head for the coast to battle the Gold Beach Eagles. Gold Beach dropped highly rated Illinois Valley in its opener, sending the two teams onto the field Friday night in one of the top A-2 clashes in the state. Gold Beach is currently rated seventh in the Oregon Journal's poll, while Douglas drew enough support to be rated as the No. 12 A-2 crew in Oregon.

The Riddle Irish will be at home

Friday to the Brookings squad. The Irish opened with a decisive 21-7 victory over Pacific last week as the defending UVL champs displayed a strong passing and running attack along with a tight defense.

Pacific's Pirates are set to invade Sutherlin to take on the spunky Bulldogs. The Bulldogs, still smarting from their 26-6 setback at the hands of a powerful Bandon team last week will be out to topple the Pirates. Leading the Sutherlin attack will be all-league quarterback Mike Ouellette.

At Glendale the home fans will have the first chance to view their Pirates in action when the St. Mary's Crusaders pay a visit. The Pirates ended on the short end of

a 33-13 game at Rogue River last week, while the Crusaders battle the Glide Wildcats to a 12-12 deadlock.

Saturday afternoon the Glide Wildcats will attempt to break into the winners circle when they host the powerful Myrtle Point Bobcats in a 2 p.m. non-league clash. The Wildcats, displayed a wicked passing attack with quarterback Wade Sumpter doing the throwing, tied St. Mary's of Medford, 12-12, last week. In addition to a good aerial game, the Wildcats have a tough defensive unit with good size and speed in the forward wall.

Another non-league encounter Saturday finds the Vikings of Myrtle Creek set for a 1:30 p.m. invasion of Oakland to face the Oakers. Myrtle Creek fell, 14-6, to Myrtle Point in its first game of the season, while the Oakers romped to a 19-7 victory over the Corbett Cardinals. Saturday's clash at Oakland features two former league opponents as the Oakers competed in the UVL before dropping back to B classification in the spring of 1962. Both teams have a host of young players eager for action, with the battle shaping up as a thriller.

8-Man Battles

In Southern Oregon 8-Man League play the Days Creek Wolves head for Butte Falls to take on the Loggers in the first conference game of the season. The Wolves dropped a 68-0 non-league decision to Camas Valley last week. Kick-off time at Butte Falls is 3 p.m. Friday.

The Hornets of Camas Valley and the Canyonville Tigers are set for a non-league outing at Canyonville Friday at 3:30 p.m. Both teams shut out their opponents last week, the Hornets by a 68-0 margin and the Tigers toppled Cascade Locks by a 28-0 count. The two teams are figured to be among the top powers in Southern Oregon 8-man play, with the Tigers going into the season as the defending league champions and the runners-up in the state last year.

Clemson Rated Tops In ACC; SC Race Tight

RALEIGH, N.C. (UPI) — The Tigers of Clemson may lose a few teeth in their opening head-knocking but there's not much doubt about where the power lies in southern football circles this year.

Clemson will have more than enough teeth left to chomp on the rest of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Coach Frank Howard has few worries after back-to-back games with Oklahoma and Georgia Tech.

In 24 years at Clemson this may be Howard's finest team, and he's quick to predict his Tigers will end the season on top of the ACC after playing in Duke's shadow for three years.

"A lot of teams will be laying for us this year and I guess part of the reason for that is my big mouth," Howard said.

SC Race Closer

However, in the Southern Conference there appears to be a closer duel shaping up for the championship. This would be between perennially strong West Virginia and Virginia Military Institute.

VMI comes back this year with 25 lettermen from a champion 1962 team, and the Mountaineers have plenty of talent despite losing 17 lettermen.

Although it may appear that way, Clemson won't have an easy time of it this year. In addition to Georgia Tech and Oklahoma, the Tigers also meet Georgia and some improved conference teams.

North Carolina, N. C. State and South Carolina all figure to have stronger clubs this year, and Maryland still has the great Dick Shiner at quarterback.

Shiner, All-Conference last season and one of the top passers in the nation, figures to have his best season.

Duke won three consecutive conference titles, unprecedented in the ACC, but lost depth and experience through graduation. The Blue Devils will be one of the greenest teams in the ACC this year and join Wake Forest and Virginia among the also-rans.

May Cause Trouble

In the Southern Conference, William and Mary and Virginia Tech could give West Virginia and VMI the closest run for the roses with Richmond, Furman, Davidson, The Citadel and George Washington finishing out of the money.

Howard, as outspoken as any in the country, has good reason to be confident of victories this season. He has the likes of quarterback in Parker — "a good 'un" — and tons of mobile weight with an improved ground attack.

North Carolina counts on experience and a more potent ground gain than last season to go with the aerial offense of quarterback Junior edge, eighth best passer in the nation last season, and end Bob Lacey, one of the best pass receivers in the nation and a potential All-America.

Tax Talk Is Given At Sutherlin PTA

Kenneth Barneburg, Douglas County superintendent of schools, was the featured speaker at the first meeting of the Sutherlin East Elementary School PTA this week in the school library.

Barneburg spoke on the forthcoming Oct. 15 election at which voters of the state will decide the fate of the referendum on the legislature's \$80 million tax measure.

He emphasized a need for the voters to understand the ballot. He pointed out that a "yes" vote is a vote for the legislative action and for the tax "package." A "no" vote is against the tax change and in favor of the referendum.

He stated that if the basic school support for Sutherlin were cut 14 per cent, it would mean a loss to the district of about \$25,000 during the current school year. This is the equivalent of 5 mills in local property tax.

Mrs. Phyllis Morey presided at the PTA session attended by 70 persons.

During the business meeting, the group elected Maurice O'Connell as vice president to replace Bill Blakeley, who submitted a letter of resignation.

Dave Marr Wins Portland Pro-Am

PORTLAND (UPI) — Dave Marr of New Rochelle, N.Y. won \$300 in first money in the \$3,000 pro-amateur tournament Wednesday as a prelude to the start of the \$30,000 Portland Open.

Marr shot a six under par, 66 one stroke ahead of Bob Goetz, Tulsa, Okla., and Paul Bondeston, Northbrook, Ill.

Tied with 68s for fourth place were Harold Kneec, Aiken, S.C., Bob Duden, Portland and George Bayer, South Pasadena, Calif. Six teams of pros and amateurs tied with a best ball score of 58 for the team championship.

Jack Nicklaus, defending champion of the Portland Open, won a pre-tournament driving contest with a mark of 335 yards, good for \$100.

In all, 10 of the 20 top money winners on the 1963 tour were among the 149 pros in the field, which also included 10 amateurs. Others were Bruce Crampton, Don January, Tommy Aaron, George Bayer, Mason Rudolph, Doug Ford, Jay Hebert and Paul Harvey.

Most of them arrived early for practice and Wednesday's \$3,000 pro-am, and the consensus was that the course would play longer than last year. Home pro Bunny Mason said he would settle for 273 as the winning score.

"I just didn't play very well in Seattle," Nicklaus said here. "I just didn't get organized or something."

He added that he "really didn't play well" in the World Series of Golf in Akron where he defeated Arnold Palmer, Julius Boros, and Bob Charles in picking up \$32,000 top prize.

The 23-year-old better from Ohio spent hours on the practice tee here, using all the clubs in his bag in an effort to get back on his game. He was two under par for nine holes during one practice round.
